On the other hand, the President's decision against sending any group might mean that Eisenhower has decided to stay in the presidential race.

Hagerty said in response to questions last week that Eisenhower had not discussed politics or his personal political future with any member of the White House staff. Asked today whether that still was the case, Hagerty replied: "Yes."

A reporter noted that Eisenhower has had several private conferences with his chief aide, Sherman Adams. He asked today whether Hagerty was able to say that in no instance had politics been discussed at such sessions.

"Yes, I am," Hagerty replied. "There hasn't been any discussion."

Hagerty noted that Vice President Nixon is the only visitor Eisenhower has had outside of his personal and official family and Chancellor Adenauer.

The press secretary reminded newsmen that Nixon said categorically on Monday that and Eisenhower talked no politics what ever, Hagerty added with a smile that Eisenhower did not discuss his political future with Adenauer. Hagerty made public a note of thanks from Eisenhower to the Senate for a resolution the Senate adopted last week expressing hope for the President's speedy recovery.

On the medical side, the President's doctors took satisfaction from the fact he has stopped losing weight.

The physicians who disclosed yesterday that Eisenhower will be kept in Walter Reed hospital at least a few days longer than was estimated at the time he underwent intestinal surgery, said in this morning's medical bulletin that he continued to "progress very satisfactorily."

The bulletin mentioned that Eisenhower's weight before breakfast was 162 pounds, the same as yesterday and down seven pounds from his weight when he was hospitalized June 8.

Hagerty said the physicians do not expect the patient's weight to start back up for a few more days.

"They look on it as quite satisfactory that he isn't losing weight now," Hagerty said.

There still was no detailed explanation of the decision to keep Eisenhower in the hospital at least until the middle of next week, but the doctors in telling newsmen about the new schedule yesterday emphasized that the first estimate was only an approximation. On that timetable he would have been released around the coming week-end.

Today's first bulletin said: "The President had a good night. He slept with but few interruptions for almost eight hours."

"His temperature is 98.6, pulse 76, blood pressure 120 over 70 and respiration 18—all of which are normal."

"The President's weight before breakfast was 162 pounds."

"He had the same breakfast this morning as he had the last two days, two soft boiled eggs, slice of whole wheat toast with honey, skim milk, and a cup of tea."

"His condition continues to progress very satisfactorily."



Maneuvering for common sense.

The most painful part of watching the official policy of nations is that of waiting for common sense to emerge.

Even after the fact, it has taken over, behind the scenes, and behind the scenes, and behind the scenes.

There are so many complications upon us, upon our consciences, upon our West Germany, to change the dead and policy to have been pursuing for the past six years.

There can be two explanations for this. The first could be that we are actually still locked into the old policy, with no idea of how to move out of it.

The second could be that we know that we have to move, and are preparing to move, but have to be coy, methodical, and cute about it.

On this second theory, perhaps the first small official crack in the facade of morality on the issue of Germany has come in the official message sent, for President Eisenhower, to President Hruschov.

The message was really to Russia, saying that "the ending of the division of Germany is essential to the development of friendly and cooperative relations between the Western nations and the Soviet Union."

"I am convinced that the Soviet Union will come to recognize that it is in its own interest to negotiate a settlement which respects the right to freedom of the German people and the interests of both East and West, and will join with us in finding a solution to the German problem."

Just how would President Eisenhower, in a conference with the Russians, persuade them that the remaining of Western Germany as an ally of the West against the East was something which respects the interests of both East and West?

How do you persuade Russia that Russia is not a threat to the West against Russia?

The answer is that you don't. And that, therefore, the reference to the Eisenhower letter, to a settlement, which respects the interests of both East and West, means that, at last, we may be beginning to try to sell Russia something a little easier to sell, like a swap of German divisions, which are no longer much good to anybody anyway, even if we ever do get them, for German unity which is an aching historical need.

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Rockville

Rockville, June 20 (Special) - The Board of Selectmen met last night with Rosa V. Urquhart of Ellington to discuss with him a plan whereby both the town and Urquhart would have use of the County Home property in Vernon.

The town's bid of \$46,000 has been accepted by the County Commissioners pending approval by townpeople and the Board of Finance. The site is being sought as a possible future elementary school location. Urquhart bid \$100,000 for the property but the town, but the commissioners accepted the town's bid because of past considerations by the town toward the county.

Urquhart is seeking to purchase the County Home building itself, reportedly for renovation into a convalescent home. Some time ago he offered to purchase the entire tract and lease to the town the acreage behind the home for school purposes and also to lease to the town the small school building on the property.

Last week, the Selectmen indicated they would negotiate with Urquhart where the town would buy the entire tract and sell the home building and a portion of land around it to Urquhart.

The decision to take this course was made when the Board of Finance learned through the State Highway Dept. that the town had imported into Japan.

So an artificial wall, in which each country fronts on the import of the things the other makes most cheaply, and perhaps even makes best, keeps the Japanese from expanding into the American automobile industry from expanding into Japan.

If we started to solve this minor little problem, along obvious lines, we might, however, find ourselves forced to solve a few big problems as a preliminary.

We might even have to abolish war. For if we were to go to Japan and ask why Japan insists on making automobiles, when we can do it better and cheaper, we might find somebody else with us who has the answer that Japan has to have an automobile industry set up so it can possess it as a back-bone for making tanks and airplane motors in case of war. And if we were to press the American automobile industry, we would get an answer that it is vital for a nation like ours to retain its own blouse making machinery and labor in case a war should shut us off from overseas supplies.

So we would find that before we could have Japan make all the blouses and the United States make all the automobiles we would have to abolish war in the world, and bring that off we might find Japan conquering China with tanks made in automobile factories as Japan can force China to buy more blouses. That is something of what we mean when we say we are glad we will never really have the chance to sit down and start reorganizing the world, even on a minor matter like putting three items on a financial page together to a logical conclusion.

Tuesday Sky Full Of Grace: There are days when nature hard at work, driving for one purpose or another. It may be to set a heat record, or to reverse a heat record, or to make a picture, or to bring rain, to flood the fields one day, and wind, to drought them the next. It may be to soothe and lull the landscape, or to burn it. Or it may, on some particular day, just be setting the stage, making the preparations for one of these strong and definite purposes. And occasionally even nature itself is inductive, aimless, and guessing, like a human being.

Then, once in a second quarter moon, there comes a single day in which nature goes serene, and light-hearted and spends that whole day with just one rather direct thought in mind, the thought of making a picture. Suddenly, seemingly from nowhere, an endless futility of pure white clouds is set sailing, so long and endless it seems to be circling the whole world and coming past again. They brush and wash the blue cleaner and cleaner as they pass. Their movement is so uniform, with each small shallop moving as swift as a slow, that the greatest galleon, that it seems almost no movement at all, but a picture.

And that is all nature is doing on such a day. It is in this quiet moon, was Tuesday - making a picture. And even though it had direct, driving purpose, this making of a picture and caring no portent to praise or fear, it must be accepted some slight taint of utility in the department of freshening human life and recharging human spirits, the function of pure art.







Columbia Meeting Takes Steps Needed To Acquire Land Near Beach

Columbia, June 20 (Special)—A series of motions were voted at a special Town Meeting last night to pave the way for the town to purchase a small strip of land adjoining the Columbia Community Beach.

The beach, formerly the old turnpike across the lake, reverted to property owners on either side of the turnpike when it was closed. The owners gave the land to the town.

Columbia, unable to operate a private beach, leased the land to the Columbia Recreation Council for \$1 a year. This group operates the beach for town residents, taxpayers, and their guests.

Last night the Council proposed to add a 128 by 125-foot strip of land owned by T. A. Loughrey to the beach. The strip runs along the waterfront on the east side of the beach.


In order to do this, the 150 townspeople who attended the meeting voted to purchase the land; to seek legal advice to determine if it can be maintained as a community affair or to initiate prohibitory proceedings; to instruct the Selectmen to enter a bill in the next session of the Council asking that the town be granted this right and to contact Loughrey for an option on the property; and to empower the Selectmen to borrow not more than \$1,000 for the purchase.

Proposed Carlyle-Johnson Machine Co. Factory



This is the architect's drawing of the new factory Carlyle-Johnson Machine Co. proposes to build on the Wilbur Cross Highway at Slater St. The 35,000 square-foot plant, which will be erected within the next few years, will cost an estimated \$400,000. The Town Planning Commission Monday night approved a zone change for 18 acres on the highway, paving the way for the plant's construction.

The French were said to want a "No Man's Land" along the frontier, with villages evacuated and planes constantly patrolling to halt infiltration. The Moroccan "Army of Liberation," which actively fought the French last autumn, still has headquarters near the Algerian line.

The French claimed 50 guerrillas were killed in one battle southwest of Tebeza, near the Tunisian border. Helicopter-borne paratroopers intercepted the Arabs in stony gorges of the Nemoucha Mountains, an Army spokesman said. The rebels were believed bringing arms from Libya.

Warplanes, tanks and missiles were reported still battling another rebel band near the frontier of Morocco, 25 miles west of Ouarzazate. The French said their objective was a bitterly defended Nationalist command post.

As usual, the French admitted only light losses in all operations. The French meanwhile braced themselves for reprisals for the guillotining yesterday of two Nationalists, one convicted of murdering a French guard and the other of participating in a rebel raid on a farm. They were the first of 60 or 70 rebels under death sentence to be executed since the start of the 15-month-old Nationalist uprising.

Strong reaction was expected also in France, where Latiteau—traditionally opposed to capital punishment—considered rebel acts of murder and arson to be political rather than common crimes.

In New York, the U.N. Security Council scheduled a session to improve to consider a demand for debate on the Algerian conflict. The debate is sought by 13 Arab and African countries, but France's U.N. delegation is confident of keeping the issue of the council's agenda.

France considers the rebellion an internal affair which does not concern the U.N. Its delegation walked out of the U.N. General Assembly last fall when the Assembly voted to consider the Algerian problem. The French stayed out until the matter was dropped without debate.

The students, all members of the University's United Religious Work group, planned to Switzerland from where they will go by land to Iran. A feature of the trip will be a 10-day stay at the University of Teheran on the Caspian Sea.

Tech School Students Building Home As Part of Training in Carpentry

By LEONARD ZEIDENBERG

For the last two months, work has been going ahead slowly on a neat, 8-room house on Brookfield St. across the street from the new high school. It's not quite finished; work remains to be done on the flooring, doors, kitchen cupboards, molding, door frames and other trim work. But the sound of hammers and saws has been stilled.

The carpenters working on the job have completed their end of the job by bringing it to a roughed-in stage. Now they are going on summer vacation.

The carpenters are Howells Cheney Technical School students, some of whom are graduating tonight. They have been doing the job under contract, since April, as part of their training.

The owner hasn't decided yet whether he wants to complete the house himself over the summer. But if he is in no hurry, he can contract for Cheney Tech boys to come back in the fall.

Teams Divide Work

In all, 20 boys worked on the project in two teams of 10 each—sophomores and juniors in one and freshmen and seniors in the other. They divided the work between them on a week-by-week basis, group-pounding nails, the other the books in accordance with the school's policy of splitting school times between academic work and trade instruction.

A job of this sort is an ideal training exercise for the carpentry students. They not only learn the skills, but acquire safety habits and learn to work with other tradesmen—masons, plumbers, and electricians. They also learn to get the one house job a year, and a present crop of carpentry students earlier in the year put up two garages. Next fall, another house job awaits the Tech School carpenters.

None of this work is free. The owners pay for the labor, and the money goes into the State's general fund. An owner might not have to pay as much to have a house built by the Tech students as he would if journeymen carpenters were on the job, but there are certain conditions he has to accept—the length of time it takes the students to finish a job, for one thing.

The school isn't interested in having its students break speed records. They're on the job primarily to learn and that takes time.

Friend of Workmanship

However, that time element is the only thing we apologize for," says Mr. Fava. "The carpentry instructor who supervises the boys on the job, 'We're proud of our workmanship. We keep our standards very high. That's the only way to teach."

"And besides," says Fava, who, in effect, is the boss on the project, "I've got a customer to please with this job."

Fava, youthful, crew-cut and with the faded, weather-creased face of a man who spends most of his time outdoors, supervises all the contract jobs done by the carpentry students, and he enjoys his work. His father was a builder and he was brought up in the building business. "I was on the roof when I was 10 years old," he says. Fava is a Manchester High School graduate, but took three years of drawing at what was then the Manchester Trade School, two years of mechanical drawing, and one of architecture.

While working on a job, the Cheney Tech students put in a full school day. Every morning at 8:15

While on the Brookfield St. project, they piled into a pickup truck's bed, outside the school and drove up to the house site, where they worked until 3:25.

The One Tools, Two

Between those hours, with breaks for lunch and one recess, they worked on the house, using their own tools, which they cared for zealously, and the school's, which they respected but without the same passion. They finished just right, and I want to mention that they did it all by themselves. But I don't, I keep after him to do it right. It's the only way he can learn. But, he adds, he hasn't had too much trouble on the Brookfield St. house. "They've

got a good job of boys," he says. "The greatest satisfaction Fava gets out of his job seems to be in seeing his students take pride in watching something rise under their hands. One day, recently, when one of the group that had been off the job for a week returned to the Brookfield St. house, they were working on the roof. The boys turned to his instructor and said, 'You know, Mr. Fava, that house looks very good.'"

"That," said Fava, "is a very good sign. That boy hasn't done any of the work on the house for a week. Yet he knew that something of himself was in the house, and he was proud of it."

Glare of Light

At 1:30 a.m. "Gas caught fire." That was all.

There came the word from the Coast Guard amphibian hovering overhead: "Into drink, loud explosion."

The Coast Guard immediately marshaled every ship available to head for the scene.

The restaurant at Idelwied, notified earlier that the airliner was returning, had started to prepare meals for the passengers.

With word of the crash, government negotiators officials sped to Idelwied to begin an investigation.

The Coast Guard said the airliner sank in water about 120 feet deep. Weather at the scene as dawn arrived was described as overcast and the sea calm.

Other Major Air Crashes

The worst previous disaster involving a scheduled airline flight came last Oct. 6 when a United Airlines plane with 61 aboard crashed into a Wyoming mountain peak, killing all.

However, there was a greater loss of life when a chartered flight went down in Wales with 80 soccer fans in 1946.

The death toll in two military plane crashes also was greater. One involved a C-124 cargo plane, which plunged to earth near Tokyo in 1953 and other C-124 which cracked up during a 1952 takeoff in Washington.

The last serious crash involving Idelwied Airport occurred on Dec. 18, 1954, when an Italian airlines plane from Rome Crashed near Jamaica Bay while trying to land. Twenty-six of the 32 aboard were killed.

Linera Aeropostal Venezolana, the Venezuelan national airline, was founded more than 25 years ago. In 1946 it became an international carrier with routes between New York, Havana and Caracas.


