#### Attacks Proposed

##### Distress Sale Law

A proposed town law which would govern "Going Out of Business Sales" came in for attack last night by Atty. John D. LaBelle representing A. Leroy Simpson, operator of the Textile Store.

LaBelle voiced his objection to the Chamber of Commerce sponsored law at an informal meeting of the Board of Directors in the hearing room of the Municipal Building.

The proposed ordinance will be the subject of a public hearing by the Board of Selectmen.

The attorney raised a number of questions about the intent of the law and the effect it would have on the result of his suggestions.

Under the law, a merchant would have to get a license from the Chamber of Commerce to conduct a sale which would give the merchant the right to sell his business. In order to get such a license, he would have to file in business here for at least six months, and would have to file an inventory of items for sale.

The law is not intended to apply to sales under normal process or to sales at auction.

Bruce Watkins, president of the Chamber of Commerce, argued that the law would not work a hardship on any merchant legitimately forced to terminate his business.

He said its purpose is to outlaw false termination sales.

**Scientists Studies Migration Habits Of Big Butterfly**

New Haven, March 29 (AP)—If you should happen to catch a monarch butterfly, they're the monarchs that are being studied by scientists at the University of Connecticut.

The word "Pyle" on its wings, it is being used to help a Yale entomologist work his way through the problem of how these butterflies migrate.

Prof. Charles L. Remington is concerned over whether the monarchs migrate from north to south and back again, and if they do, what factors influence their migration. He also wants to know what mechanism prompts them to travel, if they do migrate.

Remington and his wife, Jeanne, have recently completed marking monarchs at the Archbold Biological Station in Florida, stamping the wings of hundreds of them with small colored dots and the word "Yale."

He said he would be recovered on their northward flight and, forwarded to him at Yale together with a note concerning where and under what conditions the monarchs were made.

There's every reason to believe, Remington says, that monarchs migrate southward every year, going to Florida and over water to the West Indies.

Experiments he went on, have shown they do not survive winters north of Virginia in any state.

**An Ordinance We Need**  
 The "going out of business" ordinance the Board of Directors is considering for Manchester is not designed to restrict any normal legitimate business activity.  A Main St. enterprise was failing, and folding up. The going out of business sale went on for weeks after weeks, with the stock left on hand by the original owners of the store, apparently inexhaustible. Everybody could see the explanation. Additional cheap merchandise was being trucked to the back door as fast as the customer could take it. Going out of business sale signs were put up in front of the store. The so-called going out of business sales prices on the merchandise were probably high prices in relation to the actual worth of the merchandise.  
 The individuals who conducted this sale over a period of many weeks gave Manchester nothing except a fine ruckus. They made no permanent investment here; they paid no taxes here; they took their quick dollars and departed. And everybody who bought there thinking he or she was getting a bargain in an actual going out of business sale was played for a sucker. And whatever business was done there was business taken away from legitimate Manchester enterprises, which is a real part of this community.  
 There is no way to prevent this sort of thing except local ordinance, such as that which has been under consideration by the Board of Directors. An ordinance, such as that which is being considered in New Haven at that time, was suggested for Manchester in these columns, soon after the Main St. experience was described. It has been carefully drafted to deal with that sort of racket, and nothing else. It ought to be adopted.

**Raiding the Worker**

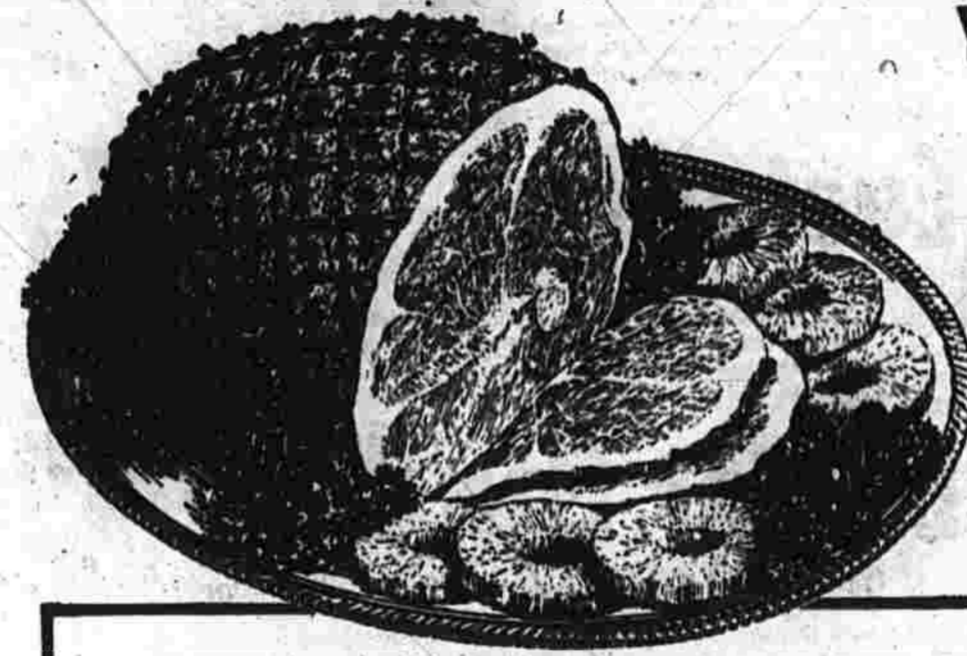

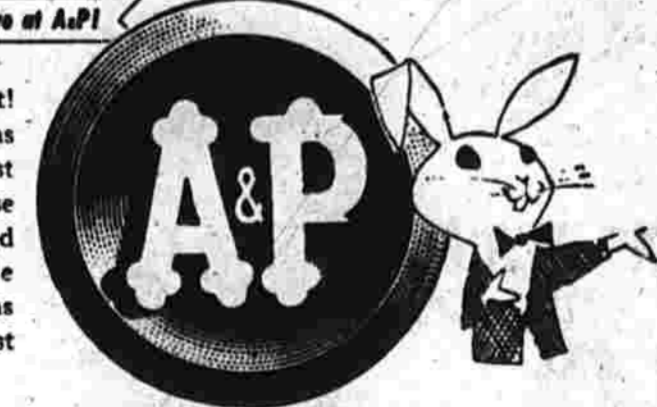
