Dulles Talk Assures Fight on Foreign Aid

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER Washington, March 24 (AP) Secretary of State Dulles left no doubt today that the administration intends to make an all-out fight for its embattled foreign aid program as a "vital" weapon in the new conflict with communism.

Dulles reported to the American people by radio and television on his first-hand impressions of communism in Asia where he visited 10 countries during the past three weeks.

He reported generally as an optimistic one. He said he was "encouraged" about the future of the world, but "convinced" that the Soviet and Chinese economic tactics are a danger.

The one spot in the Far East where "conflict most threatens," he said, is the area of Formosa. The Nationalist Chinese stronghold long sought by the Chinese Reds, he noted, the United States is working "patiently and persistently" to bring about an agreement with the Communists on a reunification of the island.

Dulles said he came back from his trip "more than ever convinced of the vital importance" of American foreign aid, both past and future.

He said this country has no desire to dominate other nations, and "does not seek ties of mutual defense with any country whatsoever," unless that country wants such ties. It wants only the independence and improvement of the free nations of the world.

UN Control On Mideast Guns Asked

Paris, March 24 (AP)—Guy Mollet, French premier, declared today that "some kind of arms embargo" must be established for the Middle East under control of the United Nations.

The French declaration was made in a group of visiting American editors and commentators who have toured across North Africa, through the Middle East and part of Europe. A number of them expect later to go to Russia.

U.S. Top Court Backs '954 Immunity' Law

Washington, March 23 (AP)—The Supreme Court today upheld the validity of the 1954 immunity law intended to compel witnesses to testify in congressional security cases.

The court's decision was a 5-4 vote, with the majority opinion written by Chief Justice Earl Warren.
