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called mutual security and foreign aid. I have almost invariably reported efforts to reduce these items.
"This time I am taking a different position. The times have changed and I have seen times when bills were brought on the floor that were too big and provided funds that were not needed."
Arms Aid for Defense
But the arms aid to other countries that Eisenhower now seeks, Taber said, is needed to maintain defense lines such as in Korea where otherwise more American boys would have to be sent.
Rep. Fessenden (D-La.) sponsor of the \$2,500,000,000 bill argued that it would still provide \$700 million more for arms aid than Congress voted last year.
Before debate began, House Democratic Leader McCormack (Mass.) said Congress would be cutting Eisenhower's foreign aid program even deeper if Republicans instead of Democrats were in control.
One of Taber's staunchest supporters in previous budget-cutting drives, Rep. Wigwagsworth (R-Mass.), also advocated restriction of some of the money.
Wigwagsworth said he was "unhappy" over the committee cuts in military aid.
"It has been cut altogether too deep," he said. "I cannot stand for economy at the expense of national security."
Referring to criticism by some members that the aid program is a "give-away" project, Wigwagsworth said "this is not a question of a give-away program, but a question of national defense."
The House leaders hoped for final action on the measure today, although there was a possibility that extended debate might put a final vote off until tomorrow.
The Hill House Action
Eisenhower has strongly prodded House committee cuts in his program. Eisenhower was quoted as telling the Republican chiefs at Gettysburg, Pa.:
"I feel very deeply about this and I intend to campaign very vigorously and hard on this issue before the country this fall."
McCormack said in an interview "of course I'm glad" to have Eisenhower rank for the aid program.
McCormack said foreign aid started as "Democratic policy" with the Marshall Plan during the Truman administration, and that

Zoners Hear Bids Monday

Raymond Mahoney will seek permission to divide former town land at Center St. and Love Lane into three building lots when the Zoning Board holds a public hearing Monday night at the Municipal Building.
Mahoney had planned to locate a house there which must be moved from its present site on W. Middle Pike because of highway construction. He was unsuccessful in bidding on the house, however.
The property concerned is in Residence Zone A. It fronts for 245 feet on Center St. and is 120 feet deep. Mahoney will ask to establish two lots with 80-foot frontages and one of 85-foot frontage. Zoning rules now require 90-foot frontages in an A zone.
Zoning officials say two of the lots will contain 5,600 square feet, less than the minimum of 10,500 required in an A zone. The third will have 11,800 square feet, more than the minimum.
House lots east of Mahoney's land now have frontages of 75 feet and are 120 feet deep, according to zoning officials.
In a similar application, John F. Howard will ask to be allowed to set up two lots at 134 Oakland St. in Residence Zone A, having less than the required area.
Howard has the right to store oil trucks in a garage at the same location and this will not be affected by the proposed change.
Two applications concern new construction for which ZBA approval is needed.
Fred Knoda will ask a variance to permit erection of a six-story dwelling at the northwest corner of Summit St. and E. Middle Pike, denied in January, and Sylvia Girardin will ask permission to build a dwelling with an attached garage on the east side of Brookfield St., closer to the side line than allowed by zoning rules. Knoda's land is in Residence Zone B and Girardin's in Residence Zone A.
Four of the applications concern permission for signs. They are from: Eugene Nimhoff, asking to be allowed to set signs at locations east of McNall St. north of Rt. 15 to advertise the motel built there, with one in a Rural Residence Zone and another in a Residence Zone AA; the Esso Standard Oil Co., seeking approval for an over-the-sign north of the Rt. 15 approach to Windsor St. in Business Zone II; and Mrs. J. J. Grooms, asking permission for

Russell Will Retire Sunday As Savings Bank President

R. LaMotte Russell has tendered his resignation as president of the Savings Bank of Manchester. His resignation becomes effective Sunday, the 50th anniversary of his association with the bank.

The bank's board of directors accepted Russell's request for retirement in a resolution adopted at a meeting last night. The resolution expressed the directors' "full appreciation of his long, faithful and effective service."

In his letter of resignation, Russell said that he wished "to terminate my active duties upon completion of 50 years as an officer of the Savings Bank of Manchester."

Russell joined the bank as treasurer on July 15, 1906.

He had 13 years of banking experience when he joined the bank. He was president of the Hartford public schools, he had entered the employ of the Connecticut River Banking Co. of Hartford in 1910.

Former Chamber President Since coming to Manchester, Russell has been active in public affairs—treasurer during World War I of the Manchester War Bureau, a member of the Ninth District School Committee from 1914 to 1922 and of the town's Board of Education from 1922 to 1927.

In addition, he is a past president of the local Chamber of Commerce and was treasurer of the Connecticut Chamber for 31 years. He was also on building committees of the Center Congregational Church and of Manchester Lodge, No. 73, A.F. & A.M., of which he is a life trustee.

He is also well known in State banking circles. He was chairman of the Committee of the Savings Bank Association of Connecticut which proposed and organized the Savings Bank Deposit Guaranty Fund of Connecticut. He has been secretary of the fund since its organization.

He has also served on committees of the American Bankers Assn. and the National Association of Mutual Savings Banks. He is a member of the Center Congregational Church and of the Hartford Club, and is a 32nd degree Mason.

In the last several years, Russell's friends and associates have been taking note of his amiable

Few Citizens Voice Opinions On Martin's Proposed Budget

Few citizens took the opportunity to comment last night on the proposed \$4,008,775 budget for the coming 10-month fiscal period when the Board of Directors held its public hearing on General Manager Richard Martin's proposed total general fund expenditures.

George Marston, Main St. resident active in the quest for off-street parking facilities, raised an objection to paying the salaries of two patrolmen from the Parking Meter Fund.

Marston contended that the two patrolmen assigned to collect money from parking meters spend from a day and a half to two days a week at that task. He said they spend the rest of the time as foot patrolmen a task which had to be performed before the advent of parking meters.

Marston made it clear he was not criticizing the Police Department or the patrolmen but merely questioning the practice of paying the two salaries from the meter funds.

Contains \$100,000

The Parking Meter Fund now contains more than \$100,000, and town officials are planning to use the money to provide more off-street parking in the "Purcell" PL area and to improve access to the parking area.

Joseph Dyer of 45 Fairview St. observed that the budget "looks like a very easy budget for a grow-

ing town," but outlined the Director's request to carefully with a view toward making whatever savings possible. He said the budget does not include many expenditures the town will have to make in the coming year.

He enumerated among those expenditures any costs involved in operating a golf course, fringe benefits for which he said workers are asking off-street parking, and additions to the Mary Cheney Building and Municipal Building.

In his urgent message to the Board Martin pointed out that no provision is made for operating a course. He also notes that he will soon submit a revised Capital Improvement Budget which will comply with the Capital Works Reserve Fund to finance a new Highway Department garage, an addition to the Municipal Building and a star on an already addition.

The budget includes a general salary and wage increase averaging about 3 per cent. 

Manchester's New High School--Called One of Finest in East--As Seen from Air



From 1,000 feet in the air the new high school is beginning to look very much like the model of it which is on display at the Manchester Trust Co. Few Manchester residents will ever get the opportunity to see the new school from this vantage point, but before the school opens in September, it is likely there will have been hundreds of visitors tramping through the long corridors and peek-

ing into the more than 80 classrooms. For more than a year now, the \$3,000,000 school plant on E. Middle Tpke. has been attracting scores of weekend viewers and for a number of Manchester residents, a tour of the school has been a regular Sunday ritual. Local shuttlers have not lacked for dramatic and colorful subjects while the M. S. Kellier Co., contractors, and the various subcontractors, moved earth, poured concrete, erected steel frames, and

laid courses of brick to complete the historic town project. Bowers Again Asking Court To Halt Purchase of Chairs

The case was not heard, however, and Crockett notified Chernoff the town no longer considered itself bound by the stipulation. Chernoff contended the stipulation was still binding.

At any rate, the new motion for a temporary injunction would appear to make the dispute over the stipulation an academic one.

Main Office Sale Completed by CB

The sale of Cheney Bros. main office building on Hartford Rd. and adjoining properties to the Connecticut Power Co. was completed yesterday.

Ray Gossie, Cheney Bros. plant engineer, signed a deed transferring title to the large 30-story structure, the nearby 2-story annex and 10 acres of land to the rear of the main building.

The Power Co. is paying \$100,000 for the properties, where it plans to move all of its Manchester operations.

The local textile firm is now remodeling a section of its machine shop on Forest St., where it will relocate its main offices. Some departments, such as personnel, medical and tabulating, have already moved. The remainder will vacate the Hartford Rd. location within two weeks, according to Gossie.

The annex is now occupied by the Edge Co. and Manchester Tool and Design Co. Both firms have leases which the Power Co. is assuming.

Farmers Decide To Close Market

345 crates were presented for sale July 2, when buyers paid \$3,267.16 for their berries.

The Manchester Strawberry Auction Market, which had been struggling all week to keep open, finally called it quits yesterday.

Business at the Charter Oak Park market had been falling off sharply since Sunday, but the decision to terminate the season yesterday—four days ahead of schedule—was reached after only two persons showed up at the market.

One was a farmer, and one was a buyer—and they couldn't get together on price.

The market opened for its 23rd season June 24, a little later than usual because of the cold spring. In the 11 days that it was open, 2,173 1 1/2 crates of berries were sold for a total of \$19,354.31.

In the 17 days that the market was open last year, 5,201 24-crate crates were sold for \$35,248.35.

The largest offering of berries this year was on June 28, when 213 crates of berries were sold for the design on a truck owned by the Manchester Carpet Center.
