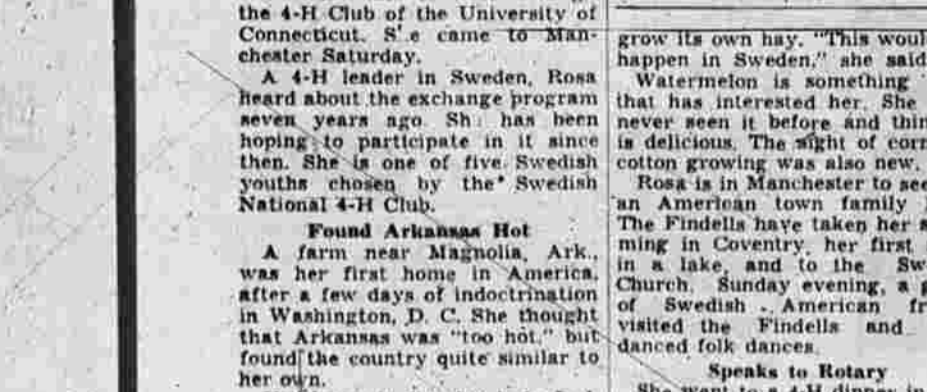

Cooley was in jail on that date.

Koniccki, Middlesex County state's attorney, prepared to ask the Superior Court at Middletown today to summon a grand jury to consider indicting Everett and his 25-year-old brother, Milton, a Guilford post-ironman, for the slaying of John Davis, 22, in Durham.

Middlesex County Coroner A. Harold Campbell opened an inquest into the Davis shooting yesterday.

Everett Cooley was arrested in North Branford Saturday afternoon in connection with the bizarre kidnaping of Mrs. Grace Drepper, 29, and the wounding of her husband, Air Force T. Sgt. Albert Drepper, 26. A search party found Cooley holding the unarmed Mrs. Drepper captive in woods near her home.

Prime Minister Solomon Bandaranaike of Ceylon said in Colombo he was submitting proposals to the conference aimed at solving the Suez Canal problem. He told a news conference he had discussed them with President Nasser of Egypt. He declined to give Nasser's reaction.

Foreign Minister Christian Pineau of France flew in from Paris for preliminary discussions today with Eden, Dulles and Lloyd on a Big Three plan for the Suez Canal.

In talks ended here Aug. 2, the three countries called the conference to set up international control of the canal as a counter to Egypt's nationalization of the 100-mile international waterway July 26.

Pineau told reporters at the airport this "may be a very difficult conference." He added he thought useful results could be produced even though Egypt declined to attend. He said the "France is convinced of the desirability of international control of the canal."

Before leaving Paris, Pineau said France would propose "a very reasonable system of management which should find a very substantial majority of support."

A solution must be found, he declared, "that should permit users of the canal to be safe from the possible fantasies of one government, whichever it may be. We cannot take risks, for our supply

in gasoline and our foreign trade are dependent on free passage of the canal.

A British crowd of about 200 cheered Dulles as he entered Eden's residence, smiling and relaxed. All previous international conferences, British newspapers have pictured him as a sober rather. Now they say he helped cool British and French passions over the canal question. He is popular with Britons who feel display of military strength will not make a position easier.

Dulles refused to answer reporters' questions at the airport, saying he had come to the British capital to "exchange views" with the representatives of the other 21 nations convening here tomorrow. "We hope for the solution so vital to the preservation and well-being of the entire world," the U.S. Secretary declared.

Representatives of the other nations meanwhile were arriving in waves. There was a parade of delegates in and out of the gray Foreign Office building, and night-seekers clustered on the sidewalks to see the diplomats.

The latest problem confronting the western Big Three was a reported Soviet scheme to junk the London talks before they get off the ground. Reports from Moscow said Soviet Foreign Minister Dmitri Shepilov planned to move for adjournment when the conference opens tomorrow and urge that the party be expanded and held at a different site.

Twenty-four nations were invited to attend the London conference following the July 26 nationalization of the Suez by Nasser. Greece and Egypt rejected the bid. Egypt declared all countries that 45 nations should be invited to any talks on the canal's future.

Although Russia decided with reservations to attend the London meeting, it supported Egypt's nationalization of the canal and said the list of nations invited to Suez talks should be broadened to include the Communist European countries and all Arab nations.

Shepilov was reported ready to announce that the Soviet Union would not abide by any conference decisions on the ground it is not competent to act without Egypt.

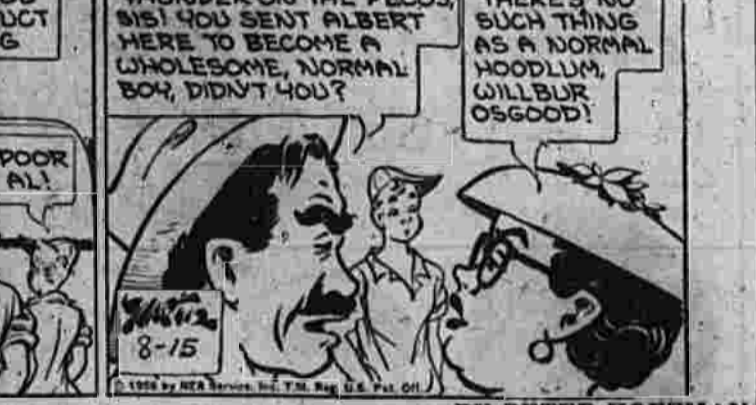

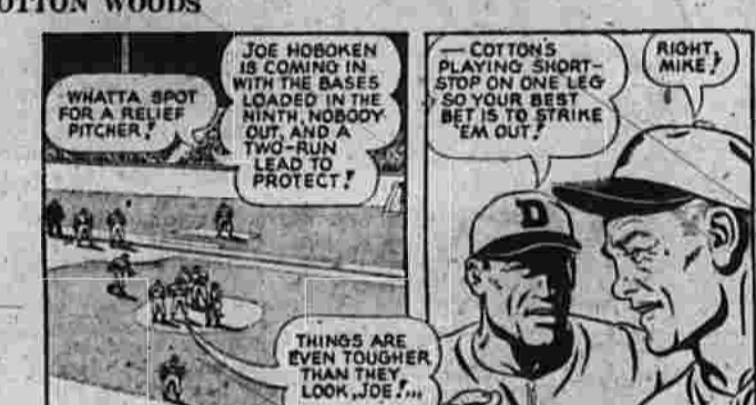

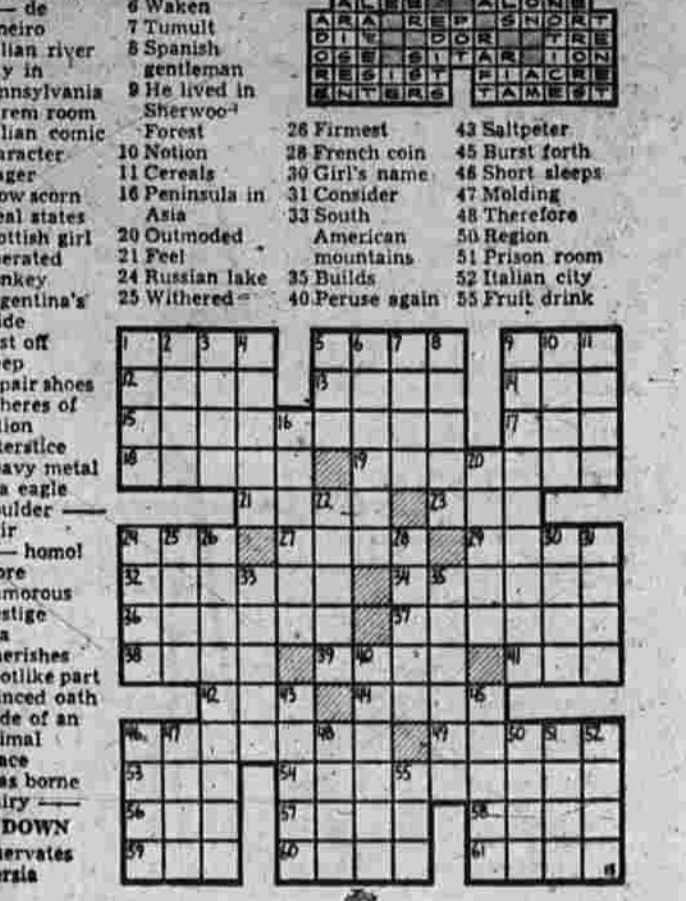

New York (AP)—This is a \$5-million derby, the "S" stands for sneezes—for five million Americans.

It is the opening of the annual hay fever season, when man's best friend is no longer his dog, but his pocket handkerchief—or the nearest air conditioning machine.

For the next month the land will be swarmed with sneezing and itching of more than 5 million U.S. victims of this peculiar allergy, which seems to be an old and as mysterious of origin as man himself.

Beware the watery-eyed sufferer for the next 31 days. Avoid the mischievous temptation to tell him that hay fever, like measles, is all in the mind, or that "it's no worse than an ordinary cold."

Hay fever is no joke to the sufferer who has it. Nor is it any joke to industry. The U.S. Public Health Service estimates hay fever costs \$4,700,000 lost work days each summer.

Dr. Rudolph L. Mayer, discoverer of pyributamine, an anti-histamine used in its treatment, lists allergies (hay fever is a leading form) among the first three chronic diseases in America, exceeded in number of cases only by heart ailments and mental illness.

"Actually, the first hay fever symptoms were described by physicians in Greece five centuries before the time of Christ," said Dr. Mayer.
