SMFD Voters May Decide Consolidation Issue Soon

Commissioners of the South Manchester Fire District will probably call a special meeting tonight to discuss the consolidation of the regular November meeting at which the district voters will be asked to decide on joining the town fire department.

George W. C. Hunt, treasurer and spokesman for the fire district, announced at a meeting of the commissioners tonight that the voters will be asked to decide on joining the town fire department.

In the opinion of the commissioners, Hunt added, the district should remain independent for a number of reasons. Perhaps the most important is that the town fire department would be more costly.

There is talk, he said, in a reference to a vote taken by the Fire Protection and Utilization Study Committee of adding more police to a projected town fire department. This would be in the MPD.

The committee thought nine paid men should be added there, to bring the ratio of paid men to men in line with that of the SMFD.

The commissioners tend to feel a town fire department would, by nature, become a more complex operation to administer than would require the services of more trained people than are now engaged in the running of the district, many of whom serve without pay.

Is An Era Dead?

Some high-flown commentators, for whom his mind will be following the thought, are tentatively announcing the end of an era for this nation—the end of an era of fighting over the past.

They hope we are not repeating the mistakes of 1932, and out of the equally cheap and false effort to pretend that the Korean war was a policy which on the part of Harry Truman, rather than a sound and inescapable fulfillment of American policy in the world.

They hope we can look to the future. And they base this hope on the fact that both major party candidates for the presidency this year seem to have selected the future, rather than the past, for their topic.

Well, this wistful picture of our political future is certain to be shared, many times over, in the campaign that lies ahead. No matter what the two leading candidates may do, there will be underlings who will tell us again of the horrors of Hoover depression and of the shame of Truman's war in Korea.

There will also be underlings who will tell us that the sins of the New Deal and the socialist allegiance of the Republican party, who will tell us that the Democrats are too radical and the Republicans too reactionary.

But underneath these predictable words on the kind of campaign most of us would like to see, underneath even whatever bluish the two principal candidates themselves may be tempted to utter, as the things grow hot, there will indeed be certain realities.

In both parties, leadership has, to varying extents, turned away from its preoccupation with the past. Stevenson has abandoned the revolutionary fervor of the New Deal as surely as Eisenhower has abandoned what used to be the reactionary fervor of Republicans who demanded that it be repeated.

What this means, apart from personalities and particular parties, is that a normal pattern of human history has been followed, and our good fortune is that it has followed rather smoothly and faithfully. You have unrest, which creates a revolution, which creates a hectic mixture of reform and nonsense, which generates a desire for quiet and order, counter-revolution, which is followed, if the country is lucky, by a moderate adjustment, in which the good things created by the revolution are preserved and the foolishness discarded. So, at least, the long battle over the New Deal is over, with parts of it accepted, parts of it rejected, parts of it modified, and neither side quarreling violently with the way it stands now.

The two parties are obviously somewhat less willing to give up the last touches of their long struggle over foreign policy. Eisenhower took a proportionate force in Korea the Democrats had formulated, but did not dare take. The Democrats, unable to admit that he did the right thing they did not dare to do, are under a cheap temptation to accuse Eisenhower of being left on his own terms, as the Republican right wing used to accuse the Democrats themselves of being soft. Eisenhower has not yet brought himself to saying that the things Eisenhower has done in foreign policy means he himself would have been likely to do, and the Republicans, for their part, are still unable to escape the sin of pretending that
