

Town Budget At \$4,598,475

General Manager Richard Martin has recommended a 10 1/2 month budget of \$4,598,475 which, on the 1955 Grand List will require a 36-mill tax rate to finance.

The budget is for the interim fiscal period which begins Aug. 15 and ends June 30, 1957. It now goes before the Board of Directors, which must act on it by Aug. 10.

Martin arrived at the figure for the 10 1/2 month period by adjusting a 12-month budget he had prepared.

Martin's 12-month budget was \$575,000 higher than the estimated expenditures for the current year, which are \$4,297,041.10. And the 10 1/2-month budget is 92 per cent of the figure for the whole year period.

If the town were to have a 12-month fiscal year beginning Aug. 15 instead of the interim year, it would take a 36-mill rate to finance operations, assuming the Grand List would increase by \$1,500,000 over the last Grand List.

That would amount to a 4-mill increase, since the present rate is 35 mills.

Wilson Set to Spend Extra \$800 Million

Washington, July 2 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Wilson said today the extra \$800 million Congress voted for the Air Force "will be spent when they are needed" but there will be no new speedup in B52 bomber production. Asked his attitude toward this money, Wilson told the Senate Air Force Investigating subcommittee:

"I don't intend to recommend that the additional funds be impounded. They will be treated like any other funds that we get and will be spent when they are needed."

Congress overrode administration recommendations as to Air Force needs and put into the general defense appropriation bill an additional \$800 million, chiefly for aircraft procurement. President Eisenhower signed the bill today.

There has been considerable speculation that Eisenhower might withhold the money from the Air Force even though it was voted by Congress.

This prompted a question to Wilson by Sen. James D. Watson as to whether the funds might be impounded.

After his reply to the question, Wilson went on to say that the planned build-up of B52 bomber production would have gone ahead without the added money voted by Congress and that he had received "no recommendation from the Air Force to order an additional speed-up."

Wilson said that even if the entire \$800 million were devoted to B52 it would mean getting "only about 100 more of them."

"We are already going along on a sound program," he said. "None of us thinks there should be another step-up in B52 production."

In earlier testimony, Wilson indicated this country has not been behind the Soviet in air speed-up development and said the B52, which is this country's intercontinental heavy bomber, is "quite superior" to its Russian counterpart.

In fact, Wilson said, if the tables were reversed if the Russian B52 were as superior to the B52 as the B52 is to the Russian B52, we would be greatly worried.

It was Wilson's second day before the subcommittee which is making a general study of U.S. air power with particular emphasis on this country's position relative to Russia.

Ike Reported 'Stronger,' Signs Big Defense Bill

Gettysburg, Pa., July 2 (AP)—President Eisenhower reported feeling "stronger and stronger," signed 21 bills today including the \$4,656,727,000 defense bill in which he suffered a defeat in Congress.

Eisenhower also signed, in an hour-long work session with aides who flew here from Washington, an \$863,100,000 public works bill for the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) and other agencies.

White House press secretary James C. Hagerty told a news conference the President's doctors informed him this morning Eisenhower is "coming along fine" in recovery from his June 9 operation.

In a change of plans, however, the Army doctor who performed the operation did not return to Washington as originally announced but decided to stay at the farm a few more days.

Hagerty said this decision by Dr. Leonard D. Heaton did not reflect any change in the President's condition. Hagerty said the only reason for it was that Heaton interrupted a vacation to take care of the President and now wants to get in some golf and other recreation before returning to his duties as commanding general of Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington.

U.S. Moving To Reopen Steel Talks

Pittsburgh, July 2 (AP)—The government has taken a preliminary step toward revival of stalemated contract talks in the nationwide strike of 650,000 United Steel workers.

Both the union and the basic steel industry have indicated willingness to return to the bargaining table. But neither side has made any move in that direction, each apparently waiting for the other to make the first overture.

A tentative move toward possible government intervention to break the bargaining impasse and bring a quick settlement was taken yesterday in Washington, by Joseph Finnegan, director of the Federal Mediation Service.

Finnegan said he wanted to contact both sides "to discuss the status of the situation and see if and how he can be helpful."

He indicated he wished to meet separately in the near future with David J. McDonald, USW president, and John A. Stephens, U.S. Steel Corp. vice president and chief industry negotiator.

Finnegan talked by phone with Arthur J. Goldberg, union general counsel in New York and said he expected to have another talk with Goldberg today in Washington.

May Resume After Holiday—Goldberg said he and Finnegan discussed no concrete plans for resumption of negotiations. The union attorney said he doubts if any negotiations would start until after Independence Day.

Spokesman for U.S. Steel, traditional leader of the industry, said the company had not been contacted by Finnegan. One said:

"Naturally, we will do everything we can to get this situation corrected. But as yet we have not been approached."

The federal government had kept "hands-off" during the long period of negotiations which broke off Saturday evening in New York.

Gov. Averell Harriman of New York, touring Minnesota yesterday in his campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination, issued a statement scoring the Eisenhower administration for failure to end the strike. Said Harriman:

"No effort was made in Washington to use the prestige of the presidency to bring the parties together in an agreement or even to delay the strike. This is another example of the Eisenhower administration's neglect of its responsibility."

McDonald declined to guess how long the strike might last. He said upon his return to Pittsburgh:

"It may be short or it may be long."

Polish Reds Seal Poznan; Urge of Rebels 'Gigantic'

Nine Injured As Blasts Rock Queens A-Lab

New York, July 2 (AP)—A double explosion rocked an atomic research laboratory today, injuring nine persons.

Officials of Sylvania Electric Products Inc., operator of the plant, swiftly announced the blast was "not nuclear in nature," allaying rumors that wildfired through the area that radioactive substances had been discharged.

Five of the nine hurt were taken to hospitals. One was reported in critical condition.

The blasts, coming within seconds of each other, blasted the second floor of metallurgy laboratories at Sylvania's 56-acre research center in the bay-side section of Queens, about 12 miles from New York City's midtown area.

The center conducts research on atomic fuels, atomic reactor components and processes.

Twenty-five windows in the two-story white, brick building were blown out, the company said, and much equipment was damaged. The block-long structure, surrounded by a high wire fence, is several hundred feet from other plant buildings which were not affected.

The nine injured were among 225 employes in the building when the first blast went off at 8:50 a.m.

Walter E. Kingston, general manager of the atomic research division, said preliminary investigation indicated damage would total about a quarter of a million dollars.

Fifty city firemen, 23 policemen and a photographer, who sped to the blast scene, were examining for possible radioactive contamination and instructed to take further routine hospital tests within three days.

Top Democrats In Race Blast At Eisenhower

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS—Three Democratic presidential hopefuls, during weekend criticism at President Eisenhower—whose supporters continued to hold firmly today to the unconfirmed assumption he will again be the Republican candidate.

Gov. Averell Harriman of New York issued the sharpest blast during a farm-belt tour of Iowa, Minnesota and North Dakota.

Harriman said in Des Moines Eisenhower was "a great soldier but he is not qualified for the presidency." He said the President understands neither the farm problem nor critical factors in the Cold War.

"He hasn't read a book," the New York governor said, "the doesn't read the papers. He doesn't read anything except what they put before him. So, he just doesn't know what's going on."

In New York, the Republican state chairman, L. Judson Morhouse, retorted:

"Any candidate has the right to make a jackass of himself, but no candidate ever availed himself so completely of the dubious privilege as Mr. Harriman did in Iowa."

Morhouse said Harriman "as usual, was not speaking for the people of New York State." He predicted New York would give Eisenhower a million vote re-election margin, especially if Mr. Harriman is the Democratic candidate.

Where 128 Perished



All 128 Dead Aboard Two Crashed Planes

Grand Canyon, Ariz., July 2 (AP)—All 128 aboard a Lockheed L-1049 Super Constellation plane, which crashed into the Grand Canyon, were found dead, making the Saturday disaster the worst in commercial aviation history.

Helicopter crews planned to risk the treacherous peaks and air currents of the vast gorge to try to remove the bodies today.

A Trans-World Airlines Super Constellation and a United Airlines DC7, apparently collided in flight before they went down in the northern Arizona wastelands Saturday.

Both airline and government authorities are investigating the tragedy. The planes were en route east from Los Angeles at the time of the tragedy. The Constellation carried 84 passengers and a crew of six; the DC7 33 passengers and five crew members.

The wreckage was found on two jagged buttes at the southeastern top of the canyon, one of America's most beautiful but rugged and inaccessible areas.

The buttes are a two-day hike over perilous terrain from the nearest road. The only way to reach the masses of metal fragments and torn bodies sooner is by helicopter.

Capt. James Womack, a helicopter pilot who flew to the crash scene yesterday with two other men, had this comment on the plan to remove bodies from the area:

"There's not a hell of a lot down there that anyone's going to get out."

Events leading up to the twin crash were a fantastic series of coincidences.

Revolt Death Count Held 'Close to 1,000'

Berlin, July 2 (AP)—The Red Polish Army today sealed off the East German border to intercept rebel workers fleeing from a massive police roundup in the city of Poznan.

West German travelers arriving from Poznan, where workers staged a bloody three-day revolt last week, said the Communist Army has heavily reinforced its frontier garrisons and Red tanks for the first time are patrolling the Oder River.

A compilation of eyewitness estimates received by Western diplomatic sources in Vienna far outstripped all previous reports of casualties in Poznan. This compilation said the dead probably totaled "close to 1,000."

The Polish government has announced that 48 were killed and 240 wounded. But Western business men arriving here and in West Germany from Poznan estimated the deaths all the way from 200 to 600.

240 Tanks in City—The Vienna sources said 240 tanks were used to restore order in Poznan.

Thousands of steel-helmeted troops were reported blocking highways leading West and removing Polish suspects from cars and trains.

Arrivals from the East said closely screened automobiles and trains are being allowed to cross the frontier but the unprecedented security precautions have upset normal Polish traffic westward.

The travelers, who refused to be quoted because of their contacts in the East, said a giant purge was under way in Poznan. Estimates of those arrested ran as high as 2,500 men and women.

"They have sealed off the border to catch all who might be trying to flee westward," one responsible woman traveler said.

Population Terrorized—Another, substantiating the woman's account, said the purge seems to be taking a gigantic size. The population is terrorized because secret police are haunting the streets. Informers are everywhere. Nobody trusts even his close neighbor.

It is not certain if the Polish regime meant while pushed a nationwide propaganda drive in an effort to douse any other uprisings in advance.

Russian People Blamed Soviet Leaders Explain Failure to Curb Stalin

By ROY ESSOVAN—Moscow, July 2 (AP)—The Soviet Union's Communist chiefs today said today it was Joseph Stalin's support from the Russian people that kept them from rising against him—not lack of courage.

The statement, issued by a 6,000-word statement to explain why the country's present rulers waited until after Stalin was dead to denounce him.

It also asserted that threat of capitalist encirclement was another reason the present leadership could not have risked dissent by ousting Stalin. Moreover, it added, the dictator's worst enemies were not revealed until his death.

Published in Pravda, the Soviet Communist party issued a resolution of the Central Committee, which was spread over two pages of Pravda, the party's newspaper, and beamed abroad by Moscow Radio.

It clearly was intended as a reply to critics of the Kremlin's anti-Stalin campaign both inside and outside the Soviet Union.

Leaders of Communist parties in western Europe and the United States have criticized Moscow's methods in the downgrading of Stalin. They also have asked what was the role of the present Soviet leadership during the years Stalin was committing the crimes of which he is now accused.

The long resolution reviewed what it described as the historical background and causes of Stalin's rise to supreme power. It said the device to correct his errors had been misinterpreted by foreign Communist leaders. It attacked "alarming assertions" in the West that Stalin's dictatorship had been made possible by the underdeveloped nature of the Soviet system and claimed Soviet society is basically unchanged despite Stalin's influence.

"Any action against Stalin during his lifetime 'would not have been understood by the people,'" the resolution said. It continued:

"All this does not mean there was lack of personal courage. It is clear anyone who would have spoken up against Stalin under those conditions would not have been supported by the people."

"Moreover, any such action would have been considered... as a move to undermine the unity of the party and government."

The statement claimed many of Stalin's enemies were exposed only after he died when the Soviet government exposed "the criminal" (Continued on Page Eight)

Mansfield Asks Farm Surplus For Red Bloc

Washington, July 2 (AP)—Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.) proposed today shipments of American farm products to all eastern European countries to provide the food for children and destitute persons.

Undersecretary of State Herbert Hoover Jr. offered free food for Poland Saturday in the wake of "serious disorders" in Poznan which Hoover said "seem to be marked by demands of the population for bread."

Hoover made the offer through the American Red Cross, asking that agency to determine whether Poland would accept.

Hoover's move put the United States in the position of offering to help Iron Curtain peoples angry at their own rulers and at the Soviets for supporting a drain on Poland's farm and factory output.

Mansfield, in a speech drafted for the Senate before Hoover acted, proposed that Congress authorize gifts and sales of surplus farm commodities to all Iron Curtain countries as one of a number of moves to counter new Russian trade and aid tactics.

He said the satellites should be offered these products "provided there is assurance that the food and other products so supplied shall in fact go to the peoples of these countries."

Mansfield had sharp words for some other administration policies. A member of the Senate Foreign Relations committee, Mansfield is vice chairman and Senate liaison agent of the Democratic National committee.
