New York (AP)—The American housewife who has many virtues also leads the nation in one form of crime—shoplifting.

Light-fingered customers cost department and specialty stores at least \$300 million a year, and probably much more.

"The greatest loss comes from the 'housewife,'" said Mrs. Mary Congemi, one of the nation's top store detectives.

Mrs. Congemi, special agent for William F. Alexander, a former industry officer who acts as a security consultant for 34 department stores throughout the United States, has caught nearly 5,000 shoplifters in the last 10 years.

"Most shoplifters are amateurs," she said, "but the amateurs account for 75 per cent of the loss."

Women shoplifters outnumber men at least five to one, and either steal the person who actually steals from hunger in unusual cases.

Many people believe that most shoplifters suffer from kleptomania, or an irresistible compulsion to take something that doesn't belong to them, whether they have any real need for it or not.

Nixon, Langlie called on the Republicans in his speech to unite for "four more years of our crusade for a finer America."

Evidence of physical fitness Eisenhower's decision to arrive here a day earlier than originally scheduled was generally accepted by convention leaders as evidence of his belief in his physical fitness to take command of a new GOP "crusade"—his word for the 1960 campaign.

In Washington, White House press secretary James C. Hagerty said he had been "stalling" in previous comments and didn't know whether Eisenhower would have anything more to say about a running mate.

"Do I know what's going to happen when we go to San Francisco?" Hagerty asked himself. "No, I will not."

Eisenhower's appearance here is calculated to afford a chance to meet with him to some delegates who otherwise would see him only when he makes his acceptance speech at Thursday night's closing session of the convention.

Candidates for Senate and House seats and gubernatorial posts were expected to be included in these talks with Eisenhower.

May Embellish Convention

It is calculated to embellish a convention that has been offered in public interest from lack of controversy, although embellished as entertainment by professional stage and television.

The delegates and candidates who get to see Eisenhower close up will be expected to report this to their constituents from his June 9 little operation. Democrats have made it a point to talk about the health issue.

In this connection, Harry Goldwater of Arizona said he thinks Eisenhower's campaign dump Nixon has focused more attention on the health issue than the Democrats did.

Reports that Eisenhower would hold open house for possible rivals of Nixon were discounted on the ground that all of the delegates proposed by Stassen already had clear evidence that any move to stick their heads up against the Vice President would mean a convention clubbing.

'Spirit' of New Primary Law Being Violated, Says LaBelle

Atty. John D. LaBelle, chairman of the Democratic Town Committee, today asserted that local backers of State Sen. Paul Ametta appear to be violating "at least the spirit" of the new State primary law in some of their campaign activities.

He said the Ametta group is using the services of persons who, to the best of LaBelle's knowledge, are not registered Democrats and, therefore, "technically not eligible" for partisan activities in the primary campaign.

Ametta, a New Britain senator, will oppose State Sen. Patrick J. Ward in a primary Aug. 29 to decide the Democratic party's nominee for Congress from the First District.
