Jobless Claims Decrease Here

The number of claims for unemployment compensation in the Manchester area dropped during the week ending May 5 despite layoffs in tobacco warehouses in the area.

The State Labor Department reported today that the number of claims in Manchester last week ended at 668, a 5.9 per cent drop from the 711 on file during the week ending April 28.

At the same time, the depart-

ment's weekly report said several Hartford-area tobacco warehouses laid off 200 workers. None of these employees were from the Manchester area.

Although the total number of claims declined in Manchester, the number of initial claims rose slightly. These claims, which indicate spells of new unemployment, increased from 47 to 52.

Women accounted for 388, or 58.4 per cent, of the total last week. In the preceding week, they accounted for 437, or 58.8 per cent, of the total.

Throughout the state, meanwhile, the total number of claims remained almost unchanged at 15,714. The week before, 15,671

claims were on file. Twelve offices reported decreases last week and seven increases, the department reported.

It was also reported that 204 out of unemployment benefits so far this year, according to Copernicus Renato K. Ricciuti of the Labor Department. He said in the report that \$45,537 was paid out last week.

It was also reported that 204 claimants exhausted their benefits last week, bringing the total number of exhaustion for the year to 4,796. Last year, there were 5,724 exhaustions at this time.

The Bridgeport office continued to head the department's 15 offices in the number of

claims taken, with 2,748. Hartford was next, with 2,303 claims. Other offices with high claims were Waterbury, with 1,644; New Haven, with 1,444; and Danbury, with 1,472.

Army Probing GI Drownings In War Games

PL. Story, Va., May 8 (AP)—An investigation was under way today into the drowning of three GI soldiers yesterday, Army officials said.

A high, wind-driven surf swamped their landing vehicle, an LVT, near the Cape Henry weather station.

Seven other men in two LVT's swamped alongside the beach in rough water survived.

The Army last night identified the victims as Pvt. William B. Turner, 23, Alton, Ill.; Robert H. Tourville, 23, Chateaugay, N. Y.; and Ernest H. Warren, 23, Cropwell, Ala.

A helicopter later spotted Tourville's body on the beach four miles from the scene of the accident, which took place as a convoy of five LVT's was en route to the maintenance area after an assault exercise.

To make their way around a retreating wall of surf, the first and second LVT's were ordered to turn back. The third LVT was ordered to turn back, but the third, carrying the three soldiers, was swamped. The remaining two men in the LVT's were rescued.

Survivors estimated the waves were six to eight feet high when the accident occurred. The assistant surgeon at PL. Story said none of the survivors was seriously injured. He said they were treated for mild cases of shock and exposure and released to their barracks.

The officer in charge of the platoon to which the man on the LVT's were assigned said the route the vehicles were following to the maintenance area was the normal one for them to take.

The investigation into the drownings was ordered by Col. Fred Wood Jr., PL. Story commander.

George to Quit Senate Race

(Continued from Page One)

In taxation matters, George gave up the chairmanship of the Senate Finance Committee to take over the foreign relations post.

George's decision apparently clears the way for the nomination and expected election of former Gov. Herman Talmadge to the post being vacated by the death of 34 years of Senate service.

Talmadge had been expected to contest for the nomination, and there were reports from Georgia that the former governor's rural strength was such as to indicate possible defeat of George in a primary battle.

The decision of George to quit will vacate two important Senate committee assignments on the Democratic side next January.

Sen. Green (R-Ill.) is first in line for chairmanship of the Foreign Relations Committee.

George's departure also will leave open a post on the tax handling Finance Committee now headed by Sen. Byrd (D-W. Va.).

George previously headed the tax committee.

The senator's friends said

George had made no plans beyond completion of his present term.

There have been repeated indications that if he decided not to run again Secretary of State Dulles would be happy to have George in an advisory role.

Some of George's friends thought the decision not to run again might affect George's position on some major foreign policy issues to be considered by Congress.

In the past George has supported foreign aid programs. Earlier this year he announced his opposition to foreign economic aid on the long-range basis suggested by President Eisenhower.

Talmadge had made the foreign aid program an object of attack in pre-primary campaigning.

Opposes Foreign Aid George recently said he was opposed to further proposed American participation in construction of the Aswan Dam in Egypt.

The administration has taken some steps toward participating in the financing of the dam but recently has held off action.

Talmadge, 44, is the son of Georgia's late Gov. Eugene Talmadge who was defeated by George in the 1933 primary when the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt tried to purge George from the Senate as a foe of the New Deal.

George and Talmadge have long political followings in the state and many persons previously have

backed both. To have to take sides in a race between them was a difficult task they wished to avoid if possible.

Talmadge had not announced formally for the Senate, but has said he would have something to say this month. He was not available for comment on the Chronicle story.

The son of a former farmer, George was born Jan. 29, 1878. He attended Mercer University, Macon, Ga., and began a practice of law in Vienna in 1901.

He was first elected to public office, solicitor general, in 1907 and later served on Georgia's court of appeals and supreme court.

In 1922 he was elected to the U. S. Senate to fill the vacancy created by the death of Sen. Thomas E. Watson.

"New Forms, New Laws"

Whatever else Tito is, he represents two special points of view. He is the ruler of one of the world's small nations. And he has that, he happens to have his unique personal record of having been inside one of our time warms, and then of having successfully revolted against its efforts to dominate him and his country.

But perhaps, when he spoke in Paris the other day, he was more a somewhat anguished, modern human being than anything else.

What he said was that "a new world was with modern arms, above all one with atomic weapons, would endanger the very existence of humanity, and all of contemporary culture and civilization."

Therefore, he said, we must seek out "new forms and new laws" to improve world relations.

He appealed to the "responsible men in the world" not to let their "narrow interests obscure the horizons of the future."

He did not elaborate on what "new forms and new laws" the world needs in order to give itself survival and life.

But most of us can do that for him, tentatively, at any rate. We know that the form of international dictatorship which he himself rebelled against, when it came from Moscow, cannot be a form for tomorrow, or for survival for anybody. But we also know, if we think deeply enough, that the form Tito himself served in his revolt—the form of the nation which was too proud and too individualistic to submit itself to any higher international form—does not contain the possibility of world survival either.

We know, too, what laws have nothing of survival in them, and what laws have some chance of survival in them. Only the tentative, provisional, half-hearted, formal, half-enforced laws of the United Nations have the possibility of survival in them.

The form of any international dictatorship is out, and so, also, is the form of extreme nationalism. There must be, for survival, some compromise between the national state and the world-state, some compromise between national privilege and world law. We must have gone as far as we can with the idea that each nation is a complete law unto itself, and we have gone as far as we can with the idea that the nation form is a political success. It does not meet the most elemental of all political needs, which is that we all should live together.

One of the privileges of being in the political position is that you are licensed to hit your target with everything.

It, from the barrage being directed at it by the Democrats recently on the issue of arms spending, the Eisenhower administration gets the idea that it can do nothing that is good, it will have the right idea.

One day this week, the administration was on the congressional gridiron because it was, in its foreign aid program, concentrating too much on the military side of things, and not enough on the economic.
