



Quits Under Cloud Belgrade, Yugoslavia, April 16 (P)—Communist Bulgaria's Premier Vulko Chervenkov, a Moscow-trained strongman denounced by his party last week as a "Little Stalin," submitted his resignation in Sofia today. Washington, April 16 (P)—President Eisenhower today vetoed the farm bill. He said it would hurt both farmers and His action thrusts the farm situation into towering promi-

nence in this year's political campaigns. It becomes an issue on which Democrats can fire directly at the President. nhower will get in some first licks in this debate when he goes on the air at 10 p.m. (EST) tonight to explain why he rejected the bill, designed by Democratic architects but supported by some members of his own party. He will speak on all major radio networks and on ABC-TV. NBC-TV will carry a kinescope repeat of the address a

In a message returning the bill to Congress, Esenhower asked for prompt enactment—as a separate measure—of his asked for prompt enactment—as a separate measure—of his soil bank plan.

This contemplates payments of up to \$1,200,000,000 a year to farmers to retire acreage from crops and thus reduce surplus supplies.

Soil Bank in Vetoed Bill
The soil bank was in the vetoed bill, but so also were numerous provisions which Eisenhower and Secretary of Agriculture Benson found objectionable.

RESCUE AT NORWALK

The two men clung to the telephone pole, struggling desperately to keep their hold against the smashing impact of the flood waters. They had been part of a human chain which had dared the rising Norwalk River to rescue six people marooned at a power company substation.

A dam broke upstream as the rescue was underway. A twentyfoot wall of water smashed into the rescue party. One man was swept away. He managed to grab a telephone pole. A second man went to his aid and he, too, was forced to cling to the pole. Once again, those at the water's edge formed'a chain. This

time in an attempt to reach the men at the pole. But the current was too strong, the water too deep. George and Robert Bassler, brothers who work for the telephone company, were helping in the rescue work. When the chain failed, they rushed to a telephone garage, returned with pole-climbing equipment, a cable chair, and a coil of rope.

Robert, the younger brother, waded into waist-deep water to the nearest telephone pole, climbed it, fastened the chair to the telephone cable and began his dangerous ride over the rampaging flood waters.

As Robert inched his way along the cable towards the stranded men, George payed out the rope to him and directed the operation. Six feet from the pole where the two men clung, Robert found he could get no closer. From there he threw the rope to them and they made it fast. Guided by George's instructions, they pulled themselves hand over hand to safety.

For saving the lives of the two men stranded at the pole and for assisting in the rescue of the six people marooned at the power station during the October flood, George and Robert Bassler have been awarded silver medals from the Theodore N. Vail Memorial Fund. This Fund was established to provide recognition to telephone people for acts of noteworthy public service. It was the first time since the Vail Awards were established in . 1920 that brothers have received individual national awards.

With their medals, each brother received an award of \$500. Thus, George and Robert Bassler join telephone men and women across the nation who have been similarly honored for acts of beroism. Their quick thinking and courageous action in a grave emergency is an outstanding example of public service a telephone tradition since the earliest days of the business.
