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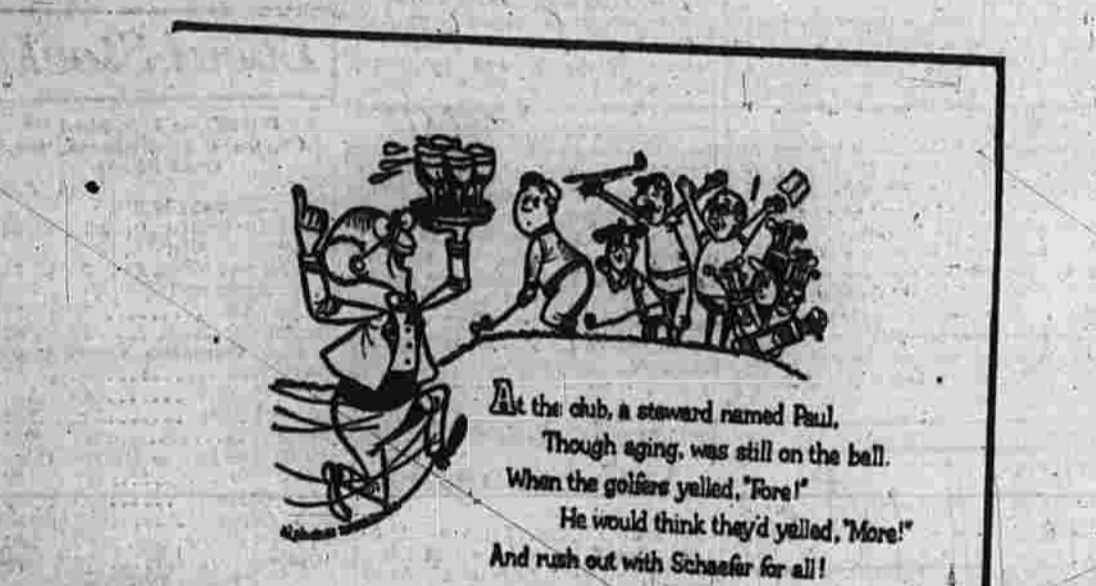

ber. Although Herter pretty well predicted that by agreeing to make the nominating speech for Nixon, he certainly would not be a possible presidential contender, the unexpected vacancy opened up.

**Gov. Knight a Possibility**

Many another Republican governor would start taking his own favorite son status more seriously. California's Goodwin Knight could be counted on to challenge either Nixon or Knowland. From his own state convention keynote, Arthur B. Langis of Washington would command support, too.

A "natural" among the governors might be William G. Stratton of Illinois. His administration has been in trouble, though, and his record is not as impressive as that of other governors. However, he is a former governor, Colorado's Dan Thornton, could get on some sort of boom. He's a hands-on fellow, a proven vote-getter and a White House "mender."

It's something said that the Senate consists of 96 presidential hopefuls. Actually, there aren't many among the 47 Senate Republicans with much realistic chance of being chosen. Sen. John W. Bricker of Ohio, a repeated contender in the past, has been aided by years and events. Whatever hopes his colleagues might have are not evident.

Cabinet members and other administration officials seldom get consideration for the top spot — though it has happened as in the case of onetime Secretary of Commerce Harold G. Green. This year, Secretary of the Treasury George M. Humphrey gets more mention than anybody else though he says privately and publicly he's not interested. (At this writing, it's the vice presidential nomination he's been talking about. Hardly anybody talks about the presidential spot with Eisenhower very much the picture.)

U.N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., early active in the successful drive to nominate Eisenhower in 1952, would figure on most "just suppose" lists.

Among the professionals is that of Sherman Adams, chief assistant to the President, the man who more than anyone else kept the White House going during Eisenhower's two illnesses. Adams commands respect but he has no important enemies, he is not widely known outside government and he comes from a small population state, New Hampshire.

He's Brother Mentioned

Outside the ranks of Republicans in government the population of possible candidates does not seem dense. The president's brother, Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, gets mentioned from time to time. So do such occasional public servants as Paul G. Hoffman. But so far there is no sign of a Wendell Wilkie who could charge in from outside and capture the nomination.

### Colombia Blast Deaths at 700, May Hit 1,000

gona. The drivers of the seven vehicles decided to spend the night here, sleeping in the cabs of the trucks.

The spot where the trucks were parked was scooped into a large crater by the force of the explosion. Buildings as far as 12 blocks from the blast center were damaged extensively.

Large-scale relief operations are in full swing. Doctors, nurses, medical supplies and food are being distributed to the victims. The American Red Cross in Panama dispatched two tons of medical supplies, including blood plasma, by U.S. Air Force transport.

Emergency hospital stations were set up to care for the overflow of injured from the city's regular hospitals and clinics.

Builders and other earth-moving machinery worked around the clock, moving huge piles of debris from the explosion area in a search for additional bodies. Grief-stricken citizens from all walks of life combed the wreckage and debris for the injured and the dead.

Burial of the victims, hampered by an acute shortage of coffins, was an urgent task in this tropical climate. Military authorities announced plans to bury unidentified dead in a common grave. Relatives and friends of persons living or working in the blast area were urged to help in identification without delay.

One reporter said he personally counted 320 dead in one hospital building. So far, in a radio broadcast, he said, 700 people have been identified.

the policies and laws of this government."

Herbert Brucker, editor of the Hartford (Conn.) Courant and chairman of the Fraction of Information Committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors (ASNE), disclosed in Hartford he had sent a telegram of protest to Secretary of State Dulles.

Brucker said he is sure that all 47 ASNE members agree with the State Department that Red China "contains an aggressive threat" and that it disregards the sanctities of civilization in coming to the aid of the United States.

"Yet surely," Brucker wired Dulles, "the same editors are in full agreement that the retention of an Iron Curtain of our own is a confidence violation of the principles of the government and people of the United States stand for."

Let us not stain, before the world, the good name of the United States, we denounce when Communist countries practice it."

Brucker said the American people are capable of evaluating whatever information U.S. reporters bring out of China, and he added: "Concealment of information is not in the best interest of the United States."

The State Department noted that the Americans are being held despite Red China's promise last September to release them quickly. Press officer Resp said no American reporters or others, will be permitted to go to Red China until the Chinese are held as being in China — 10 in jail and one reportedly on his way out of the country.

"The United States welcomes the free exchange of information in respect of political and social differences," Resp said. "But the Chinese Communist regime has created a special impediment."

"It adopted the practice of taking American citizens into captivity and holding them in effect as political hostages."

### Nutmeg Women Vie for Job on Democratic Unit

Hartford, Aug. 8 (AP)—Mrs. Beatrice Holt Rosenthal of Waterford announced yesterday she is a candidate for Democratic national committeewoman from Connecticut.

At the same time, she got the support of Douglas J. Bennett, Democratic party nominee for U.S. representative for the Second Congressional District.

The post is now held by Mrs. Dorothy Satt of New London, who was elected in 1952. Mrs. Satt is seeking another term.

Another candidate for the post is Mrs. Ella Grasso of Windsor Locks, a close friend of Mrs. Rosenthal.

Connecticut's delegation to the Democratic National Convention will elect one of them to the post next week at Chicago.

Bennet, former executive secretary to former Gov. Chester Bowles, wrote to the delegates yesterday asking them to vote for Mrs. Rosenthal.

"Dorothy Satt and Ella Grasso, who have also been mentioned as candidates for the job, are both ardent Democrats who have contributed heavily to the party," Bennett wrote. "Many people seem to agree that since Dorothy Satt has had the honor and the responsibility for four years, it should be passed along to someone else."

"I don't think there's any doubt about the fact that Ella Grasso will be national committeewoman in the near future. I would only like to suggest that since Dorothy Satt is the senior member of the two, the job ought to go to her this time."

### Rockville Consolidation Given Support Of Counsel over Districts

Rockville, Aug. 8 (Special)—The controversial Olson-Rady report, proposing creation of two separate school districts in town, was born as a result of a study made by a committee named two months ago by Mayor Herman G. Olson.

Councilman Harry Hammer today expressed concern over the possibility that the study committee would not consider carefully enough a complete town-city consolidation.

Atty. Hammer said he was troubled by the committee's purported look into consolidation and by its failure to give a reason for calling consolidation not feasible.

Pointing several questions, Atty. Hammer suggested the committee might study the Norwich situation, where consolidation was most recently accomplished in this State.

"How are Vernon's conditions similar to those in Norwich? How favorably is the new government set-up in Norwich?" A study of this type might warrant consideration, the counsel said.

He also said if the State Department of Education were to advise school districts, it could serve as a strong lobby in the General Assembly—a lobby which would be hard for a locality to beat.

Citing a 1908 decision of the State Supreme Court of Knoxville, Atty. Hammer said the trend over the years has been away from school districts and toward consolidation.

**Wells Offers View**

The decision cited by Atty. Hammer reads in part: "It was the former policy of the State to make the management of schools in large measure a neighborhood affair, to be worked out, by creation of small territorial divisions which were sometimes formed from parts of several contiguous towns. Statutes... must be interpreted in this general purpose which in accordance with economic trends of the times is to unify and centralize the functions of local school administration."

Meanwhile, a town official also has expressed himself on the matter of school districts and consolidation. When asked today his feelings on the city-sponsored study group's proposal, Second Selectman Franklin C. Wells said he thought any such plan should be a "town function."

The Selectman said he felt the Common Council had taken too

Wells contended claiming "full-time town officials would be required" with salaries totaling "more than the amount of the salaries of all present officials put together."

**Solutions Delayed**

Atty. Leo B. Flaherty, also a member of the Education Board, said, "While some people are working for a high-grade solution to Connecticut's educational problems, it is disappointing to find that others would propose provincial and unwelcome methods to solve the ultimate solution."

### Aircraft Leases Middletown Space

East Hartford, Aug. 8—Pratt & Whitney Aircraft has leased 79,000 square feet of manufacturing and office space in the former Russell Manufacturing Co. building in Middletown. It was announced today by Wright A. Parkins, general manager.

A spokesman for the Italian line said the court action by the Stockholm owners was "obviously made in anticipation of an Italian line suit to recover damage resulting from the sinking of the Andrea Doria."

Damages suits against both lines have climbed past the \$2 million mark with no end in sight.

Both lines not only disputed the blame for the crash but also differed about the weather on the night of the collision.

The Italian line said dense fog covered the water at the time. But the Swedish line said the moon was out and visibility good.

The sea was moderate, there was a little wind, the moon was shining and although there was haze on the horizon, visibility was good.

The sleek, white, 12,165-ton Stockholm picked up the Doria by radar about 10 miles away, the petition said. The streamlined, 10,000-ton Italian liner bore into sight about two miles off.

The petition continued:

"The Andrea Doria was showing her red or port side light... although the vessels were in a position to pass safely port to port (to each other) the cars in opposite lanes of a highway, the Stockholm immediately went hard right and full astern, but it was impossible to avoid collision..."

The petition accused the Doria of carelessness, failing to keep a proper lookout, speeding, veering hard right and failing to sound proper signals.

Guisepe All, general manager here for the Italian Line, said in a statement:

### \$246 Million Program On Air Traffic Ready

Washington (NEA)—History's worst airline disaster ironically comes at a time when federal funds have just become available to launch a five-year program to help remedy the hazards of high-speed transcontinental flying.

The charred remains of two giant planes and their 128 passengers in the Grand Canyon warn that America's phenomenal growth of air traffic creates problems far beyond crowded airports.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration reports that a 22 per cent increase took place between 1954 and 1955 in the number of route positions reported. The total last year was 20,600,000.

### The Doctor Says

Proper Nutrition Is Vital In Aging Process

There are more older people now than in the past, thanks to the longer life we can expect as a result of improved sanitary conditions and methods of preventing disease, better medical care and like factors.

"Some people go around talking when they should be thinking," Chandler said, but added that Stevenson's statement was "a very proper and wise statement."

Two of the dangers faced by older people are obesity and overeating. There is a tendency as one grows older to lessen the body activity and this, together with a normally slower burning of food-stuffs, will cause an increase in weight unless there is a reduction in calories.

The lowered resistance of many elderly people and their tendency to anemia, abnormal fatigue and slight dropsy may be related to too little protein in the diet.

Daily consumption of foods containing the important element is necessary since protein is not stored by the body.

One point which is not widely known is that different proteins supplement each other. The body may get more benefit from cereal with milk or from peas and rice eaten at the same meal than from the same foods eaten separately.

Other people, too, should be sure that they obtain sufficient vitamins and minerals. In fact, it is said that absorption of these substances gradually becomes poorer and therefore they may need even more of them.

There are frequently certain obstacles which interfere with an older person getting a fully satisfactory retirement. One of these is a lack of knowledge of what is needed. Another is the reduction of income which, after retirement, may make it more difficult to buy some of the more expensive foods which are desirable. This is poor economy if it can be avoided.

A further difficulty is one which must be quite important for some. Living alone and cooking for oneself may actually lessen the desire for food.

Finally, adjustment to the physical abilities of the older person may stimulate the appetite as it does the circulation and sense of well being.

It is necessary that each craft carry equipment that will automatically respond to impulses from ground stations. The signal from the plane can be picked up from high altitudes and be easily distinguished on a cluttered radar scope.

The secondary radar will be particularly valuable for keeping track of high-speed jet planes which are the most difficult to follow.

Not everyone is happy, however. Stuart G. Dymon, president of the Air Transport Association, claims that the billion dollars worth of investment in jet aircraft could be nullified if the air-traffic control system isn't improved.

"Traffic congestion due to inadequate air-traffic control could cause delays which would cancel out all the advantages of the new jet fleet," he says.

The sharpest indication of need for improvement comes from a report made to the Bureau of the Budget, which has this to say: "Reports presented to us by responsible groups indicate that the risks of mid-air collisions have already reached critical proportions and that the collision hazard is becoming greater as the increase in civil and military air traffic outpace the capabilities of outmoded traffic control facilities."

It then went on to point out that there are, on the average, four reported near-collisions involving the airlines daily. This was according to a recent study of a special committee of airline pilots and operators in conjunction with the A.T.A. In 25 per cent of the cases the aircraft passed within 100 feet of each other.

### Chandler Sees Deadlock over Rights Dispute

Chicago, Aug. 8 (AP)—Gov. A. B. (Happy) Chandler of Kentucky said today that he would stand for a strong civil rights plank "almost assured" a dead-end in balloting for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Chandler, an avowed candidate arrived in Chicago with his staff to make a "serious" bid for the nomination in a convention halting next week.

The Kentucky governor contends he has a good chance to get the nod from the delegates in the event of a deadlock between Stevenson and New York Gov. Averell Harriman.

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### Wilson Declines to Confirm New 280,000-Man Reduction

Washington, Aug. 8 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Wilson declined yesterday to confirm reports that the armed forces will again be cut by about 280,000 men within a year or so, but said he is "willing to say there should be some" reductions.

However, Wilson was emphatic in a news conference yesterday that a new conference in re-stating a previous Defense Department proposal to trim military manpower by 800,000 by 1959.

"No Such Paper" Exists

He told newsmen he wanted to "wash out" that report as being "any reasonable forecast of anything that will be planned definitely." He said "no such paper" exists in the Pentagon proposing that the forces be reduced by 800,000 from a present level of about 2,800,000. At another point he declared "there is no such memorandum from any responsible person I know of."

But the Defense Secretary did say that over-all there is a downward trend in the number of men in the service and that the Air Force may reach and retain its 127-wing strength, that force will be active, it probably

will operate that wing structure with manpower at about the present level rather than the projected 800,000 strength.

Wilson also discounted yesterday speculation that the military's appropriation budget for the next fiscal year, starting in mid-1957, might be approximately \$4.5 billion—about one-third more than this year's figure.

Wilson said he had estimates of requirements from the three armed forces which totaled about \$4.5 billion, but "I sent them back." He said he pointed out that such a figure would be about 10 per cent higher than the Korean War peak and it would be "completely out of trend" of the nation's fiscal affairs.

Earlier this summer, Wilson was asked if there would be an Air Force reduction budget that projected figure, perhaps down to about present strength, and he replied that "if we know they have ample people to do the job."

Quarles Chief Air Proves Secretary of the Air Force Quarles said in a speech last week that U.S. airpower "is truly powerful beyond the imagination of man" and he added: "But there comes a time in the course of increasing our airpower, when we must make a determination of sufficiency." He said, too, there must be a constant review of requirements.

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### Helty Workman Over Own Barrel

Hartford, Aug. 8 (AP)—A Connecticut workman found himself over his own barrel recently, but unemployment Commissioner Frank S. Shea got him off.

The man, who had taken a job in a textile mill, was required frequently to bend down and pick up wool scrap and put it in a picker about four feet from the floor.

He "is a short man, five feet four inches and weighs about 185 pounds," according to the information. "A great deal of his weight is on his stomach."

He found it impossible to bend over his stomach to do his job, so quit after but one day at work, and filed for unemployment compensation.

"After trying out the work for one day," says Commissioner Shea, "the claimant told his boss that he could not do the work, and no other work was offered him. He is a short fat man and could not do the work, not so much because he was too short, but because of his obesity, especially around the stomach." He left his work with sufficient cause, he is entitled to unemployment benefits.

dam on the Nile had "precipitated" Nasser's decision to nationalize the canal.

Nehru said his government had accepted Britain's invitation to participate in the London conference after it was assured the meeting would not harm the "sovereignty and dignity of Egypt." It is a source in New Delhi had said previously that Nehru's acceptance would in no way commit him to approve the international control of the canal which the western Big Three hope the conference will agree to sponsor.

India was the 17th nation to take part in the meeting proposed by Britain, France and the United States. A British Foreign Office spokesman said it would be held no matter how many of the 24 nations invited refused to come.

Greece, desiring Egypt's backing for the Greek fight to get Cyprus away from the British, replied to Britain's invitation today with a proposal that the party be postponed. The Greeks also indicated they felt the conference site should be changed.

But informed sources in Athens are having made this gesture to Egypt, the Greek government probably would finally send a delegation to London.

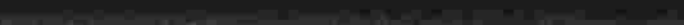

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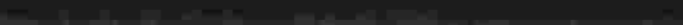
