Israel Claims Arabs Wreck Railroad Line

Jerusalem, May 10 (AP)—The Beerseba-Tel Aviv Railway Line was blown up last night three miles north of Beerseba, an Israeli army spokesman announced today.

The line is an artery of commerce between Israel's Mediterranean coast and the Negev Desert. Beerseba, located about 15 miles west of Jerusalem's frontier and 25 miles east of the Egyptian-held Gaza strip.

The army spokesman said he had no details on the blast.

Three other incidents were reported along the Israeli-Arab frontier, despite cease-fire pledges by N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld obtained in the Middle East pact, issued last month.

The Israelis said automatic fire was directed against a civilian-owned truck on the Kfar Sababiyah-Hakowah road west of the Samaritan Hills last night and tracks led toward the Jordan armistice line nearby. There were no casualties.

An Israeli army spokesman said an Arab infiltrator fired on a patrol south of Jerusalem and was killed in the exchange of shots.

The spokesman said another Israeli patrol drove fire from Jordan territory west of the Samaritan Hills.

The U. S. chairman of the Jordan-Israeli Mixed Armistice Commission reported Israel's cease-fire motion against Jordan for an incident Monday, when an Israeli frontier house was fired on from positions inside Jordan. But the chairman, U. S. Cmdr. Elmer Terrell, declined to support Israel's contention that Jordan forces had violated the armistice by occupying positions in the depopulated area.

Diplomatic sources at U. N. headquarters in New York said Hammarskjöld is advocating a 3-month trial period to see if the cease-fire agreements he negotiated are effective.

If so, he reportedly would favor an attempt to work out a more enduring foundation for peace along the Israeli-Arab borders.

In Damascus, Syrian Premier Said El Ghazzi said he probably will confer next week with heads of Egypt, Jordan and Lebanon. The other Arab states who with Syria gave cease-fire pledges. El Ghazzi said he wants a unified Arab stand on Hammarskjöld's final report to the U. N. Security Council on his mission.

As word of the execution spread in Nicosia, Greek Cypriot shops and business houses began to close in silent protest. By midnight most were tightly shuttered.
Small knots of men gathered in the downtown streets. British police and armored cars kept constant patrol. Women and young girls fled into the Greek Orthodox cathedral to seek refuge from the execution.
Military and police officials witnessed the hangings. Soldiers blocked all approaches a half mile from the prison and searched every person and vehicle heading toward it.
Karamanlis and Demetriou lost their final appeal for executive clemency Tuesday. Later their parents and attorneys appealed in vain to Queen Elizabeth II for clemency.
A Greek Orthodox priest who administered the last sacraments of the Cross last night told the two men met their fate with calm and courage.
Confirmation fact:
The executions were not confirmed officially until about three hours after the men died. The Cyprus government, which had announced in a terse, 18-word communique that the two men had been hanged, later announced that Michael Karasos and Andreas Demetriou took place at the central prison in Nicosia.
The two men were hanged by a gallows erected for the purpose. The bodies had been buried in the prison grounds. The bodies were taken to a public funeral which might have touched off rioting.
The news was not broadcast immediately. It came too late to appear in the morning papers. But word got around in advance that they would take place about dawn today.
Authoritative informants in Washington said that the British Embassy had suggested informally to British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd that postponement of the executions might ease the Cyprus crisis.
Appeals also came from Laborite members of Britain's Parliament. Greek officers and parliamentarians in Cyprus leaders. On the other hand, reliable sources said a number of Cypriot policemen had threatened to quit if the death sentences were not carried out.
Violence flared:

Probers to Ask Wife of Ex-Aide About Nest Egg

Washington, May 10 (AP)—Senate investigators said today they will probe Harry Korbman's wife to explain if she can why his bank deposits were bigger than his acknowledged earnings as an army purchasing official.
Korbman, a former top salesman who lived in Forest Hill, N. Y., expressed uneasiness about his financial affairs last week before the Senate investigations subcommittee yesterday.
He said, however, "my wife held the money on me" and that she explains in part why deposits in her name were bigger than his. He said she had a bank account with \$25,000, compared with his combined assets of \$22,238.22.
The subcommittee is searching for evidence of graft in the handling of contracts for military uniforms by Korbman and an army purchasing officer. He quit that job in 1954, he said.
Korbman testified that "I take part of the responsibility" for what he said was a "maladministration" of some army contracts with the company of Herman Kravitz, garment maker from Atlantic City, N. J.
The Kravitzs have invoked the fifth amendment in refusing to tell the subcommittee why they hired any government officials.
The father and son produced military uniforms under contracts totaling 29 million dollars between 1950 and 1954.
Chairman McClellan and Robert F. Kennedy subcommittee counsel said they are leaving Mrs. Korbman's will about a half million dollars to be paid to her in a lump sum in their hands.
