Rockville
Finding No Help To School Board
Rockville, May 3 (Special)—The Vernon Board of Education has no further power to get the money denied it by the state board of education, according to a letter from the state board of education, dated May 2.

Further clarification of the status of the disputed education budget has been made by Legg in an opinion rendered to the Board. The unit had asked Legg's opinion as to what could be done to "get the balance of money requested" from the Board of Finance.

Vernon has been without an education budget since the beginning of the fiscal year in October because of a dispute between the two boards as to cuts made in the budget.

Rockville-Vernon Counsel Tells School Board Federal Funds Use Limited

Rockville, May 3 (Special)—The budget of the Board of Education was limited last night. The federal money for the school system is limited to \$2,000,000 for the fiscal year ending in 1957.

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The Board hired Mrs. Emma Alma Hansen as a second dental hygienist at a salary of \$2,800.

Challenge to Psychiatry

The American Psychiatric Association, meeting in Chicago last Tuesday, had its annual academic lecture delivered by one Dr. Percival Bailey, a neurologist, who is director of the Illinois State Psychiatric Institute.

The lecture was a challenge to psychiatry, or on certain psychiatric practices which have for some time been acting to be delivered. It was rough, but if it forces the profession involved to defend itself convincingly, it can be healthy.

Talking on "The Great Psychiatric Revolution," Dr. Bailey warned "how long the heavy robes of Freud will continue to plague psychiatry."

None of the present psychiatric techniques, Dr. Bailey charged, contains in itself a solution of mental illness.

He advised psychiatrists to "get back into the ways and laboratories which they are so proud to have left behind them and prove, by established criteria, that their concepts have scientific validity."

Dr. Bailey asserted that psychoanalytic theory does not differ from any other "psychological treatment in straightening out the emotional life of man. Whatever there has been a combined test of psychotherapy, he said, little improvement has been shown.

Our own Constitution forbids always, so there is no real worry that the adoption of international convention or law would reach into this country with anything that is new or different for us or not already provided for in our own law.

That, then, is not the trouble. The trouble is that, by signing and ratifying such a convention, we would be participating in an international act of creating an international law which would reach into the domestic affairs of all countries binding themselves to it.

That is what the State Department is afraid to do, even to such a harmless, and for us, meaningless, instance, for fear that a precedent would be established which would lead to some future campaign by Bricker.

We won't propose that to have any way, law, or rule, we don't have anyway, because that symbolic promise about our domestic conduct would have to be made to an international organization and law. Thus, in the clutch, we are going to be in the position of opposing the international law which would, if observed, accomplish something we have long been advocating.

Lacked of fear, Bricker amendment, we ought, of course, to proclaim ourselves an organization, from Bricker, and get on with the business of framing even more international law to which we ourselves are willing to be subject.
