Washington, April 28 (B - The Soviet bloc reportedly is wooing Yugoslavia with nearly 5300 mil-lion of easy loans, 10 times the amount of economic aid the United States is supplying this year. This country is giving, not lend-ing, 530 million to Yugoslavia this year for economic aid in addition to unspecified militäry aid.
