Party in a calculated price paid to the farmer in relation to their costs.

These changes will raise supports from 59 to 63 cents a bushel for oats, from 59 cents to about \$1.00 for barley, from \$1.16 to about \$1.27 for rye, from \$1.80 to about \$1.97 a hundred pounds for grain sorghum, and from an average of about \$1.25 to about \$1.35 for corn outside the commercial area.

A third provision which could be of benefit this year is one adding \$500 million to an existing fund of about \$400 million for support of prices of perishable products, such as eggs, cattle, poultry, eggs, fruits and vegetables. This money may be used to buy and store surplus crops from one year to another.

Benefits of the soil bank will first become available with planting plans for the 1957 year. The bulk of which is needed in September, October and November.

Russell Tongay Termed Insane, Put in Hospital

Railroad, Fla., May 29 (AP)—Russell Tongay, 39, was today termed insane and put in a hospital.

The former Miami swimming instructor, serving 10 years for the death of his 15-year-old "aunt" daughter Kathy, as a homicidal depressive with suicidal tendencies, was committed to the hospital.

Source Judge R. B. Brooks signed the order Wednesday after a sanity hearing suggested by Gov. Warden Dewitt Simons, said by the court.

Tongay, 39, has been a "very troublesome prisoner" since being confined at state prison following his conviction on manslaughter at Miami in 1946.

The two who were imprisoned were S. I. Brogimovich, a former vice commissar of state security, and B. Emeljanov, a former people's commissar for state security in Azerbaijan.

None of these men has been in the public news lately.

The defendants in the trial were accused primarily of extracting false confessions from persons who were actually loyal members of the Communist party and faithful to the Soviet state.

Impenetrable Methods

The charges said that the defendants had used "impenetrable methods" to obtain convictions when they were in power in the oil producing republic and that they acted with Beria and as his accomplices.

Azerbaijan, one of the 16 constituent republics of the U.S.S.R. has a population of about 3,140,000 and an area of 33,440 square miles. Situated in the eastern part of the Trans-Caucasus alongside the Caspian Sea, it lies just across the frontier from the Iranian province of Azerbaijan.

About three-fifths of the republic's people are of the same blood lines as those of the Iranian province. Other nationalities represented are Armenians, Georgians and Abkhazians.

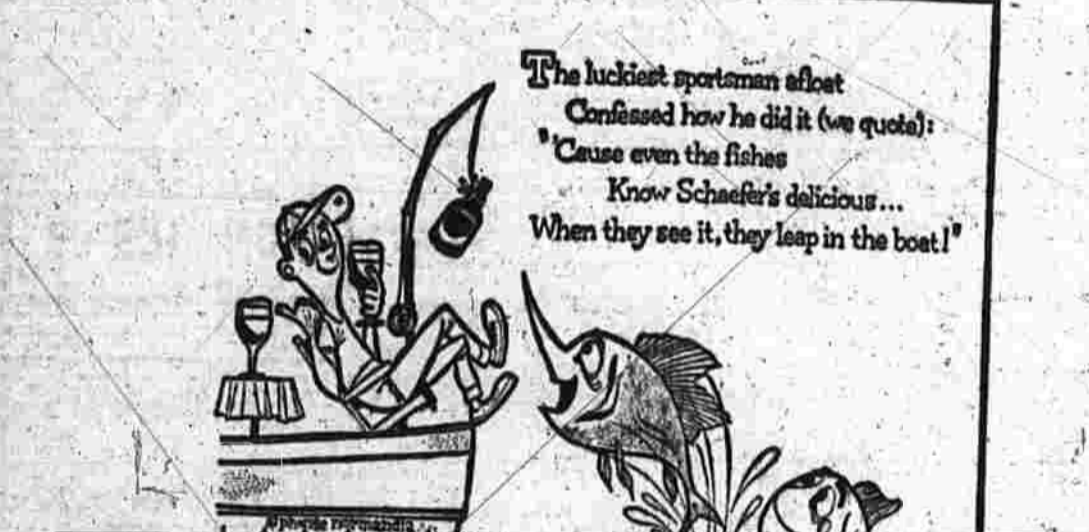
