as long as the Communists continue on their present line. Talks are being held at Geneva between U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn J. Parsons and Red Chinese envoy Wang Ping-tan. They have been concerned recently with the question of the communication of force. Periodically Johnson has prodded Wang to get the Reds to release the Americans remaining in China.

The Reds have argued that not all Chinese in the United States are free to go home. The State Department says all of them are.

On the question of Formosa, the Red Chinese proposed last Dec. 1 a draft agreement under which both sides to general terms would renounce force.

The United States termed this unsatisfactory on the ground that it lacked a binding application to the Formosa issue. The United States proposed wording that would make it apply specifically to "the Taiwan (Formosa) area or elsewhere." Another proposed amendment stated the agreement would not prejudice "the pursuit by each side of its policies by peaceful means or its inherent right of individual or collective self-defense."

This language was designed to recognize Red China's right to continue to try to gain control of Formosa by means short of war, and the rights of the United States and Nationalist China to use force if an attack did occur.

The Reds have disputed any American right to be in Formosa at all. They contend that the Formosa problem is a domestic Chinese one.

Widow of Flier Sets Scholarship

Bridgeport, June 13 (AP) — The widow of a Stratford pilot killed in an Oklahoma airplane crash has given the University of Bridgeport \$4,000 to establish an engineering scholarship in his memory, the university announced today.

John F. McBride, a submarine sailor during World War II who learned to fly in 1950, was not himself an engineer, but "had a profound appreciation" of the value of engineering, said the announcement.

McBride was co-pilot of a private plane owned by the Great Lakes Carbon Co. when it crashed on Oct. 3 last year. He was killed along with the Pilot, J. Warren Whitney of Stratford, and Mr. and Mrs. George Skakel Sr. of Greenwich. Skakel was board chairman and founder of Great Lakes Carbon.

McBride's widow is the former Gladys Allen of Detroit.

UAW Aide Pushes Civil Rights Plank

Grand Rapids, Mich., June 13 (AP) — The official of the United Auto Workers Union wants organizers to help draw up a civil rights plank that would result in Southern Segregationists leaving the Democratic party.

Ronil Massey, UAW secretary-treasurer, addressing the annual Michigan CIO Convention yesterday, said "the Democrats can't have us and the solid South too."

He criticized Republican and Democratic leaders whom he said are reluctant to oppose politicians who are blocking moves toward integration in Southern schools.

"At the Democratic convention I hope we can mobilize sufficient strength to get a civil rights plank that will drive the (dem) plank out of the Democratic Party," he said. "Let the Republicans have them. Let's have a Democratic party based on a liberal, progressive program."

An employee suspected of being a Communist, but in a job where it might make no demonstrable difference if he were a Communist, could still be fired. The Court points out, but not upon the process set up by the 1950 law.

A good many of the "security risks" chased off government payrolls under the 1950 law were jobs not of a "sensitive" character, so some of them may be using for back pay.

Here, in this instance, reading the particular law in question, the Supreme Court finds that there is no demonstrable danger to the country if a Communist holds a government job, providing the job is not important, or located where it might give the Communist important opportunities to steal something of influence policy.

This is government employment on a part-time basis. The Court is talking about, too.

Last week, this same Court, in a different case, by a different vote, and by interpretation of a different law, held that a private employer out in California had a right to fire an employee who was a Communist.

It did this over the protest of its own dissenting minority that this was a destruction of the First Amendment if there ever was one.

But we do not pretend to examine or judge the law involved. We assume that the Court is sound and right in both instances, the one finding that the government has no right to fire from any job just because somebody may be a Communist, the other finding that a private employer does have that right.

Government regulation is necessary because a public utility is usually a monopoly, which has the public at its mercy. In return for the privilege of possessing this monopoly, government imposes on the public utility certain standards of service, and certain limitations on the rates that can be charged.

The control of rates varies in different kinds of utilities. Sometimes, the individual customer can be required to pay the exact cost of supplying whatever service is involved to him, as an individual.

More often, utilities are given blanket rates, in which the same rate of charge is made to all customers, whether the particular expense of service to one customer is as an individual. Railroads are in such a case. It is obvious that they make more money on some routes than on others, and obviously that losses on some have to be compensated for by profits on others.

This brings us down to the question of the Hartford-Boston passenger service. The railroad claims it is a losing proposition, which it must abandon.

By that same logic, of course, the entire railroad would have been shut down a few months ago, when it was proclaimed to be operating completely in the red.

By that same logic, no train would ever depart from any station unless it had a guaranteed paying load aboard.

Two Rulings

Once again, the highest court in the land has demonstrated what seems to be its 1956 talent for confounding the poor layman, who never seems to follow the intricacies of the law, but who still thinks he knows when the court heads one way and then the other.

The latest decision from the Supreme Court holds that President Eisenhower violated the 1950 law setting up a security program for federal employees when he gave an executive order extending it to employees whose actual government jobs were not positively connected with "the national safety."

small Swiss suburb east of the French border. A few years ago Indochinese rebel leader Ho Chi-minh made the first disclosure of detailed conditions for a cease-fire in Indochina in a similar interview with the same correspondent. Abbas outlined a 10-point program for creation of a "free Algeria" which included:

1. Recognition of the independence of the people.
2. Formation of a temporary government in Algeria in consultation with the liberation council to be guaranteed and controlled during a period of transition by international commission.
3. General elections under international control.
4. The French rule Algeria as an integral part of France and have formally opposed Nationalist demands for complete independence.
5. Moltet for Equality.
6. French Premier Guy Mollet last Sunday declared the rebellion territory must become neither an Arab state nor a French province. He told his Socialist party Congress everyone in Algeria must be granted equality and Algerians must be given the same rights with Metropolitan France.
7. Mollet also said negotiations must be held with representatives who are actually able to speak for the Algerian people and that the best way to determine them is through free elections.
8. France and Morocco refused flatly to consider negotiations on Algeria through any international representatives, maintaining that such action would infringe on French internal affairs.
9. Outlining his conditions for peace talks, Abbas said: "Following general elections, the elected representatives would draft a constitution in full freedom and would also conclude an agreement without pressure about cooperation with France."
10. He declared the Liberation Council is "backed by the whole people" and "aided an armistice."
