Estes Kefauver for the Democratic presidential nomination. Nixon's name was not on the ballot, he did no campaigning and there was no organized effort on his behalf. The votes apparently represented a spontaneous upsurge of public sentiment for the much-argued Vice President.

The primary also produced these

The primary also produced these results:

1. It elected 14 Republican convention delegates, all backers of President Eisenhower. None of the seven candidates, who had filed as favorable to Sen. Knowland (R. Calif), was elected. The seven had entered the primary before Eisenhower announced he would seek a second term.

2. The President's total in the preferential primary was 55,082 on the basis of returns from 289 of the state's 297 precincts. Knowland received 307 write-ins and there were 67 for Chief Justice Warren and 64 for Sen. Styles Bridges (R-NH).

3. Kefauver won all 12 Democratic delegates with eight convention votes. These are the first votes in the nation formally pledged to
