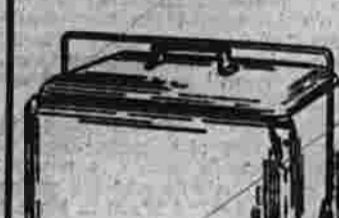

Peron Indicted In Rivas Case
Buenos Aires, Argentina, Aug. 1 (AP)—A judge has indicted former President Juan D. Peron in absentia on charges of sedition.

Vernon's 'Chat' Clears Desk

School Head Ends Career; Worries Over New Methods

By His Devotee

Rockville, Aug. 1 (Special)—"An old Yankee saying holds that a 'chat' lasts out faster than he wears out," contends retiring Supt. of Schools Arthur E. Chatterton today as he closes out 33 years in the Vernon education system.

And "Chat" as almost everyone here calls him, has no intention of "trailing out" as he begins his retirement.

Regarding definite plans, he hasn't made up his mind yet, but among his ideas is to spend a year in Florida.

"What will he do there if he goes?" "He'll like to spend a year teaching high school there," Chat says. "It would be a good way to see Florida and to make a little money at the same time."

Contemplating the possibility of going into business for himself here in town. At any rate, he'll have plenty of time now for a lot of fishing, one of his favorite pastimes. And there are many projects to be done at home, reminds the gray-haired philosopher gossamer.

The kindly and popular educator, who has held the title of superintendent of schools for the past 11 years will have made no small impression on the town's educational history as he leaves his office in the old High School for the last time today.

"Chat" has served as coach, teacher and administrator, and over the years his winning smile and gracious personality have gained him an enviable popularity, and an acquaintance with more than one generation of the town's youth.

Sitting in his office today where remodeling already is in progress for his successor, "Chat" looks like a man who just unshouldered a heavy burden. And a heavy burden the job of superintendent of schools in these days, he admits.

Manchester Wins

Enjoying the feel of a clear desk and the taste of a good pipe, a gift from friends, he reminisces a little about a few personal ideas on education, and expresses concern over some of the modern trends of schooling.

Among his favorite yarns concerns a marathon baseball game. It was played at a time when he was coaching the high school team. "We were playing Manchester on the West Side Field," he begins. "We played as long as we could see. I don't know how many innings, but when we were forced by darkness to quit, the score stood at 23-23."

"High Green, now head basketball coach at the University of Connecticut, was teaching in Manchester at the time, and he watched the game with support, when he went home. Later, he returned and we were still at it."

"The game was finished a couple weeks later when the teams met in Rockville for a return match. The first three innings of the new game counted for both games and Manchester finally won out 24-23."

"Those were the days a fellow had to have a car or a beach wagon in order to be eligible as team manager, because the town gave no financial help to the athletic teams," the former coach recalls.

Concluding his reminiscences with thoughts on Athletics, Chatterton says, "We had some cocking on to good teams...and we didn't draw

superintendent. "All they care about is the diploma, not the work that goes into earning it."

Placing faith in the ability of today's youth, he says, "The average kid can, if he wants to, do college type work."

Teacher's Lack Control

Regarding the local system, Chatterton feels it will remain generally the same for a few years. His successor, Raymond F. Ramsdell, has worked closely with him for a number of years. The trend toward higher population will continue for several years before leveling off, resulting in continued pressure in the lower grades, he feels.

On discipline, he says, "I think the Board of Education should come out with a statement that teachers will be allowed to discipline pupils. The present situation is unfair to the teachers. The teacher has no control over classes where some physical means cannot be used to keep students quiet."

In connection with the old 1-teacher schools, he has this to say: "Youngsters got just as much education in the little red schoolhouse as they do in the big fancy schools. There's something about a small school. The teacher and pupils were closer, like a big family. There was a lot of loyalty between teacher and pupils. This type of education is completely impossible now."

Regarding his career here, Chatterton has mixed emotions. "I've enjoyed teaching. I can't say I've enjoyed the administrative side as much. I missed being with the kids. Being an administrator is like being in an isolation ward."

His closest ties to the students he bore out in a recent statement when he said, "The school system is going to expand more in the next three years than it's ever done before. Try to economize, but whatever you do, don't do so at the expense of the children."

Coexistence or Jungle Law?

Communist China and the newly independent country of Burma are supposedly bound by a five-point program for coexistence, the negotiation of which by Communist China was supposedly a mark of that country's benign intentions toward its close Asian neighbors.

In accordance with that program, Burma has conducted itself in neutral fashion, refusing to join, for instance, in SEATO, the military alliance was organized in southeast Asia against Communism.

Communist China's conduct has not been quite so faithful to the agreement. It has never called off its Communist followers inside Burma itself. And now it has sent a force of at least 500 men into a section of disputed territory along the Burmese border, with this force acting as if it planned to stay there.

There is territory which has always been in dispute between Burma and China, whatever the governments involved. It was in dispute when Burma was a British colony, and China was not Communist. The territory in dispute comprises some 10,000 square miles. The Chinese Communists are now reported to have moved into 1,000 square miles of this.

Although both countries have always claimed the territory involved, neither has ever been able to control the population, which consists of primitive tribes who specialize in cutting off human heads to insure themselves of good crops.

Burma is anxious to minimize this reported "invasion." But Burma can only continue minimizing it if its protests to Peking are successful, and the Chinese Communist troops withdraw. Otherwise, Burmese troops are at the scene. Otherwise, Burma will be forced to concede that it has found peaceful coexistence with its big Communist neighbor an illusion.

Why the Chinese Communist have done this is, of course, a matter for speculation. They may be trying to wage a war of nerves against the United States, or the situation inside Burma. They may be simply spilling for a little aggression of some kind.

But, if they act where they are, they are certain to lose more than they gain. Communist China made an undeniable blip at the Bandung Conference with its talk of peaceful coexistence and respect for its neighbors. Many of these neighbors believed that talk.

The idea that Communist China was not really an aggressive power has kept SEATO from developing into much more than a paper organization.

Now Communist China is again fanning distrust and fear of itself. The proper, civilized solution for such ancient territorial disputes lies in negotiation, not in force. There has, in the past year or so, been some encouraging indication that Communist China had some respect for the opinion of mankind. If Communist China wishes to preserve that illusion, it will have to issue new marching orders to the rear.

Under Wicked Republicans
An inviting theory—the invitation being to organized labor to vote Republican for bigger and better contracts from management—presents itself in connection with the recent steel strike.

It is now reported that the influence of the Eisenhower administration was brought to bear upon the steel companies, and that it was influence in favor of the more generous management offer which finally settled the strike.

said the New York Governor's prospects are "brighter than ever."

"The many supporters of Sen. Kefauver who backed him for the nomination will now be for Gov. Harriman," Frendberg said.

Stevenson himself made no prediction but his campaign manager, James A. Finnegan, said Kefauver's withdrawal created "a very strong chance that Stevenson will be nominated on the first ballot." Several other supporters of the former Illinois Governor said such a victory was close to a certainty.

Both Stevenson and Kefauver said in response to questions there had been no deal between them. Kefauver said he did not contest the Vice Presidential nomination but he did not close the door to accepting it.

Stevenson said there are a number of qualified men acceptable to him if he wins the top spot—and he included among them Sen. Kefauver. He added that "there have never been any negotiations by me (with Kefauver) or by anyone associated with me."

In any event, the day's developments appeared to have washed out any lingering traces of the bitterness with which Kefauver and Stevenson assailed one another in the heated Florida and California primary campaigns.

The Tennessee Senator said he no longer has doubts that Stevenson is capable of leading the Democrats to victory in November against the almost certain Republican candidacy of President Eisenhower.

Ernes Support for Adlai

Kefauver said he was asking his backers "wholeheartedly" to support Stevenson, and added he foresaw a possibility Stevenson would win the nomination on the first ballot. Stevenson manager Finnegan said he expects the "vast majority" of Kefauver's delegates to switch to the 1952 nominee.

Harriman, however, quoted Kefauver as having told aides of the Governor by telephone "that he believed I would get at least half his delegates."

"From indications I have now received," Harriman added, "I believe it will be more."

Kefauver himself, however, denied today that he had said Harriman might get at least half of his delegates.

The retiring candidate appeared on the CBS television show "Good Morning with Will Rogers" and talked afterward with a CBS newscaster.

Asked about Harriman's report, Kefauver said he "said no such thing."

Asked about a rumor that he

sort of "moderation" as Stevenson. If he went to Stevenson, Johnson's lead would certainly be followed by delegations from some other southern states.

Lausche on Fence

Gov. Frank J. Lausche of Ohio controls most of that state's 58 votes but said he has not decided whom he will support. Gov. G. Mennen Williams, who holds Missouri's 12 votes, has seemed to lean recently more in the direction of Harriman than toward Stevenson.

Another "favorite son," Gov. A. B. "Happy" Chandler of Kentucky, insists he is a serious candidate for the nomination. Speaking of Kefauver's withdrawal, he told newsmen at Frankfurt:

"This definitely moves me up into a better position. For one thing, it makes me one of three candidates instead of one of four."

Kefauver told a news conference he had concluded he could "make a great contribution" toward Democratic unity and victory in November by quitting the contest and asking his supporters to back Stevenson.

He said he was withdrawing because he believed Stevenson's delegate strength was such that "he could be stopped only by throwing the convention into a deadlock to which I would not want to be party to this," he said. "The nominee, whoever it might be, who secured his nomination as a result of the bitterness of a deadlock convention would, I suspect, find it a hollow honor."

He said he had found in campaigning that "there is a predominant widespread feeling that the Democratic party can win the coming presidential campaign if it can present a united and aggressive front to the voters."

Board Seen Ready to Table Full-Time Registrars Issue

Creation of full time posts for the registrars of voters apparently will be postponed until some time during the forthcoming fiscal period.

The Board of Directors discussed the question again last night and the Board and the Registrars are in favor and those opposed to the move agreed the matter is not now urgent since the registrars' work for the present election year is largely completed.

Next year, it was pointed out, will be a "black" year for the registrars because it will not be an election year.

No firm decision was made and the Board asked General Manager Richard Martin for more data on the registrars' budget's recommendations.

The Board was still divided and puzzled over the degree to which the town needs full time registrars.

Director James Miller said emphatically that full time registrars are not needed. He said two full time clerks and the part time registrars would be less expensive.

Poe summarizes views of the Director and the Board.

Director James Miller summarized the view of the problem. He said that it were possible to make the adjustment gradually, there would be no objection. Director John Verno Hauschild said that if the registrars were made full time workers, some money now provided for clerical help could be diverted to their increased salaries. He was asked by the Board to determine how much would be available.

One of the points which bothers the Board is the possibility that the voters might elect to the registrar office a person with no clerical skill. Donald Himmigway, Republican registrar, has agreed to do much of the clerical work connected with the job.

But registrars are elected to their posts every two years.

Miller commented that if a registrar could not do clerical work, the town would have to hire clerks anyway, even with full time registrars.

No objection was raised to the \$2,500 part time salaries to which the Board had agreed. The registrars are entitled. But it will be the increase would do nothing to improve voter records since the registrars are already working as many hours as feasible for part time workers.

Miller predicted that voter records would be improved anyway. He said the new photo-offered system of printing the voting lists has cut down the number of errors. It will also make it possible to get the lists out on time.

Late lists have hampered the work of the political parties.

Both the Democrats and the Republicans are pressing for full time registrars. At a public meeting on the subject, several citizens raised objection.
