

Washington, July 18 (AP)-Secretary of State Dulles said oday there seems to be a trend throughout the world toward cuts in the manpower of armed forces, due primarily to growng reliance on atomic and other modern weapons. Dulles told a news conference he thinks the United States must maintain a certain measure of superiority over Russia in the atomic field. He said this would not permit any cut in

American nuclear power. At the same time he said the prospects for agreement with the Reds Promise Soviet Union on an effective arms reduction might be brightening because of a growing world real-ization that the destructive power of modern weapons makes some kind of reduction imperative. Dulles expressed hope that there would be sufficient favorable developments during the next 10 years to make it possible to re-duce somewhat American forces stationed overseas, and possibly to curtail America's overseas base commitments.
