Baltimore, May 31 (AP)—Maryland's new law publicly barred beaches yesterday for the first time on an unsegregated basis. No incidents were reported.

Negroes availed themselves of the opportunity to use unsegregated bathing facilities in only one of the two areas. However, at Sandy Point State Park on the Chesapeake Bay about 15 miles south of here, what was described as a "handful" of Negroes used a beach which had formerly been reserved for whites only. The beach was divided by a natural land jetty, and in the past one beach was all-white and one all-Negro.

Columbia Impressive Rites Mark Dedication

Columbia, May 31 (Special)—Despite overcast skies a crowd attended the Memorial Day services and the dedication of World War II Memorial and Honor Roll yesterday.

Services were held at both the Center and Old Cemeteries prior to the dedication services at the Green.

The monument, shaped by Quintana's Memorials of New Britain, is inscribed with the names of all Columbia servicemen who served during World War II. The honor of unveiling the memorial was given to Columbia Older Citizens Society, which was formed during World War II by a group of women who kept in constant touch with the local servicemen by letters and packages and even issued a newsletter called the "Olivegreen."

The group was also instrumental in having a woods' honor roll erected at approximately the same spot as the present memorial stands, but like and weather eventually destroyed it.

There are times when we are as good a lawyer as anybody else, or think so, at any rate, and this is one of them. And we are hereby proceeding to file an amendment to the opinion of Attorney General John Bracken, with regard to his interpretation of the new state primary law, section 41, holding that opinion null and void.

The provision of the law in question which, thanks to a Bracken ruling, plunged the state into a hot question of semantics, seems innocent enough, and in our formal opinion, is innocent.

It reads as follows:

"Vacancies in candidacies, if only one candidate has been filed by a person other than a party-endorsed candidate for the nomination by a political party or political public office or for election to a town committee, or if only one state of persons including other party-endorsed candidates has been filed for election as delegates or district delegates to a political party, or if only one candidate has been filed or, as the case may be, each of the persons on such state thereafter, but prior to the opening of the polls, his name from nomination or for any reason, becomes disqualified to hold the office or position for which he is a candidate, his name shall be held, and the party-endorsed candidate or candidates for such office or position shall be deemed to have been lawfully chosen in the manner and to the same extent as is provided in this act in the case where no such candidate has been filed."

Florida Result

The Democratic primary in Florida settled nothing. Stevenson's margin of victory was too small to be convincing. Kefauver's margin of victory was as miraculous, was far short of the run he made in the same state four years ago. If the primary had any real significance, it would seem to be that it sets up a position of deadlock between the two active candidates for the Democratic nomination, with neither able to knock the other out, and another near-draw in the forthcoming California primary would invite somebody else to come along and knock both of them out of the picture.

If inconclusive in its main result, the Florida primary did have some interesting, and continuing, side-effects. Curiously enough, with each candidate trying to tell Florida that the other was a greater lover of the Negro, it turned out to be Stevenson who did well in the Negro vote. Equally curiously, Stevenson also did well in some of the "white" portions of the state, which would seem to indicate some rare faculty for being taken for one thing in one county and another thing in another county. Stevenson also did well enough in the conservative, Republican-minded southern areas where expectation had been that voters might support Kefauver just to make trouble for the Democratic party.

From a such circumstances, theorists in the Stevenson camp are formulating the claim that the Florida primary proves their candidate's ability to appeal to all factions, and thus achieve unity for the Democratic party in the approaching campaign, but it is at best a slim demonstration of unity. The total vote cast in the presidential preference primary was only half the 840,000 votes cast only two weeks ago in the primary to nominate the party candidates for governing Florida.

Lethargy was the big winner in Florida, and perhaps deprecatingly so. Both candidates abandoned themselves there, and both lost.

Good Choice

Part of the strategy of Oregon Douglas McKay back to Oregon was to defeat Senator Wayne Morse, the maverick, in the November election. It may also have been part of the Eisenhower administration strategy to remove from the cabinet a member who had become something of a personal symbol of what the Democrats call a "give-away" policy with regard to our natural resources. McKay's personal behavior, while not extreme, is not the Eisenhower administration's actual policy.

President Eisenhower has now named Fred A. Seaton of Nebraska as his new Secretary of the Interior. The new choice is, by all advance notice, and by his behavior, able, smart, and sane. He will not needlessly irritate the raw side of any issue. He is a politician in the good sense of the word. And he seems, ideologically, much more of a middle of the road man like Eisenhower himself than either of the McKay's.

In the Department of Defense, and then, subsequently, on the President's White House staff, Seaton has gained a reputation for being one of the ablest men in Washington. The President, obviously, is looking for a man who is already close at hand. It seems an excellent choice.
