By contrast, he said the Democrats are "close to the heart of the people," adding that they possess the leadership and experience to conduct the nation's affairs successfully on the home front and on world missions.

He recalled the GOP opposition with cries of "Nixon, Dixon and Yates... party of privilege and pillage," the Republican triple B-Benson, Bellow party and Bantrophy.

He said President Eisenhower "cannot Jim Hagerize his way through this whole campaign."

"We went over together a good many formulas which would be devised to assure a dependable international operation of that canal, consistent with the rights and dignity of Egypt."

"Therefore, I go hopefully and with confidence that we will have a peaceful solution."

In a second statement, made at the airport before departing, Dulles said he had a "deep awareness" of the importance of the London conference, which will make "bearing closely" on the peace and welfare of all nations. He said:

"The legitimate treaty rights and interests possessed by the world community in the Suez Canal, including of course those of Egypt, must be assured and respected."

Dulles pledged to "devote myself untiringly" to working out what he called a "satisfactory settlement" of the Suez problem which would avoid any hostilities.

President Eisenhower and congressional leaders at their Monday White House meeting, he said, "and I hope it has been a rather quiet day in their deep concern over the dispute."

All of us at the London conference will, I am sure, be conscious of the heavy responsibility, as it affects world security, which has fallen upon us," Dulles said.

"Accordingly, we can be hopeful of achieving positive results."

In London, meanwhile, Soviet Foreign Minister Dmitry Shepilov arrived for the conference on the Suez canal crisis and expressed a desire for peace.
