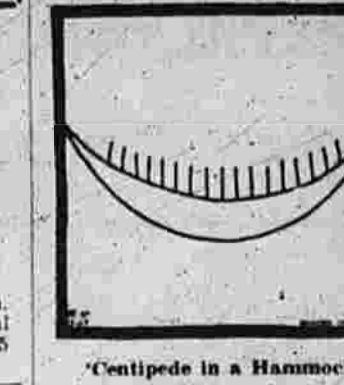

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Stassen's Move

Today's 60,000,000 vote question is whether or not Harold Stassen, proposing to dump Vice President Nixon in favor of Governor Herter for the vice-presidential nomination, represents more than Stassen, and if so, how much more.

He does, at a minimum, speak for an anti-Nixon faction within the party. The anti-Nixon faction happens also to be the most pro-Eisenhower faction of the party. The rough division is, perhaps, approximately the same as that which obtained in the 1952 national convention - with a large share of the party's conservatives and professionals, on one side, and the party's liberals, amateurs, and the Dewey camp of professionals, on the other.

The opposition to Nixon showed its head almost immediately after the President's recent attack last fall, and it was in that period, incidentally, that Governor Herter announced his decision not to run for governor again, a decision which left him clearly available for national attention.

The opposition to Nixon flared up again during the week when Herter himself was trying to keep the vice-presidential nomination open until the convention.

Pressure from the party professionals and a final move of show-down by Nixon himself, when he called on the President and told him he had decided he wanted to run, seemed a little later on to give Nixon assurance of removal of the President's support.

Blackmail Exposed

Egypt's Nasser, it appears, was a little too sharp for his own good. His sharpness consisted in trying to build up his threat of aid from Russia into a blackmail which would force us to finance his Avarad dam for him. Perhaps one reason our State Department dragged its feet on turning the project down was that it had finally begun to see the effect that there was, after all, no such firm or handsome Russian offer to help Egypt as Nasser had hoped to have. It is almost as if the United States and Russia had conspired together to destroy him, or at least cut him down to size, and he may be a dangerous character in the period just ahead.

The fact that Nasser played the game, and that Russia and we seem to have jointly taught him a lesson, does not, of course, help the people of Egypt. That is the one who pays the penalty for Nasser's mal-neuvering, and for the fact that Russia and we apparently decided not to help against one another the privilege of helping the Egyptian people.

The real point in all this, it seems to us, is that the people of Egypt deserve better than they get from the cheap mistakes of Nasser in dealing with the big power rivalry between the United States and Russia.

Both we and Russia have now demonstrated that we are not suckers for Nasser's blackmail. The opportunity to prove that we are, friends to the welfare and advancement of the people, more backward peoples is still open. And the best way for us to prove that, all around the world, is to help Egypt, to build a particular dam for Egypt, but for us, as America, to back a United Nations program which could choose among help finance similar projects in many countries, and this - one first, if it could qualify to be.

In Indian Town

New Delhi, India, July 24 (AP)—Indian Army units, through wreckage in the northwest coastal town of Anjar today in a search for additional victims from a July 23 night earthquake.

The latest official count put the death toll in Anjar township at 109. Four hundred persons were reported injured, with 40 in serious condition. An estimated 800 persons were missing.

The quake left some 12,000 persons homeless. Hundreds of houses were reported destroyed completely and 3,500 others damaged.

Tent camps were thrown up to house the homeless. Army medical units began a mass inoculation program in an effort to prevent an outbreak of disease.

The front of the quake center at Anjar, but shocks were felt for 500 miles from Bombay to the Pakistan border.

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Cost of Living For June Hit All-Time High

 Net spendable earnings of factory workers with three dependents averaged \$17.75 in June, while those of a worker with no dependents were \$35.40. This marked a gain of about 80 cents over May, and an increase of better than \$2.00 over last June.

Higher Index Seen
 Owen Clague, chief of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, said the overall consumer price index probably will creep up next month although food, biggest factor in the index, should remain flat.

Clague said the rise in the cost of living is the biggest of any month since January-February, 1951, when it rose 1.5 per cent. He said, however, that price stability is gauged rather by the monthly index of 1954. In that year the index has stood between 113 and 116, varying only about 20 cents. Clague noted that food prices in April, 1955, peaked at nearly one-third of the entire increase.

He emphasized that fruits and vegetables had a large bearing on the index. Clague said, "This is in a way partly seasonal and partly because this spring was a bad crop year with late spring and coldness and winds affecting the crop." Clague said.

The advance in food prices, the largest monthly increase since January 1954, was 1.7 per cent. In June of 1954, the index was 113.8 and in July it was 114.1. In May, the index was 113.9 and in June it was 114.1. Clague noted that food prices rose about 2 1/2 cents a year ago.

Beef and veal prices also increased 1.7 per cent and egg prices 1.7 per cent. Clague said.

The companies have offered a contract covering four years and four months with what they say is a 17.2 cent annual increase. They would be the first to offer a wage boost in the first year. They would also favor a two-year contract with a wage increase of 11.5 per cent.

MADE \$2.46 AN HOUR
 The steelworkers' prestige wages averaged \$2.46 an hour. The union has never made public its wage demands, but is reported to be asking a 10-cent-an-hour increase.

In other demands, the union has asked for a 10-cent-an-hour Saturday work double time for the first two hours of overtime. It also asked for a 10-cent-an-hour week day pay plan.

The companies offered 12 weeks of supplemental employment benefits and premium pay for Sunday work.

Meanwhile, 13 major steel companies said yesterday that a change in the government officials' utility rates, which would increase in pork prices. Clague said that the index of higher prices rose about 2 1/2 cents a year ago.
