**Court Upholds Finance Unit on Teachers' Pay** 

Hartford, May 24 (P) - Supe-rior Court Judge Frank J. Covello upheld the Southington Finance Board yesterday in a teachers salary dispute of a year ago. He ruled that the Finance Board's decision to pay teachers in that town \$3,000 to \$4,000 a year was legal. The teachers contended the Finance Board had no right to cut salary money out of the town Board of Education budget re-musts for 105.56 quests for 1955-56.

If the teachers won the court decision, they would have collected about \$200 each in back pay - a cost to the town of about \$21,-000. The Board of Education pro-posed a budget of \$844.805. It would have boosted the teachers pay from \$2,800-\$4,800 to a high of

\$3,200-\$5,000. But the Finance Board trimmed the Board of Education budget to \$793.349. The cut included \$32,705 which the school board set up for teachers salaries. Since the Board of Education had approved of the salary increases, the teachers contended th Board of Finance had ho right cut them out.




