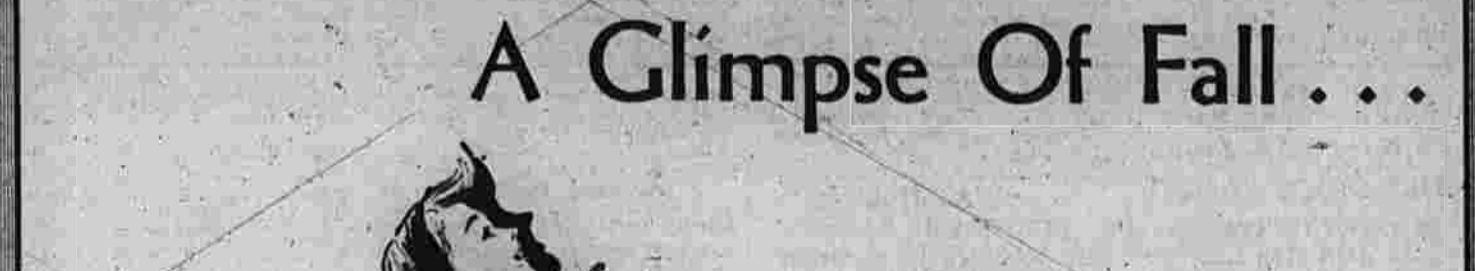

Quietly the Day Will Be Observed: St. James' 80 Years Old

Unobtrusively St. James Church will slip into the ranks of the octogenarians this weekend. The second oldest of Manchester's three Roman Catholic churches was blessed and dedicated Aug. 20, 1876 and is no less impressive today, as it sits atop a knoll on the west side of Main St., than it was on the memorable Sunday when the Rev. Thomas Galberry, bishop of Hartford, performed the ceremony.

A humble pastor, the Rev. James V. Campbell, offered prayers of gratitude for the new church. Father Campbell was the first of the church's seven pastors, all of whom have contributed their varied talents, traces of which are visible in the present day parish.

Trying Mission

There are few people living who can accurately recall the characteristics of this devoted cleric, but the legacy he bequeathed to the church has left a lasting impression of Father Campbell. St. James was a trying mission and Father Campbell worried about its future. His parishioners were few and far between. He was a pioneer and he was a missionary. Mosquito Disease Perils Bay State

Boston, Aug. 16 (AP)—Residents of eastern Massachusetts have been advised to protect children and infants from mosquito bites because of the threat of horse sleeping sickness, a disease of horses sometimes fatal to humans.

The State Health Department reported that two infants and two horses have died in the state this year, with the season just beginning. Last year, four humans contracted horse sleeping sickness, one infant died.

The disease is harbored by wild birds and is transmitted to humans and horses by mosquito bites. A vaccine affords protection to horses, but there is none for humans.

Health officials listed Bristol, Norfolk, and Worcester counties as areas most likely to be involved.

The department suggested that communities use sprays, especially in swampy areas, to reduce the mosquito population.

Father McGuck's activities were as diversified as they were beneficial. He was a trustee of Manchester Memorial Hospital and a member of the Manchester Board of Education. No public occasion, it was said, was complete without his presence.

When the town's fighting man returned home following the time of World War I, Father McGuck delivered the welcome address in his own inimitable style.

A show place among the ways the parish advanced under Father McGuck was the acquisition of additional land to the north of the rectory on Main St. and other landscaping projects which enlarged and beautified the grounds making the site a show place. Within the church he added the baptistry, installed an impressive new main altar and had much decoration work done.

His greatest interest outside the church was education and it was he who worked to bring the town's first and only parochial school into existence in 1922. The Rev. Father McGuck was a member of the parish school and a convent on Park St. which housed the convent staff, members of the Sisters of Mercy were opened. The school was planned to provide education

convention was who is to be Stevenson's running mate. One of the names which had figured in speculation seemed to be Albert Gore of Tennessee and John Kennedy of Massachusetts to make the nominating speech for him.

It seemed improbable that Stevenson would have tapped the boyish-looking Kennedy for this honor if he were minded to have him on the ticket as the No. 2 man.

The practical certainty of Stevenson's nomination was such that speculation over his possible vice presidential running mate became acute.

In the absence of any word from Stevenson, the race appeared to be narrowing into a three-way contest between Sen. Estes Kefauver and Albert Gore of Tennessee and Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota.

None of these three took any public part in a series of dramatic events in which the party's convention met at the Civil Rights headquarters and decided to march into the general election campaign under one banner.

James Finagun, Stevenson's campaign manager, said no decision had been made as between possible candidates. From another source it was reported, however, that Finagun was leaning toward a selection of a Roman Catholic, Finagun, a Catholic, was represented as believing the religious issue ought not to be raised.

Such a view by Finagun, if it were followed, would have the effect of eliminating Kennedy and Mayor Wagner of New York City from consideration.

Stevenson told a Vermont delegation meeting yesterday he had high regard for Kennedy, "welcoming his availability" but had made no decision.

Stevenson has indicated he is toying with the idea of tapping the convention pick of his running mate from a selected list of men he regards as acceptable. The thought apparently occurred to him before the convention began, the delegates might like to see a real contest for second place.

At the moment, Kefauver appeared likely to have the strongest backing in any such contest. Sen. Richard Neuberger, chairman of the Oregon delegation, said he thinks Stevenson's choice will be either Kefauver or Humphrey.

"It is an open convention choice," Estes (Kefauver) will get it.

Gov. George M. Leader said Kefauver has strength in the Pennsylvania delegation. He said Humphrey also had favorable mention there.

Sen. Robert Sikas said he thinks the Florida delegation would go for Stevenson. But his name was not mentioned by the delegates.

Premier Sen. James Huffman said he would support Stevenson if the delegates were to pick Kefauver among Ohio's delegates.

Sen. Mike Mansfield of Montana said he was guessing Stevenson would have the vice presidential choice up to the convention.

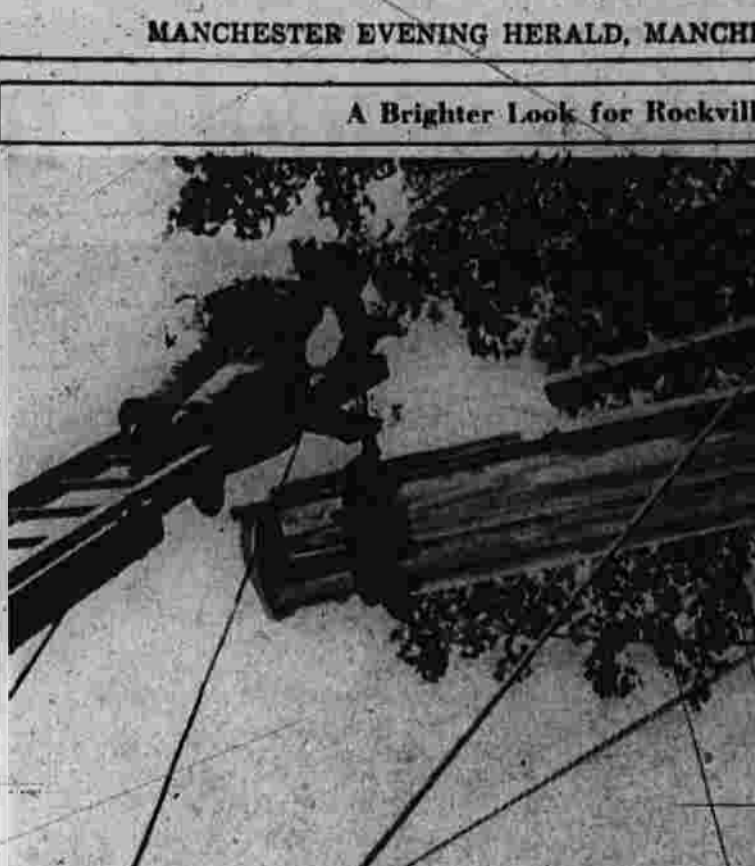

The 218 votes Stevenson had to spare were more than were polled by Gov. Averell Harriman of New York, his only rival. Harriman had 210 before the traditional move to make the Stevenson nomination unanimous.

Seven favorites soon divided the remainder of the convention's 1,372 votes. Then in the evening's most dramatic moment a seething Stevenson Strobe to the podium microphone.
