Knowland Shifts, Raises Ike's Hopes Of Easing Aid Cut

Washington, June 14 (AP)—Democratic leader, Johnson of Texas said today the administration "is in deep trouble" in its bid for the Senate to restore a big part of the House cuts in President Eisenhower's \$4,900,000,000 foreign aid bill.

Johnson told a reporter he had talked to many Democratic Senators and "a substantial majority of them feel a case has not yet been made."

Washington, June 14 (AP)—Support for Senate Republican leader Knowland (Calif.) raised administration hopes today for restoring some of the big cut the House made in President Eisenhower's foreign aid program.

Whether a majority of the Senate Foreign Relations committee would approve the \$500 million minimum increase urged by the White House was uncertain as Chairman George (D-Ga.) called members back into session to start tonight.

George has taken the leadership in a drive to restore \$500 million of the House cuts in aid to a total of \$1,104,000,000 from the \$4,900,000,000 Eisenhower asked, despite protests from both Republican and Democratic leaders in that body.

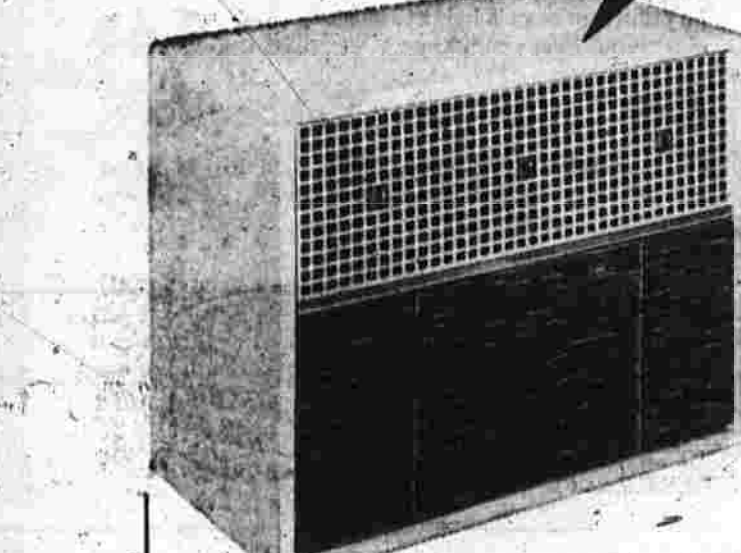

### Bolton Lake Hotel Sued for \$100,000 By Drowning Victim's Family

Bolton, June 14 (Special)—A \$100,000 lawsuit was filed in Hartford Superior Court this week by Mrs. Royal Dupuis against the Bolton Lake Hotel. Basis of the suit is the drowning of the late Royal Dupuis of East Hartford at the lake last July 3.

The suit papers charge that Dupuis' death was caused by the negligence of the hotel owners in failing to warn bathers of a "sharp and precipitous drop" in the bathing area. It is also claimed that the lifeguard was absent from his post on the beach when the drowning occurred.

The estate is represented by the Hartford law firm of Kenny and Kenny.

**Focus-Pocus in Focus**

A mysterious Dulles shot into the blue, and an equally baffling Eisenhower concentration on the theme of more unity for Europe in a Texas speech, are now beginning to come into focus in relationship to the sharpest specific problem faced by western diplomats.

The Dulles shot into the blue was his address, call a few weeks ago, for reconstruction of NATO in "the totality of its being."

Ever since, that suggestion has been floating around, up in the atmosphere, even though NATO, at its subsequent session, appointed "three wise men" to look into ways of bringing it down to reality.

But now, in Washington, things seem to be coming into some sort of focus.

Early this week, two men were in Washington. One was Lester Pearson, Canada's foreign minister, and one of the three NATO "wise men."

The other was Chancellor Adenauer of West Germany, who bears the weight of the impossible policy he and we have been following together on the German problem.

And what idea do you think suddenly came into the Washington air this week?

You won't find this idea in Adenauer's tough speech at Yale, in which he stuck heroically by the losing policy we share with him in which he proclaimed West Germany's intention of remaining no matter what stood in the way. Or you won't find it in any communique from meetings between Dulles and Pearson.

But newsmen with expert noses found it floating around, just the same.

The idea is that NATO should be transformed, away from the primarily military organization it has been to date, toward a political and economic organization.

In this new kind of organization, military strength wouldn't be as important as it used to be, before Russia turned the "polite check, and call it own army."

Therefore, a change could be made in Germany's proposed contribution in this new kind of NATO. Instead of the 500,000 troops West Germany is supposed to provide, West Germany could provide something for the economic side.

Russia, which has proclaimed German rearmament impossible so long as West Germany was going to remain as our military ally, would no longer have any valid reason to refuse rearmament.

Or, to put it bluntly, we would use the NATO and the proposed changes in it as ornate window-dressing for a swap in which we would turn in West German rearmament for German reunification.

This has, of course, always been the only real value of West German rearmament—the value it might have, toward uniting German unity, if we swapped it in. We should have done it long ago when there was no doubt that Russia would have to take it. Now that we are at last considering it, there is some doubt whether Russia will still buy it. But if we do go through this policy change, the burden of responsibility for German unity will no longer be upon us, but upon Russia, and the pressure of world opinion, and German opinion, will no longer be upon us, but upon Russia.

**No Coincidence**

Suddenly, for the first time in several years, copies of the New York Times, an American newspaper, have been placed on display in the lobby of the biggest hotel in the city of Prague, Czechoslovakia.

The first issue which went on display was the issue which contained the text of the Khrushchev speech assailing Stalin.

This could, of course, be an accident in timing, with a decision to lower some of the Iron Curtain around Czechoslovakia, happening to coincide with the date of publication of the Khrushchev speech in the Times.

More logically, however, we would guess that the Communists planned it that way, and that this event is one more indication that the Communists also saw to it, indirectly, that the text originally put into the hands of a Paris newspaper and also into the hands of the American State Department, which released it to the American press.

The Russians themselves could hardly hand out such a supposedly secret document to the world press. But there is every indication they were glad to have us get it, nonetheless, and start circulating it around the world.

At least, they let down the Iron Curtain in Prague just in time to let it in. It is, of course, dynamic, but, after all, dynamite favors the present regime in Russia.

**Short Editorials**

Now is come summer, and with our annual elimination contest. We conduct the contest from our window, and the entrants, all innocent and unknowing, never aware of the fact that they are in a contest, or being eliminated from it, or being advanced close to the winner's spot, are all those who appear on Main St. in a certain and abbreviated mode of dress.

It is really a warm and generous and friendly kind of contest, with some kind of prize for almost everybody. Nobody is ever really eliminated from some kind of consideration. We pass out some awards, mentally, daily, and some weekly, and some more at the end of the season. Nobody in shorts is short, ever goes short.

If our mental awards are numerous and frequent, so also, are our standards for these awards diverse and variable. We hope we have some aesthetic component in us, as well as a recognition that everybody's highest values are not our own highest values. So we take some care not to award every prize on the basis of size alone. Square yards of fabric is not, we tell ourselves repeatedly, everything, even though it may obscure everything that happens to fascinate us. It is a case where a judge has to be broadminded, and take the stern view toward his own particular foibles.

But, for all these painful rigors there is, if the judge performs his summer task creditably, an ample reward. Posterity will assure him some day.

**Anna Kroos' Day**

Perhaps in every life there is a race on every level, a race of strength and penalty for weakness, with the world keeping book on the race, and marking down its own plus and minus judgments. But one Anna M. Kroos, Commissioner of Correction of the City of New York, is a rather unique experience the other day. She received a most handsome plus, and a most jolting minus on one and the same day—the virtues and her limitations apparently both reaping their reward almost simultaneously.

On that day, she stood proudly on the platform at the commencement exercises of New York University, and received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

Part of the citation read: "The epic of America is written most fervently in the lives of those who, bare-handedly have lifted themselves from humble obscurity to high achievement in the creation of greater opportunity for others. The career of Anna Kroos is a shining example of this."

And the citation went on to note her career, as a lawyer, as a judge, as a City Commissioner of Correction, with the final notation that "her contributions to the administration of justice, and to the conservation of youth through juvenile crime prevention, are commensurate in the award of the doctorate of Laws."

On this same day, a three man committee from a New York City grand jury, which had been looking into conditions in the New York City Department of Correction for two years, called on Mayor Wagner, and after reporting to him, issued the following statement to the press:

**Connecticut Yankee**

In its plans with regard to Governor Ribicoff's campaign against speeding, the proposed Republican state platform for 1956 carries its negative hand, raising the question of whether it is not more interesting in running against Ribicoff and anything he does than in running for the state of Connecticut.

The natural political instinct of the candidate for office is to give the cold shoulder to the positive things the opposition may be doing, and to save one's own positive stroke for fields in which the opposition is not dominating the headlines. It is a very natural instinct, from which no party or candidate is immune. Therefore, it is not strange at all that the Republican strategists should wind up picking at the Governor's safety program, rather than endorsing it. To endorse it might have been real smart, but that kind of unorthodox political intelligence is reserved only to a few public life, and seldom to any mass political organization.

 Washington, June 14 (AP)—Like a tailor who thinks the suit is too big, Secretary of State Dulles walked briskly up to the subject of neutrality and sent only one line of this neutrality stuff for him.

"Immoral," he said. "Short-sighted." But this suit had been made by President Eisenhower. And Vice President Nixon put the pockets in it. Eisenhower had defended the right of nations to be neutral. Nixon said such nations are "our moral equals."

On June 14, a few hours before the House started debate on Eisenhower's \$4,960,000 foreign aid bill, the President walked into his news conference and made a little speech defending the bill. He used no notes.

"This was startling. The United States had spent much time and money trying to persuade nations in Europe and Asia to join military pacts with this country. Was Eisenhower now saying that they were wrong when they joined?"

"But Dulles didn't show any tolerance for neutrals when he made a prepared speech in Iowa on June 9. He said the 42 treaties this country has with other nations...

### British Red Chief On Trip to Russia

London, June 14 (AP)—The new chief of the British Communist party has gone to Moscow, apparently to get instructions on selling the new anti-Stalin line to reluctant British Reds.

A spokesman said Secretary General John Gollan left for Moscow two weeks ago, not long after he replaced veteran Harry Pollitt as leader of the British Communists.

The British party has only about 30,000 members but is strongly entrenched in such key labor organizations as the engineering and dockers unions.

### Morocco Jewish Emigration Halted

Jerusalem, June 14 (AP)—The North African immigrant ship that has been carrying Moroccan Jews from Morocco to Israel, was halted today by the Israeli government.

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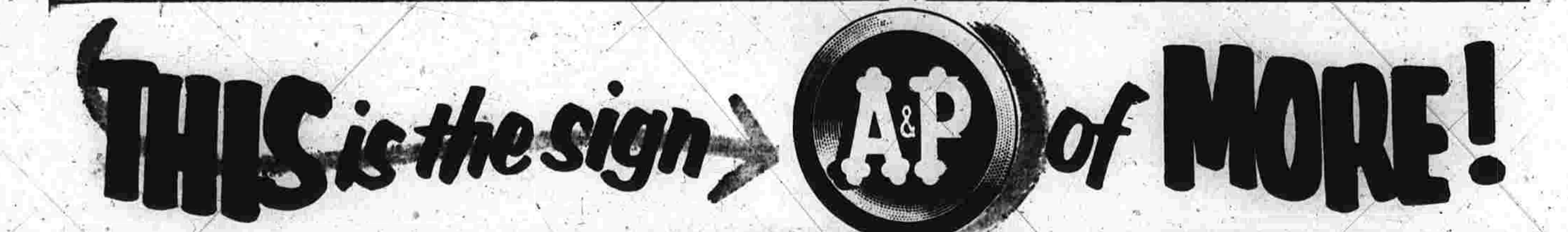

mission to expunge from its record a finding of the new-entrant Loyalty Review Board that there was reasonable doubt as to service loyalty.

Lake Judge Church, the Appellate Court, cited the Supreme Court's decision in 1955 in the case of the late Dr. John Peters, Yale medical professor. In that decision, the High Court held that the Loyalty Review Board had no right, on its own motion, to reopen a case where a government employee had been cleared by a lower loyalty board.

PUC Grants Silver Lane Rate Raise

Rate increases petitioned for by the Silver Lane Bus Line, Inc., have received partial approval by the Public Utilities Commission.

Edward H. Royce, president-treasurer of the bus line, said today he did not know when the new rates would go into effect, but said he "hoped they could be July 1."

Only one part of the petition, requesting a change in the western-ly zone limit, was denied by the bus line. Four other requests received approval.

The line has been given authority to increase its schedule of fares from 10 cents in each of its two fare zones to 15 cents cash, or one cent more if paid at the rate of four tokens for 50 cents.

Also, the line has received approval to increase its ticket rate of fare on its special Pratt and Whitney trips from 24 zone rides for \$2.00 to 20 zone rides for \$1.50.

The commission, composed of Eugene A. Longley, chairman, B. Strong and Basil P. Fitzpatrick, which received the petition June 10 and held an open hearing on the matter, said it will give its approval in a meeting held at the State Office Building in Hartford yesterday.

In three-page findings, stated that the company has maintained a loss of \$4,000 in a five-year period from 1951-1955. In only one of these years did the company show an operating profit—in 1954 its operating income was slightly above \$1,000.

Royce estimated that without relief operations for the year 1956 would result in an operating loss of over \$12,000, due to a change in the present zone limit to Oak St. in its accommodation of the company's patrons who live in a new residential area. Oak St. is about 500 feet east of the present eastern zone limit at Charlie's Stand, and many of these patrons now must walk the short distance in order to avoid payment of a second fare.

Royce was ordered in the finding to adopt a tolling system and a rate of which will avoid confusion with that of the Connecticut Bus Company.

This is the second rate increase requested by the local bus company within a year that has received approval from the commission.

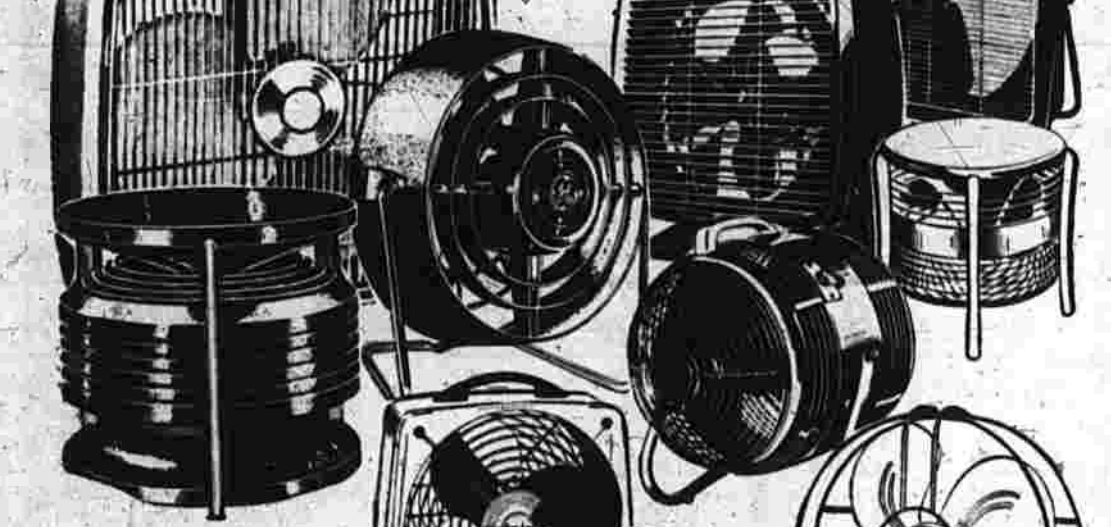
