There, unaccountably, they are as stubborn as they were yielding in India, and Burma, and Egypt. There, they proclaim, they will stay.

And who will they stay there? On all the state's super highways, where the opposing traffic lanes are not completely separated. The particular accident, which spurred action on this Manchester half mile was a cross-espandane accident, in which one car was in the left lane, and another crossed into the opposite traffic lane, with a head-on collision in which each car had one fatality.

The principal cure the state now proposes for this type of accident, on this particular half mile of super highway, is the construction of a center guide rail, substantial enough to turn back the automobile while leaving its own lane before it reaches opposing traffic.

This is a sound cure. It is exactly what should be done. But the danger of the cross-espandane accident is in no way limited to this particular half mile. After this particular cross-espandane accident at this location on May 6, the next serious accident of the same type happened on June 4, a way down on the Merritt Parkway in Trumbull. There, too, one car went unaccountably out of control, and created a head-on collision in the opposing traffic lane.

It would seem that the danger of the cross-espandane accident may be somewhat greater on curves, and also somewhat greater when the espandane happens to be a relatively narrow, as it is on the Manchester half mile in question. But, at the least, there are many miles on the state's existing super highway system, where the center guide rail should be considered a safety necessity, and it may be that there should also be such a rail on the new Connecticut Turnpike now being constructed.

The other principal measure ordered for the Manchester half mile is the installation of lighting. This is designed to combat some of the perils arising from a complex of exits and entrances on a curved section of super highway, and there seems no doubt that it will promote safety at this particular location during the night hours because it will be unusual, and cause motorists to slow down a bit just because it is a different condition. Perhaps the peculiar dangers of this particular location deserve such an expense. We would guess that they do. But we point out, also, that lighting, must, for reasons of expense, be only a limited or localized cure for highway dangers.

Finally, we would observe that we doubt that highway safety has been served on the Wilbur Cross Highway by the recent increase in the speed limit to 55 miles an hour. It has how become, on weekends, an instant stretch of highway.

For the special cures for the particular Manchester half mile, we are grateful. We are sure they will, over the years, save lives. But the problem of the cross-over accident, and the problem of the speed, are not problems limited to any particular half mile of the state's super highway system. As for the cross-espandane accident, it is to be hoped that once the state sees the new center guide rail installed on this half mile, it will realize it is the exact thing which is needed on many other miles.

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U.S. Air Force 'Desert Rats'

Dig in at New French Base

Chambly, France, June 16 (AP)—It's not quite like home, but the "Desert Rats" of the U.S. Air Force have dug into new surroundings with a will.

The 21st Fighter-Bomber Group took the name "Desert Rats" after it was activated at George Air Force Base, Calif. Now the whole unit has moved to a base built on farm land 200 miles east of Paris, near the World War I battlefield at Verdun.

**Birch Trees Hit By Destructive Insect Parasite**

Stamford, June 15 (AP)—An entomologist for a private laboratory here reported today that birch trees throughout the north east are suffering under the worst attack of the birch leaf miner ever recorded.

Birch leaves turn brown after their inner tissue is chewed by the insect.

Edward J. Duda of the Bartlett Tree Research Laboratories, said the birch leaf miner infestation was bad last year "but it is far worse and much more extensive this year. The insect has built up to an enormous, destructive population."

The recently developed practice of planting birches as lawn trees and the late spring of this year are two reasons for the severe attack, Duda said.

He explained that birches growing in the shade, among other trees can withstand minor attacks better than those in an exposed position on a lawn because the insect prefers full sunlight.

The late spring, Duda added, threw the sprouting caterpillars of many home owners out of their

**12,000 Acres Burn In National Forest**

Holbrook, Ariz., June 12 (AP)—A massive fire—a mile and a half wide and nine miles long—continued to tear through the Sitgreaves National Forest early today after destroying an estimated 12,000 acres of timber and brush.

The Forest Service said it could make no estimate of when the huge blaze might be controlled. A dispatch center near Holbrook said winds had shifted to between six and eight miles an hour late last night, but that the fire was still advancing swiftly.

Winds of up to 40 miles an hour had pushed the vast "wall" of flames through the forest earlier yesterday. The fire was about 40 miles long and 1 1/2 miles wide.

The dispatch center said a lookout station (L-1) had been reported in imminent danger last night appeared to be safe at least temporarily.

same traditions, the same inspirations, the same loyalties. It is not only the form is altered. The essence—the character, the ideals, the objectives, the traditions, the spirit of Manchester High School will remain the same. It is only a change in form—in environment, not in substance.

You graduate from high school at an exciting time. The impact and challenge of atomic power, our day—power both for construction and destruction—has radically altered not only our concepts of military defense and offense but the order of our daily life. It offers not only prospects of sudden horrible death and devastation but prospects of heretofore undreamed-of potentialities for good.

You go out into a world rapidly changing in size through the marvels of modern aviation, mark your progress and rapid travel for the dropping of the instruments of war.

You are going into a world which is engaged in a struggle between basically antagonistic philosophical concepts. Youth which has accepted, lived with and improved the world. It is a world in which all men, ideas, property and rights are subject to a world still divided into armed camps where the latest headline from the Kremlin may be quickly reflected in an increase or reduction in the selective service quota for Manchester.

Into a tense world where international security and national aspirations for independence and self-determination are in daily conflict—where the latest bomb-throwing in Cyprus, riot in Singapore, massacre in Morocco or border incident in the Gaza strip is a matter of consequence in the life of each one of us.

But it is also a world improving along more peaceful lines. New and more powerful miracle drugs with less pronounced names are daily improving the lot and life of the sick and disabled. Giant dams and irrigation systems give us additional power and reclaim millions of acres of waste lands. Fuels, bright and flourescences, and similar plants for the exchange of students and ideas and cultures are working slowly towards a better, international understanding. The United Nations has survived the pangs of birth, the crisis of war in Korea and the frequent Soviet veto. As a nation we are deeply concerned with the problem of segregation and the implementation of our proud declaration that "all men are created equal." Technological advancements are constantly improving our industrial processes and increasing the productivity of our people and our machines. Our shortened work hours give added time for leisure and self-improvement. We are aware as never before of the problems which face us in every community in the nation to expand and improve our educational and recreational resources and facilities.

So, first you must decide where you want to go. If you intend to give some direction to your life, I do not mean that you must at this point select some particular specific job or profession or determine the minute details of your career, but at least set some purpose, some aim, some goal toward which you will work. You must make a decision whether you will just drift with the tide, shift your job to job, aim only for security and rely on Social Security and old age pensions to cushion your later years, or whether you will set a goal and chart a course for your life, make it meaningful and purposeful.

Next, it would urge you to keep fresh the intellectual curiosity which other schools and colleges. This is a source of pride and satisfaction in your school, and your families and should be to you. Now that you have this opportunity, use it with the intent to succeed which comes with your more mature years.

**CB Rents Weave Mills To UAC for Storage**

Cheney Bros. has leased its 100,000 square foot weaving mill group to United Aircraft Corp. for a 5-year period at a total rental of \$470,000.

The lease, which involves three mills and connecting buildings and 4.9 acres of land on which they are located, is said to be the largest ever negotiated by Cheney Bros.

The local textile firm and UAC signed the lease today and it became effective July 1. Signing of the lease was announced by Raymond Gooley, Cheney Bros. custodian of property.

Under the terms of the lease UAC will pay an annual rental of \$134,070.60 for the 223,466 square feet contained in the six mill group which were built over a period of years extending before the turn of the century.

The mill group, located on the northeast corner of Forest and Elm Sts., is among the real estate properties that will remain under the control of J. P. Stevens and Co., which holds virtually all of Cheney Bros. stock.

Cheney Bros. operating facilities were sold to Lafayette Industries, Inc., in a deal that was signed last week. The deal was the result of a sale of the company's assets to UAC at the end of this month.

According to a UAC spokesman, the mill property will be used for storage and manufacturing. It is not known at present, he said, how many will be employed there.

Today's lease is about four times as large as the one that had previously been the largest ever negotiated by Cheney Bros. The mill also involved UAC providing the aircraft company with 80,000 square feet of space in the spinning mill for four years.

The three mills and connecting buildings, which include office space, were erected at various times starting in 1886, when the first mill went into operation. The second mill was erected in 1887 and the third in 1901. Connecting buildings were added in 1904 and 1908, and in 1907 the last addition, an office building, was built.

Cheney Bros. had always used the mills for weaving and throwing operations. The time they were taken over in April 1955, the mills were being used for the

### Cain Implies Ike Fails To Grasp Security Plan

Washington, June 15 (AP)—Harold P. Cain, after 18 months of attack on President Eisenhower's security program, has finally said that the President himself is responsible for the program's failure.

Cain, after a talk with Eisenhower, made a statement which can be interpreted as implying the President doesn't understand his own program for getting rid of the government's "security risks."

"I think Acheson Without Facts," Eisenhower had indicated previously he does understand it. Cain has said he thinks Eisenhower's aides don't tell him about details of the program.

Cain, former Republican Senator from Washington, has the opposite of most Republicans who hold their tongues when they disagree with Eisenhower.

Republicans have tried to make political capital out of the program ever since Eisenhower was elected in 1953. They have charged how many "security risks" were ousted. Cain has been attacking it for 18 months as unfair to individuals.

This gives aid and comfort to the Democrats' charges that the security program is a "numbers game."

When Cain himself had said Democrats say that without distinction it lumps the disloyal with the gossipy and drunkards as "security risks."

This is also unusual because Cain's job is in jeopardy. After he failed to get re-elected in 1952, Eisenhower appointed him to the Subversive Activities Control Board. His term expires in August. Unless reappointed by Eisenhower, he's out. He says he expects to be dropped because of his attacks on the security program. At his own request, Cain talked with Eisenhower at the White House about the program last week.

His next speaking before a Senate Judiciary subcommittee on constitutional rights. Cain talked of his conversation with Eisenhower, something which is also unusual in Washington. He said: "The President evidenced a deep concern and interest when I suggested that matters relating to security should be separated from loyalty and that suitability should be the basis for security clearance."

Truman had Double Program  
The background program for what followed next:

"President Truman had a double program. One for getting rid of the disloyal, the other for keeping people who were 'trikes' in the job they held. If fired from a department head, they could appeal to a Loyalty Review Board which might override their boss."

Eisenhower scrapped this dual program in 1953 for one which made no distinction between a man considered disloyal or one who might be a "risk" because he drank or talked too much. All were listed under "security risk."

And Eisenhower abolished the review board. Now a department head has the final say on firing. Cain has protested that too often a man is fired without a fair chance to be heard or even without fair consideration.

Cain told the subcommittee, "The President had thought that a clear distinction was being made between 'loyalty cases and security cases.' That could be variously interpreted."

"I think Eisenhower, who ordered and signed the security program, hadn't read it or didn't understand it. It didn't read the newspapers which for three years have been full of articles and editorials on the arguments over loyalty and security. It had been heard by the Democrats who were habitually trying to mislead the public by hating drunks and the disloyal under one heading to make them all look equally subversive."

Eisenhower told a news conference on Jan. 27, 1954, that his administration "didn't want to charge anyone with disloyalty. Subversive activity unless it could be proved in court. He said he doubted any real breakdown separating disloyal from risks could be provided."

Hill Soviet Worship

Prague radio disclosed that Vice Premier Václav Kopecky had turned down the student demands in a speech at a Communist party conference.

The broadcast said Kopecky also rejected student demands for withdrawal of Marxist-Leninist lectures from the curriculum of universities.

Students Seen Persistent  
Observers in Vienna believe Czech students—who are freebreds by tradition—will not give up their campaign. They think this might lead to serious student unrest.

In explaining his rejection of the demands, Kopecky said "academic freedom and freedom of education would make possible the spreading of bourgeois reactions."

If this happened, he declared, Czech universities would have to be run on a different system and by a different center.

Kopecky promised, however, that the government would study closely all the students' demands which aimed "at the improvement

### Italy Rejects Russian Plan On Arms Cut

Rome, June 15 (AP)—Italy today diplomatically rejected the Soviet Union's latest disarmament proposal.

After a cabinet consultation on a recent personal letter to Premier Antonio Segni from Soviet Premier Nikhola Bulganin, a spokesman announced:
