Her husband, Ciprian, 28, is 5 feet 5 and weighs 115. He is a 140-pound midget.

The quads, born four minutes apart, were put in incubators in the six-foot premature nursery at the hospital. They were born in the order of their arrival they were "A," a girl, 2 pounds 2 ounces; "B," a boy, 3 pounds 2 ounces; "C," a girl, 3 pounds 2 ounces; "D," a girl, 3 pounds.

The twins were married in Puerto Rico in 1947. They came here shortly thereafter and now live in the 140-room Waldorf apartment.

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Bus Firm Defies Warning By Eliminating Segregation

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The company's directive bore the name of Manager J. H. Baily, who was unavailable for immediate comment.

Legal action followed. Before the segregation order was posted, Gayle hinted that legal action might be taken if his officials disregarded state and city laws requiring segregation. He said he would be ready to fight for his company on what steps if any were planned now that the company has done away with racially separate seating requirements.

City police said they had no orders to make any arrests of drivers or bus company officials.

Montgomery, in the southeast quarter of Alabama, has a population of about 120,000. About 50,000 are Negroes. The city is steeped in traditions of the old South.

As the first capital of the Confederacy, it was here that Jefferson Davis took the oath of office as president of the Confederate States.

When the Supreme Court ruling was announced yesterday, Mayor Gayle emphasized there would be "no change" in the City Commission policy.

"Everything in our power to maintain segregation on city buses," Gayle said.

"We're going to enforce the state and city orders just as we have been doing, and we expect the bus company to continue to abide by these laws."

Gayle and Commissioners Clyde Sellers and Frank Parks joined the pro-white Montgomery White Citizens Council last December after early efforts to end the Negro bus boycott failed.

The boycott has been in rigid effect since Dec. 3 when Mrs. Rosa Parks, a Negro seamstress, was arrested in police court because she refused to move to the back of a bus.

Montgomery County Grand Jury indicted Negro leaders about three months ago for violating Alabama's anti-boycott law. King, the first and only Negro tried thus far, was convicted and has appealed a \$200 fine.

King is president of the Montgomery Improvement Assn., a newly formed Negro organization which has operated a car pool for the thousands of Negroes who joined in the protest movement.

The young minister said the MIA's strategy committee planned to meet today to discuss the desegregation case. Recommendations will be made to the group's executive board, he said. The question of ending the boycott would be submitted to a vote at a mass meeting.

The mass refusal of Negroes to ride the Montgomery buses has forced the company to raise its rates 10 cents to offset the loss in revenue caused by the boycott. Officials said the company continued to lose money even with the higher fare, but they mentioned the dollar-for-dollar figure.

Estimates of the economic loss to the company and to Negroes, as well as to white persons whose businesses were affected, have been placed at hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Rockville, April 24 (Special)—Hope that developments during the past two weeks would help assist the City Planning Commission in the establishment of zoning in this city was expressed last night by members of the City Planning Commission.

Addressing remarks to a public hearing regarding construction of a drive-in restaurant at Windsor Ave. and Burgin rd., Donald H. Welles and William Rogusko said until zoning regulations are put into effect here it is the responsibility of persons buying homes to realize the possible outcome of commercial development.

Members of the Common Council and Mayor Herman O. Olson said that the City Planning Commission is now in the process of preparing a zoning ordinance. It is hoped to obtain the money from federal grants on a matching fund basis, but reconstruction in the state because of last year's floods would mean a delay in receiving of the money for at least "several months," members said.

Truman Plans Handoff Role At Convention

Kansas City, April 24 (AP)—Former President Truman said he will not take a hand in the selection of the Vice Presidential nominee for President unless a deadlock appears inevitable.

He declared in an interview yesterday.

"It should develop that a decision can't be reached any other way, I'll do all I can to help should I be called on."

The former President will be called upon to play if there is a deadlock. It manifestly has guided his refusal to make a personal choice this early in the jockeying for the nomination.

Truman shrugs off any suggestion he run against President Eisenhower in November.

"I'm younger, I might consider it," he said. "But no one has been elected to the presidency after reaching 65 and I've had to serve out my term."

Truman will be 72 on May 8. President Eisenhower was 65 last Oct.

"I'm saving my fireworks for the Republican campaign," Truman said. "I'll save them for the Republican campaign."

The Republicans will have all the money, but the issues will be our favor."

"The Republicans boast of peace and prosperity. But where is the real peace in a world where Hitler war could develop into big ones? And where is your prosperity where the business and the farmer don't share in the long haul can it last if they don't?"

RESCUERS SEEK GI MISSING IN FRANCE

Verden, France, April 24 (AP)—Rescue workers continued an underground search today for an American soldier lost in the maze of tunnels used by the French in the famous World War I battle of Verdun.

Army authorities identified the missing man as Gerald H. Dunning, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward M. Dunning of Wiconio, Va. His wife and two daughters, 19 and 4 months old, live here where Dunning is attached to an Army unit.

The soldier and his wife were sighted at Ft. Tavenard, near Verdun, Saturday afternoon. He left her to inspect one of the many entrances to the old mine system, which was built in 1745. When he failed to return, Mrs. Dunning notified the Army and a search started.

Army rescue teams feared that the soldier had been trapped underground by a crumbling tunnel. They brought in timbers today to shore up the walls while the search continued.
