**The Education Report States Schools Far Behind Potential**

Our schools are asked to teach skills currently needed by the nation, but never at the expense of the individual. This policy of encouraging each child to develop his individual talents will be the greatest use to the nation, for in the long run it is talent, not money, that will be the key to success.  
The committee said it unambiguously approved this great new goal for our schools—full development of the child as an individual—but that "two particular aspects of this goal involve basic disagreements which the committee did not resolve satisfactorily, partly because of the limited time."  
The first problem, it said, arises from modern schools' aim to foster the moral, ethical and spiritual values which "invariably involves widely different convictions."  
The report said "judicial decisions on church-state relations have clarified only small parts of the whole question" and called for continued study.  
"The second difficult question," it continued, "concerns the issue of segregation. This is an area of conflicting opinions not yet covered by Supreme Court action."  
The committee said it agreed that the intent of the majority was to continue the study.

Meanwhile, Kefauver opens a four hour broadcast from New Jersey today in Omaha, Neb., yesterday said Stevenson is "still in front" in the race for the presidential nomination.  
Leon Thorpe, an Iowa newspaper editor, expressed the opinion he is in better position to win conversion delegates than he was four years ago, when Stevenson captured the nomination. "And," he added, "I am a better bet than most of the other candidates for the nomination."  
Stevenson, who was beaten by Kefauver in the Minnesota primary March 20, said in Kingsland, Ga. yesterday he is optimistic about winning all in the Florida primary.  
Stevenson said that "if the South left the Democratic party" over the civil rights issue, the party would lose the election this year and would be injured for years to come."

The percentage of drivers moving at reckless high rates may be small, the number is too great and menaces all highway users. We believe definitely in a fixed top maximum speed without allowance margin and, of course, such lower posted speeds as the State Traffic Commission deems required by type and use of its various highways and, in urban areas, streets.  
In recommending an absolute speed limit, Sandstrom said, the committee took into consideration today's high-powered cars, mechanical improvements, ease of handling, smoother operating mechanisms and effortless quick pickup of practically all late model motor vehicles.  
He also pointed out that there is "over-emphasis" on the horsepower of automobiles, on their high "cruising range" and on their ability to accelerate quickly to 60 miles an hour from a standing start.  
Yesterday, Governor Ribicoff raised the speed limits on the W. 101 from 55 to 60 miles an hour from the Charter Oak Bridge to the Massachusetts state line.

Retired Sanjour Frederic Bidwell of Bloomfield said he had been arrested four times and convicted each time on, as he put it, the erroneous testimony of policemen.

Causes Mistrial  
He caused a mistrial when the jury could not come to an agreement in common pleas court in the trial of Jacob Brody of Ansonia, who had appealed a speeding conviction, Wednesday.

The jury was asked, in effect, "What was the truth, Brody or the state policeman who arrested him?"

After an hour and a half of deliberation the jury foreman reported that the panel could not agree, because one juror "seemed to be prejudiced against cops—against all policemen."

He said he was arrested twice for failing to stop at stop sign "when I actually did," and twice for speeding "when I actually was not exceeding the posted limit."

In the course of the jury's efforts to make Bidwell agree with the other 11 Judge John Fitzgerald read the panel's statement of the majority, and try to come to agreement.

"On the basis of my experience with policemen, I felt it would just as soon take the word of the man who was arrested," said Bidwell.

He added that he had only one on one other jury case, which resulted in acquittal.

"I enjoy jury service," he said.

representatives at the press conference, Fieringer said.  
Slansky was charged, as were others with him, specifically with violating Socialist legality. If anyone was guilty of violating Socialist legality it was former Communist party Secretary Slansky and his associates.  
Fieringer conceded the possibility of minor inaccuracies in the case against Slansky but said to the main charges were substantiated. In support of last week's Communist party resolution Fieringer said:  
"As a Socialist nation, if we want to maintain the masses correct we must enforce Socialist legality. Violations will occur in any government but these violations must be corrected."  
In answer to another question Fieringer said he saw no reason why without a charge against Slansky N. Orla, associated Press correspondent in Prague who was charged that he was an American spy, should be an American spy.  
Fieringer said Orla was found guilty on July 4, 1951, of the charges presented and was released to meet the wishes of the government of the United States. He was an American spy, Fieringer said.

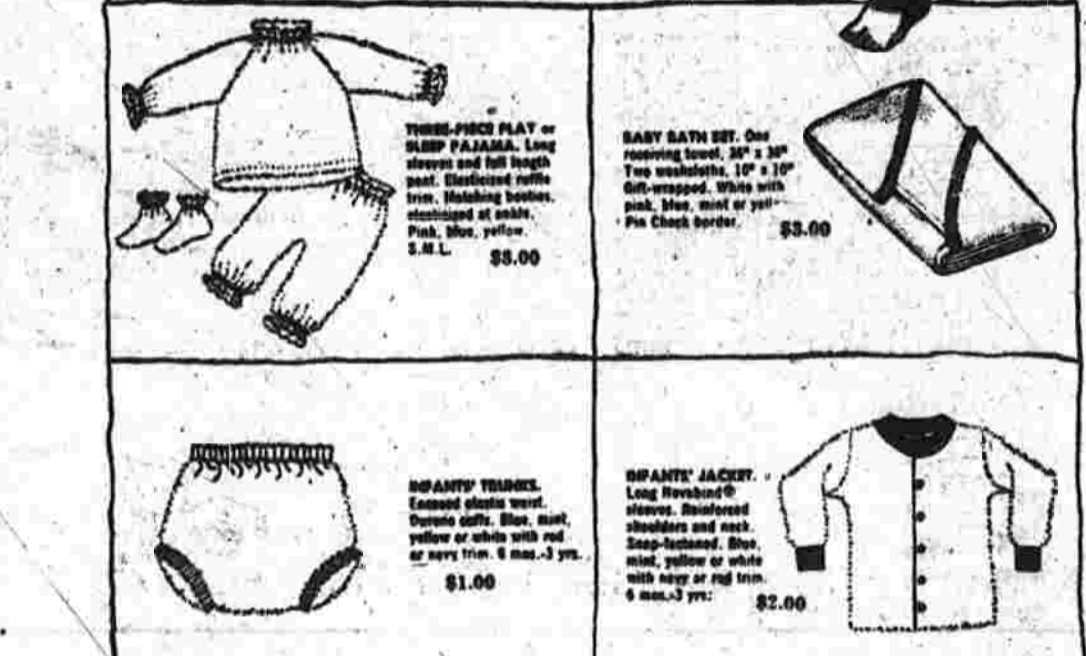
