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Virginia Governor's Plan Defies Ban on School Bias

Richmond, Va., Aug. 27 (AP)—Gov. Thomas B. Stanley today headed the Virginia General Assembly in his plan to prevent a break-through in the school segregation line by cutting off state money from any locality that may seek to buck the system.

With two Virginia localities—Charlottesville and Arlington—already under federal court orders to begin desegregation this coming term and next, Stanley called for adoption of a program aimed at giving counties, cities and towns the choice of continued racial separation in the schools or no state-supported public schools at all.

There should be no reason to close school in Virginia under this legislation, Stanley told the opening joint session of the House and Senate in a special session of the legislature.

Alabama Votes On School Bias Plan, Tuesday BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Alabama voters ballot tomorrow on a plan designed to preserve segregation in public schools.

Alabama voters ballot tomorrow on a plan designed to preserve segregation in public schools. The "freedom of choice" plan proposed by the legislature would eliminate from the state constitution barriers to integrated classes and a requirement that the state provide free education for its youth.

It would permit parents to designate segregated classrooms for their children and give the legislature broad powers to abolish a public school threatened with court order to integrate.

Another proposed constitutional amendment would allow voters and city governing bodies to sell or lease school property to private voters, recreational facilities and public housing units in order to prevent court-ordered integration.

Leading the ratification campaign on the "freedom of choice" plan has been State Sen. Albert Boutwell of Birmingham. He says the plan would not prohibit forbidding a parent from choosing to send a child to an integrated school.

Under an enabling act already passed, the legislature could abolish an integrated school, Boutwell points out. Dr. Anita R. Meador, state superintendent of education, contends that knocking the ban on integrated schooling out of the State Constitution would weaken the state's position. And, he says.

"June 22 - I have written to the Gen. to ask for clock bombs from Athens." "June 23 - I reported to Gen. . . that I am preparing something more serious. . . I asked for approval to execute by ambush the commander in chief of Middle East Forces."

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Rockville Tax Bills Mailed To City Residents

Rockville, Aug. 27 (Special) - City residents have received tax bills of 1955 for the October 1955 Grand List, it was announced today by Mr. Betty Kretzschmar, tax collector. The bills are due Sept. 1. Those who pay the taxes on or before Sept. 15 will receive the customary discount of five per cent, the tax collector said. Nasser Held Ready For Talks on Suez

(Continued from Page One)

...were being loaded with ammunition and military equipment. Experienced diplomats in Moscow, however, said they believed the Soviet government feels there is little chance the West will start a shooting war over the Suez. The Soviet government was reported to have taken the British and French willingness to negotiate as a sign of weakness.

Britain and France have charged that Nasser's long-headed control of the canal impedes western Europe's lifelines, particularly the flow of Middle-East oil.

Charges and countercharges flow over whether Egyptian nationalization of the 47-year-old waterway was impeding the efficiency of its operation.

The Suez Canal Co. the private, internationally owned company that operated the canal until Nasser seized it, charged in a statement issued in London and Paris that interference by Egyptian officials, dismissal of staff, and a sniping was disrupting morale, particularly of the expert foreign pilots who guide ships through the waterway.

The canal employs about 200 pilots, half of them from England and France.

The Middle East News Agency, in turn, replied that the company statement was an "open invitation" to the foreign employees to quit their jobs. It charged that the British and French governments had made "tempting offers" to pay pilots their salaries for three years if they would quit. It added that two governments were exerting diplomatic pressure to prevent Italians and citizens of other nations from accepting employment on the canal.

In Tel Aviv, Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion told a conference of his Mapai (Labor) party that security and peace never could be assured in the Middle East until Israel was assured of complete freedom of navigation in the Red Sea and the canal. He cleared all Arab pilots were preparing for a "second round" of war against Israel and were following the policies of Hitler in advocating the liquidation of Israel's people.

However, Ben-Gurion assailed Israeli advocates of a preventive war against the Arab states. He said a war, even if it ended in victory, would not solve Israel's problem.

Egypt, still in a technical state of war with Israel, bars Israeli ships from the canal as well as other ships carrying cargo she deems "strategic to the Jewish state."

"A nuclear device can mean either atomic or hydrogen," Hagerty said, "and that is as far as we can go."

19th Soviet Blast

This was the 13th announcement by the United States of nuclear explosions by the Soviet Union, but Strasna said the actual number of explosions by the Soviet Union has been significantly higher than 13.

'Quality of Mercy' Topic of Sermon By Local Pastor

Yesterday at Emanuel Lutheran Church, Pastor C. Henry Anderson preached on "The Quality of Mercy." Scripture text Matthew 5:44-48.

In part he said, "Whenever the Sermon on the Mount is set forth as containing the basic standards on which a new world of peace and goodwill can be built, we hear comments of two types: first, that these standards are impossible for us to achieve as individuals, and secondly, that they are outdated in today's competitive and divided world. What we fail to remember is that Scripture tells us, 'As many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God.' So the secret of living by these precepts is found in personal fellowship with Jesus Christ. Mercy and forgiveness are at the heart of the Christian gospel, and there is no great deal of either abroad in our generation. From the accounts of brutal treatment accorded the sick and prisoners in the Korean War to the race segregation stonings in recent months in our own land, we are reminded (see the fact that humans can be cruel to one another and that revenge or hate can cause irreparable results.)

We are inclined to consider mercy a sign of weakness, and that those who advocate it are not living in reality but rather in an idealistic dream world. It seems human for us to want to teach those who have hurt us a lesson they won't forget, yet it is quite clear that our Lord considered the
