Rockville Voters Back Simpkins Site; Schools Still Without Budget

Rockville, March 14 (Special)—The Board of Finance last night approved the \$655,527 appropriation in 1936-37 for the cost of salaries for new teachers and salary increases for present teachers at \$654,884, the Board would actually need \$666,215.

U.S. Not Taking Sides Greeks, Britons Urged To End Cyprus Violence

Officials said this meant simply that the United States will use its influence and the full resources of its diplomacy to try to get the disputants into new negotiations, and then do everything possible to promote a settlement.

For the moment, however, it did not appear to authorities here that there was much the United States could do except to prod Greek leaders on Cyprus, the Greek government and the British government to avoid any moves which would make the situation worse.

In its statement, the department said: "The United States has not itself been a party to the Cyprus issue. Our sole effort has been to encourage those directly concerned to find a fair and just solution."

"We were greatly disappointed that the substantial progress made toward such a solution through private discussion did not result in final agreement."

But the statement said the United States is confident that in the long run "a solution can be found which will strengthen overall western interests."

Malenkov Flies To See British Power Stations

Moscow, March 14 (AP)—Georgi Malenkov left by plane for Britain today to tour British power stations.

It is the former Soviet Premier's first trip to the Western World.

Malenkov and his party of 20-odd electrical engineers were to spend the night in East Berlin, then fly on to London tomorrow.

Since he resigned the premiership in February, 1955, Malenkov has been a deputy premier and minister of Soviet power stations.

The party will stay in Britain for three weeks.

A British power delegation will pay a return visit to Moscow next month.

Malenkov's mission officially is technical, not political. But he is still a member of the Soviet Union's ruling "collective leadership," both of the Communist party and of the Soviet state.

Therefore, any move he makes has a political significance.

Malenkov's trip and the visit to England next month of Soviet Premier Bulganin and Communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev appear to be part of a concerted

\$80 'Fair' Wage For Bit Players

Hollywood, March 14 (AP)—A fair day's wage for movie bit players has been set at \$40 by the Screen Actors Guild and the Association of Motion Picture Producers.

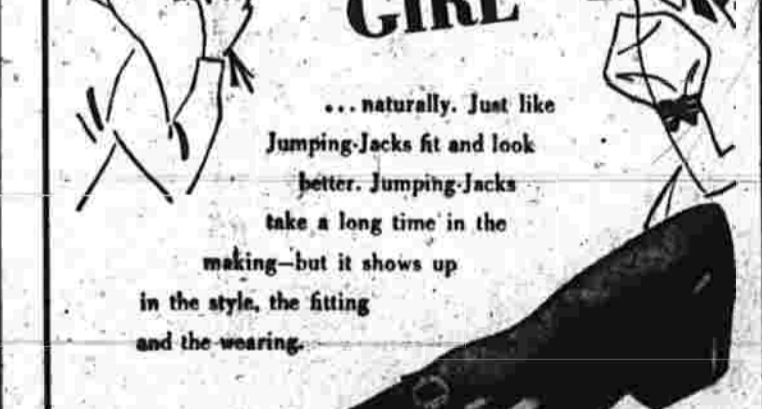

Directors Decide to Change Status of Water Department

The Board of Directors last night decided the Board of Water Commissioners should be abolished and the Water and Sewer Departments should be set up as any other department under the General Manager and the Director.

The Directors asked Town Counsel Charles N. Crockett to prepare the charter change to effect the abolition.

The Directors are now ex-officio members of the Board of Water Commissioners.

In another decision, the Directors rejected a change in the Town Charter which would prohibit all municipal employees from participating in political activity.

Acting on a suggestion that the office of "city or town planner" be included in the charter, the Board asked General Manager Richard Martin and the Town Planning Commission to discuss with the Board the planning administrator and to whom he should be held responsible.

Martin said the TPC will report their decisions to the Board.

Information received by the Board and representatives of the Board and Revision Workshop, which has been preparing for action on a number of charter changes it has suggested.
