



During World War II, Allied soldiers, whose pay scale was far below that of the Americans, were required to pay in their clubs and canteens. For this reason the military authorities decided that it would be more equitable to charge American servicemen for similar services. The Red Cross does not sell and has never sold cigarettes. Besides violating basic Red Cross policy, selling cigarettes would violate internal revenue regulations. IN SOME IN. STANCES, SHIPMENTS OF CIGARETTES MARKED "GIFT OF THE AMERICAN RED CROSS" HAVE BEEN DELIVERED THROUGH ERROR TO POST EXCHANGES AND SOLD WHILE THE RED CROSS RE CEIVED THE UNMARKED CIGARETTES AND GAVE THEM AWAY. Also, Red Cross supplies have sometimes been stolen and have fallen into the hands of black marketeers who

Hospital workers frequently make purchases for patients. This traditional Red Cross service, rendered to patients by both paid staff and volunteers when patients have their own funds and want the Red Cross to shop for them, is sometimes misunderstood, Patients in neighboring beds, seeing money change hands and cigarettes or other articles passed from the hospital worker to the patient, may have concluded that Red Cross supplies were being sold.

5. THE RED CROSS NEVER DID ANYTHING FOR ME WHILE WAS IN THE SERVICE

Many servicemen never have need of Red Cross services. They may not have personal or family problems: perhaps they have not been sick or wounded and in need of blood or Red Cross welfare and recreation service in military hospitals. This fact was also true during World War II. But hundreds of thousands of servicemen overesas who needed no other Red Cross service were aided by the Red Cross clubs they visited while on leave. In many leave areas these clubs were their only authorized lodging places. Many took Red Cross facilities so much for granted that they frequently did not realize or remember that they were Red Cross installations. Many who had no occasion to seek assistance while in service have since been maferially assisted by the Red Cross in obtaining veterans benefits to which they were en-

titled. Many have also received Red Cross

service while patients in veterans hospitals.

6. THE RED CROSS DIDN'T GIVE ME A LEAVE

Leaves are entirely controlled by the military authorities. The Red Cross is brought into the picture only when there is a question of emergency. The job of the Red Cross is to provide verified information about home conditions that might require the presence of the serviceman in question. The information is obtained at the request of military auhorities or the serviceman or his family and the Red Cross submits a report without any recommendation of its own. The report may, however, include the recommendations of doctors, lawyers, or others. The final decision is made by the military authorities

7. THE RED CROSS CHARGES FOR RELIEF SUPPLIES! NEVER. Aid to disaster victims given through the Red Cross is an outright gift from the people

of America. Nothing is sold at any time, 8. THE RED CROSS REFUSED TO REPLACE LOSSES CAUSED BY DISASTER! This may be entirely true. RED CROSS

AID IS GIVEN ON THE BASIS OF NEED. NOT LOSS, IT IS NOT A SUBSTITUTE FOR INSURANCE and it is not given to those who have funds for financing their own rehabilitation without hardship. However, families whose resources are inadequate receive Red Cross assistance. For those who have been injured or whose property has been destroyed or damaged by disaster, the Red Cross assists in rebuilding homes and farm buildings and in replacing furnishings and equipment: in many cases it accepts responsibility for needed long-term medical and nursing care. If a bread-winner's income is derived from a small one-man or family business, the Red

Cross may participate in financing the restor-ation of the business to make the family economically self-sustaining. In determining the best rehabilitation plan for families, the Red Cross is assisted by a local advisory committee made up of representative citizens

9. THE RED CROSS MAKES LOANS TO DISASTER SUFFERERS! NEVER!

The Red Cross gives its financial assistance to disaster victims in the form of outright grants, not loans, Shelter, food, clothing and medical care are given to all disaster sufferers as required during the emergency phase of a disaster. When the emergency is over and the work of rehabilitation is begun the Red Cross assists disaster victims on the basis of need beyond their own resources.

10. THE RED CROSS WON'T GIVE HELP IN DISASTER TO THOSE WHO HAVE JOBS OR OWN THEIR HOMES!

Employment or the ownership of property does not prevent the Red Cross from assist-ing an applicant. If meeting his disastercaused needs without aid would work unduhardship on the individual or family, the Red Cross makes a grant. It is important to emphasize that each case is decided on its individual merits. If an applicant has some resources, but not enough to accomplish his own rehabilitation, the Red Cross will make up the difference between what the family can do for itself and what is needed.

11. RED CROSS EMPLOYES ARE OVERPAID!

The Red Cross is directed by volunteers at both the national and chapter levels-through the Board of Governors nationally and the chapter boards locally. The volunteer board members decide how many paid staff are needed to insure continuity and technical guidance of Red Cross programs. The salaries of paid staff are also determined by these volunteers; THE SALARIES ARE IN LINE WITH THOSE PAID BY OTHER HEALTH AND WELFARE ORGANIZATIONS AND WELL BELOW SALARIES PAID BY PRI-VATE INDUSTRY. In the national organization and its 3,700 chapters there is an approximate ratio of

100 unpaid workers to each one paid. 12. THE HEAD OF RED CROSS RECEIVES A SALARY!

The head and principal officer is the Chairman, who is appointed by the President of the United States. The Chairman is a volunteer and receives no salary. The 50 members of the Board of Governors are also volunteers. Eight Governors are appointed by the President of the United States. Thirty are elected by the chapters and 1 members at large are elected by the other 3 members of the Board.

The Board appoints the President of the American Red Cross, who is the chief executive officer of the organization. The President, in turn, appoints the other executive officers. The Board establishes the salaries paid to these officers and to the President

pitals at home and overseas. Operating the Red Cross Blood Program calls for full-time doctors, nurses, highly trained technicians and essential equipment. Effective relief for disaster victims requires a full-time corps of disaster specialists, available for work anywhere in the country at any time on a moment's notice. For training in first aid, water safety, lifesaving and home nursing a nucleus of full-time paid workers and instructors is needed to teach volunteer instructors and give technical guidance and continuity to the program. The basic costs involved in making ese services possible are a part of the services rendered and cannot properly be called "overhead." Even with the paid staff employed by the Red Cross, its activities could not be carried on without the great host of volunteers who do the bulk of the work. The value of volunteer participation, if measures in dollars and cents, would reach astronomica

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
