And between appearances, George Murphy, the actor-turned politician, was madly signaling the band to play "The Girl Who Came to Supper."

And as each speech ended, the girl with the sign went down on the convention floor before the speaker.

And when all the speeches were done, the girls suddenly flipped the signs over and, to and behold and heaven to Betty, all the signs, using the first letter of each speaker's subject, now spelled "Republican Women."

This definitely was a slick Madison Avenue job. Reminded me of a jazzy pageant you put on the seventh grade, when the girls came dressed as a book, symbolizing knowledge, and dressed as a tree symbolizing nature, and I was a big black chunk of coal for the day.

The women were all beautiful, but the members of President Eisenhower's cabinet weren't. Had the women stopped sooner or been scheduled for a later spot, the cabinet might have made better with their boss. As it was, the GOP wasted some of its biggest guns.

Television switched from the convention itself soon after the cabinet started talking to picture the landing of Eisenhower's plane and his drive downtown. In the hall, the delegate crowd began to stir out, probably because many were going to see the President come in.

That announcement, in all its ringing glory, reached a nationwide television audience while the cabinet dined.

After it was over, former Gov. Thomas E. Dewey was observed up on the platform, trying it out for size. He speaks tonight. Last night he asked technicians if the podium could be adjusted to his height. It could. He asked if another could be underlined on the teleprompter for emphasis. They could. Maybe things will be another tonight.

The Doctor Says

Some Diet Problems Are Solved, but Others Arise

In the not-so-distant past thousands of infants died from diarrheal diseases or other results of contaminated or malnourished food. Other thousands suffered from such diseases as rickets or scurvy resulting from insufficient vitamins in their diet.

A Boston physician recently pointed out that modern safeguards against contamination of food have worked so that the old "summer complaint" is practically meaningless to today's young mothers. This has resulted partly from the almost universal use of pasteurized milk and household refrigeration.

Another subject frequently mentioned a few years ago was what was called "feeding problems" in infants. These children were switched from one formula to another because they did not seem to be doing well. Now such difficulties are recognized as coming from a free system of emotional instability in the mother and other causes unrelated to the food itself. Feeding problems still occur, but are less common and less serious than they were 25 years ago.

Perhaps all the feeding problems of infants and children have not yet been solved and this is certainly the case in certain parts of the world. For example, kwashiorkor is considered to be both common and severe nutritional disorder of children in the tropics and semitropics.

Questions of infant diet still remain. The Boston doctor wonders, for example, whether the trend of giving infants solid foods at ever younger ages is entirely desirable. He compelling evidence of physiological advantage or disadvantage attending the early feeding of solid foods has appeared in his writing.

Another development is the greater use of foods especially processed for children. These foods, which are canned or frozen, can be made ready, but this does not necessarily mean that they are the best.

The physician suggested that dependence on a special type of prepared food might tend to confer on a child the attributes of special delicacy or inattention, or the which do not lead to the best acceptance of life.

Finally, the question is raised as to whether attention has not shifted from the problem of malnutrition of children to that of keeping some of the adolescents from eating too much. It is a possibility that some adolescent youths eat too little (or unwise) but that more eat poor combinations or too much.

Trustees Moving To Publish Post

Boston, Aug. 22 (AP)—A petition for the issuance of trustee certificates to obtain funds with which to reorganize the Boston Post newspaper was to be heard today by Federal Judge George C. Sweeney.

Three court-appointed trustees said last night they had been virtually assured sufficient loans to get the 125-year-old morning newspaper back into operation if the court approves their application.

They said any individual or corporation lending money under the reorganization plan would rate top priority on repayments if assets in the newspaper eventually have to be liquidated.

The Post suspended publication last Wednesday after most of its 140 employees refused to work unless they were paid about \$180,000 in back wages and benefits.

The following day publisher John Fox petitioned Federal Court for reorganization under the Bankruptcy Act.

The court appointed Charles W. Bartlett, Joseph P. Healey and Thomas W. Lawicki, all Boston attorneys, as trustees.

Meanwhile, officials of the American Newspaper Guild and the Mechanical Unions were to meet to discuss conditions under which workers would return to their jobs on the Post if it resumes publication.

coming school year will exceed 7,300—up 10 per cent over one year ago. Last year, the school was able to admit only 2,500 new students.

In 1955, he said, there were 600 Connecticut residents attending colleges in Connecticut on a full or part-time basis and on a graduate or undergraduate level. He said that represents 20 per cent of the 18-21 age group.

"Increase in enrollment are accelerating," he said, "because a larger percentage of the college-age group is going to college. The State university should be encouraged to do its part to meet the anticipated increase in college enrollment."

The educator rejected what he called "a babble of voices proposing every conceivable short-cut in the training of youth."

"Yielding to the many short-sighted proposals would mean regression and abandonment of faith in the unique feature of our public system of higher education as the foundation of the American way," he added.

Elaborating on this "short-cut" idea, President Jorgensen said today he was referring in part to two suggestions being made by some sources.

One calls for a large number of other advocates that the students pay a major part of the costs in running the university.

Neither of these, he said, would solve the problem since it would not make more room available for students—the latter being the big task to solve.

With the enrollment pressure rising rapidly from year to year, he said the state cannot wait to get off construction of the needed buildings and other facilities.

"Buildings cannot be built in a day," he said. "Records reveal that it takes from three to four years after a facility is authorized by the General Assembly before it can be constructed, equipped and ready for use."

President Jorgensen told the governor that private colleges in Connecticut have planned expansion for several thousand additional students, but that will still be inadequate. This, he said, the state must meet by expanding its own university.

Budget Hearings Started by Board

Rockville, Aug. 22 (Special)—Preliminary hearings on the 1956-57 town budgets began last night as the Board of Finance met with the Board of Selectmen and Town Treasurer Ray Hunt.

The Board will meet with members of the Board of Education to discuss the school budget tonight. Mrs. Edwin Pease, secretary said today.

These two budget appropriations, largest expenses for the town are both record breaking. The school board is seeking \$748,570 while the selectmen are asking \$126,360.

While these two items represent substantial increases over the present budget other departmental requests are about the same as in recent years, Mrs. Pease said.

A public hearing on the entire budget is planned later.

Young Yank Singers Learning Ropes in German Opera Houses

Wiesbaden, Germany (AP)—Thwarted by the "closed shop" in U.S. opera, dozens of young Americans are pouring out the music that is in them in German opera houses.

They're getting valuable experience and they're working in their beloved opera—but whether they will achieve their ambition of returning in triumph to the stage of the Metropolitan is another question.

In the United States, where there are few opera companies of the stature of the Metropolitan, there is room only at the top. Not so in West Germany, where there are some 70 opera houses, playing as long as 10 months of every year.

Union Meets Americans

There are so many American singers that the Theater Union, monthly organ of German Stage Artists Union, recently let out a blast of them. The magazine claimed American had "invaded" the traditional German operatic scene. And now Americans singing in Germany as well as the rest of Western Europe are being squeezed out by trade union.

There are at least 30 American performers in Germany today. Typical of them is a young basso from York, Pa., who has been singing at the Hildebrand Theater in Wiesbaden for the last three seasons. Born Lee Wolosky, he sings under the name of Leonardo Wolosky.

Wagner point articles that "course I want to sing at the Met—who doesn't?" The 33-year-old singer is a realistic one, and he recognizes it as a long, tough fight.

Performers at Wiesbaden

Wolosky was singing at the Wiesbaden Opera House last season, plus numerous appearances in nearby towns. Of his 60-opera repertoire, one of his favorites is the role of King Philip in Verdi's "Don Carlos." He has been in Europe for 10 years. He speaks fluent German, Italian and French.

"A singer can establish a better future for himself here than anywhere else," Wolosky says. "Not only are there many opera companies to choose from, but you can sing under German music laws and get many more social advantages."

Wolosky is quite enthusiastic about the assistance given him by the c. o. p. a. n. y.'s Friedrich Schramm, who doubles as general manager and artistic manager. Schramm is also an enthusiast; "Germany is the best country for opera in the world."

Operation of Wiesbaden house costs a million dollars a year. The city and the state make up the deficit of the three-quarters of a million.

"Of course I welcome American singers," Schramm says. "I want the best talent I can get, and I don't care where they come from."

He is quick to point out, however, that "American musical preparation is better. They know more about the science and history of music."

The Eisenhower Touch

From the entertainment point
of view, the Republican conven-
tion at San Francisco could be seen
as a good healthy scrap. That
would do more for its na-
tion-wide audience, and for its
own delegates, than all the care-
fully rehearsed spontaneous demon-
strations the convention man-
agement has arranged.

There seems no healthy scrap in
prospect. There seldom is for
the convention of a party which is in
power, with a President to re-
nominate, unless there is a con-
troversy over the selection of his
running mate. Such a controversy,
for instance, twice gave drama and
interest to conventions in which
Franklin D. Roosevelt was being
automatically renominated. The
Republicans, this year, might have
had such a controversy for them-
selves, and they may, come Nov-
ember, be sorry they didn't have
it. But at the moment the situa-
tion seems one in which even the
President himself would have to
fight hard to make the convention
accept any change in its second
spot nomination.

This situation inevitably leaves
the hope of the convention, for
drama and interest, centered on
the person, initiative and conduct
of one man, President Eisenhower
himself.

Thus, last night, the President,
by arriving a day ahead of sched-
ule, provided the only touch of
the unexpected the convention had
to date. So cameras and delegates
alike flocked to the routines of the
convention to see such a simple
thing as the arrival of one man.
And the obvious fact that man
had for the process was perhaps
in reality, more important news
than anything that had been de-
veloping at the convention itself.

The convention may be dull and
colorless and placid for its dele-
gates and for the nation; but like
Roosevelt at his convention in
1936, the touch of this one man
may transform it, and he seems
eager to supply that touch. His as-
sociates say, today, that he has
taken note of the fact that the
Democrats have finally decided to
point their campaign guns directly
at him, and that his own ardor
for the campaign has been cooled
so that the decision to begin it
early, and with bounce, was his
own.

And the truth is, of course, that
he does something for his party—
something no other of its leaders
seems able to do. The convention,
in its first two days, teetered be-
tween the past and the future,
much as did the Democratic gath-
ering at Chicago. To match the
ghost of Trumanism at Chicago
there has been the ghost of long
Republican negativism at San
Francisco.

The voice of Governor Langlie
was a forward voice. But those of
Knowland, Martin, and Hoover
were the voices of another kind of
Republican party—the kind of party
which hasn't won an election
since that of 1928. The Democrats,
at Chicago, finally decided not to
have their ghosts setting the pat-
tern for their approaching cam-
paign. The early presence of Eisen-
hower at San Francisco can help
lift the mood and atmosphere of
the Republican campaign away
from its own ghosts, and toward
the new spirit and new outlook
which did create the victory in
1952, and upon which victory in
1956, also depends.

G.O.P. on Civil Rights Plank
The Republican civil rights plank
at San Francisco is, like the Demo-
cratic plank, a compromise, dis-
appointing to extremists on both
sides of the issue. It is, as it stands,
particularly disappointing to those
who had hoped that the Republi-
can party would take a more vigor-
ous, forthright, uncompromising

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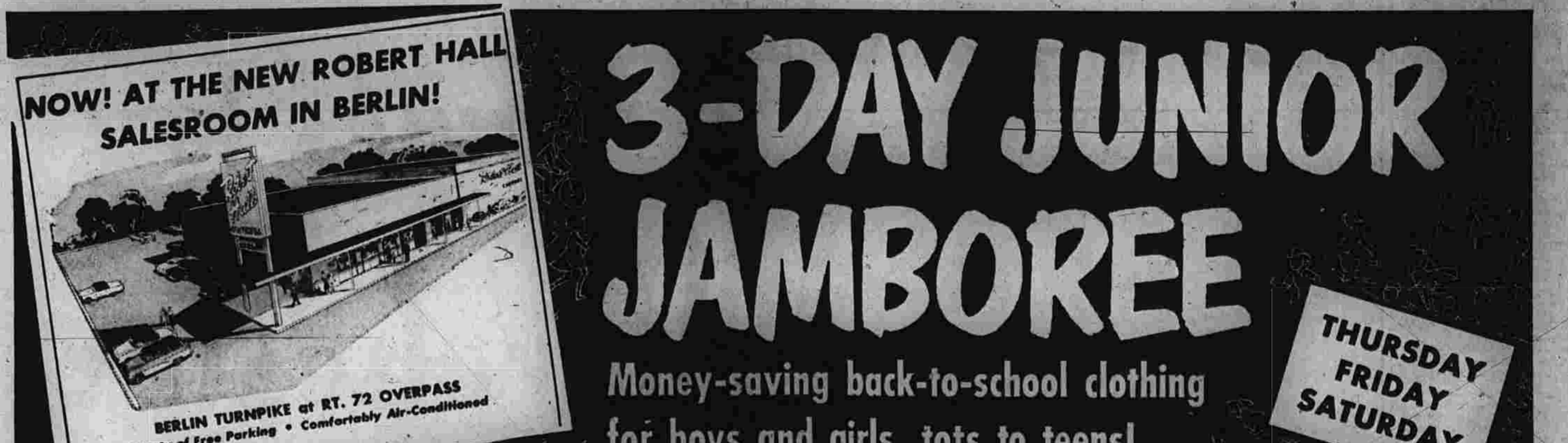

Eleventh Man

A tip-off on the all-round class of the pitching staff is that Bob Trowbridge is the eleventh man on the staff. He was almost an unknown when he blanketed the International League all-stars with one hit in Toronto last July 23.

On almost every other major league club Trowbridge's superb job would have won him an immediate starting assignment. But Manager Fred Haney is so rich in pitching that young Trowbridge had to wait until August 8 for his first starting call. Then he pitched a three-hit shutout against the Washington Senators. The next day Taylor Phillips, who had gone only six innings, beat the Cardinals, 4 to 1. Phillips came back with another great performance August 13, to beat the slugging Cincinnati Redlegs on seven hits.

KANSAS BENEFACTORS

This Husband Shouts Fowl For Skeet Champion Spouse

Dallas (AP)—Alphonso Ragland, an expert marksman, gave up trying to teach his wife, Betty, skeet shooting five years ago.

So she went to a professional, Henry Bickers, who detected her rawness—she was swinging her shotgun so quickly tracking the flight of the bird that she was firing well ahead of the target.

Now she fires when she picks up the bird in her sights and the fast swing of the shotgun gives her the lead she needs.

And she now is one of the two or three finest women skeet shooters in the world.

Good Swimmer

Betty was a good swimmer and she shot well until she broke her leg, but poor eyesight made her an unlikely candidate as a modern day Annie Oakley.

But with glasses her eyes are sharp.

Mrs. Ragland took up skeet shooting as she could hunt her husband, who is an indefatigable hunter. Now she shoots her share of quail and pheasant in season and then prepares the fowl with the skill of a French chef. She is a small blonde with the tatty hair of her Puma ancestors.

Recently Betty fired 350 rounds with a League shotgun and broke six targets, winning three of five women's championships in the Texas State Skeet shoot. She and her husband tied the world's record for husband and wife with 293 targets out of 400.

Consistent Winner

She has been a consistent winner in skeet shoots for several years, as a member of the women's All-American team and is on a national skeet-shooting all-time team of women skeet shooters.

After she learned to control her lightning-fast swing in 1951, Betty tied for the national all-gauge handicap title.

This year she started by breaking 100 targets in a row with her husband. She was the first to break 100 targets in a row in the world's skeet championship. She won the men's and women's open competition in that meet—the Houston Open.

At New Orleans in April she won all five women's events. She went on to break 199 out of 200 targets in the men's open.

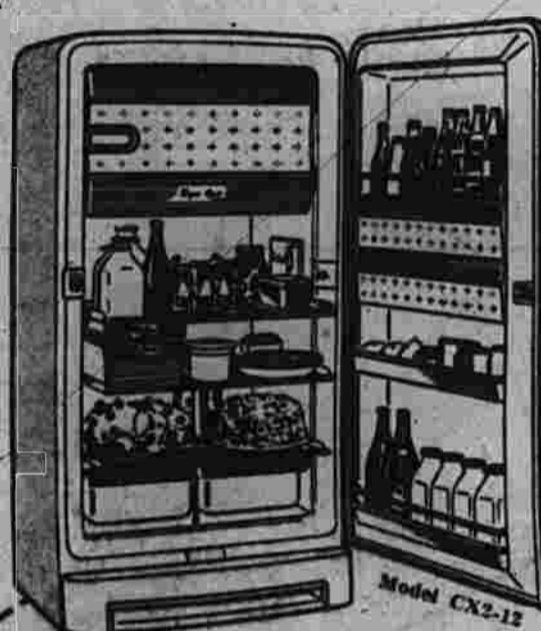

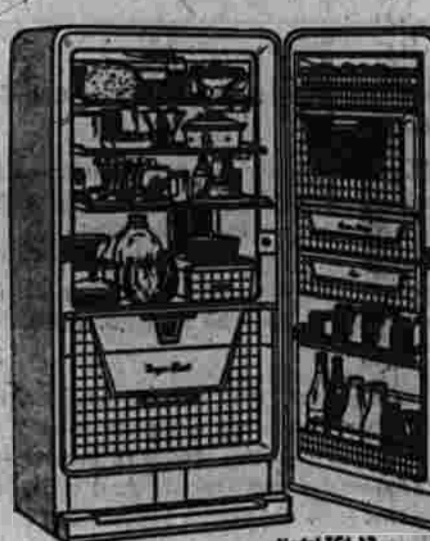
