Connecticut Yankee

Connecticut was handed, and Connecticut took, a beating at both national conventions. The spotlight is now more on the presidential nomination than on the primary obligation to the client, the legal profession or to the public.

He went on to say that the country needs more young lawyers who would rather be right than who would rather be famous. He said that the country needs more honest than excited, and good lawyers rather than clever lawyers.

Amber to that, for all professions and callings.

Still, we think both Sheppard and the public opinion polls were unfair to the profession as a whole. The trouble, we think, is that here, more than in any other profession, the few bad apples in the barrel have a disproportionate influence on what the public thinks it smells. Some few lawyers will do almost anything. They consider themselves licensed to serve their client, no matter what his aims or motives, or deeds, to the exclusion of any slightest consideration of their obligation to the profession or to the public. They are out for money, and the kind of reputation which will bring more money, ahead of honor. And, as they do, they demonstrate that there are some lawyers who will do anything for such goals. They are likely to become headlines for their profession, and do anything too much to shape its public reputation, while their more worthy and honorable fellow members almost unnoticed in the background.

In short, it costs the bar more to have a few of the wrong kind of members than it costs other professions. And this, although natural, is manifestly unfair. It is not fair to judge the profession, or the main body of its members, by the performance of those who consider it their mandate to outwit rather than serve the law, to cheat justice rather than follow it, to protect unscrupulous operations rather than check them. These are indeed the few. Certainly, if their traits could be detected early enough, they should be barred from the profession in the first place. Certainly perhaps, the bar itself might well consider whether it can forever afford to be as lax with them as it generally is, once they have become established in the profession. But until the few bad apples can be kept out, or tossed out, if they can, the public, for its part, should make some effort to judge the profession by its majority, rather than by its minority.

CCE Backs Lavitt's Position; Fears Lowering of Standards

Rockville, Aug. 30 (Special)—Concurring with a statement made by Seymour F. Lavitt earlier this week that high school population would approach the 1,000 mark by 1963-64, the Citizens Committee for Education today reiterated its position pointing up the urgency for immediate construction of new high schools.

"If the appropriation for the planned new high school is favorably voted this fall, the building can be ready in time to eliminate the need for lowering educational standards," the CCE said in a statement.

The CCE and Lavitt has been vociferous foes of a recommendation by a city-appointed study group that early this month called for establishment of two separate school districts here, one in rural Vernon, the other in Rockville.

Lavitt has countered the recommendation by proposing consolidation of the city and town governments. The CCE's position has been that separate school districts would lower educational standards here without any appreciable saving of money.

In its statement today, the CCE says it feels Lavitt's figures predicting 1,000 high school pupils by 1963 are probably conservative. It says that in 1958, pointing up the urgency for immediate construction of the new high school, the statement said: "Predictions regarding enrollment are based on the basis of actual enrollment figures as used in the Two-District report to show size of future high school classes, and figures for elementary schools were based on school administrators, according to the statement."

"These figures indicate capacity will be reached by 1958, without the need for further construction," the CCE said. It also stated that, according to the office of the superintendent of schools, actual enrollments over the past five years have averaged 100 pupils over the predicted number, "thus making it possible that the total capacity will be reached, earlier than 1958."

All Vernon and Talbotville town school administrators have been urged to meet Tuesday through Thursday 9:30 A. M. to 3:30 P. M. Friday until 8:30 P. M.

terred with peaceful integration until a hearing at which they must show cause why they should be enjoined permanently.

The judge acted after Sheriff Joe Owen took 11 Negroes out of newly integrated Clinton High school to protect them from what he described as a "mulling mob" around the school. There were about 500 people outside and "I thought somebody might get hurt."

The crowd gathered after three uninvited Negroes were charged with disorderly conduct. The three were charged with fighting and disorderly conduct. The judge ordered the school to be closed after a group of white people.

It was the first violence in the tense first three days of integration at the school, which has about 800 white students and 15 Negroes registered.

Principal D. J. Britain yesterday rejected what he called an "ultimatum" from Kasper and his group of white students to leave the school or resign.

Britain said he and County School Board Chairman Frank Kasper had been acting under a "misapprehension" that the school was closed.

"We didn't have any choice under the law," Britain said. "I told Kasper I would not be intimidated or scared out of my job."

The student body then gave Britain an unanimous vote of confidence, 414-0.

When It's Their Ox

Partly, of course, it is merely a question whose ox is being grazed. Britain and France, and almost of the rest of the world, have always considered it ridiculous and impossible that we should stand ready to fight over Quomo and Matsu, or even Formosa itself. And they consider us stupid to be on those islands, with Chiang Kai-shek, to be one of the world's great threats to peace. They would have us get out, and leave Chiang Kai-shek to wether, or even to be conquered. And they are certainly right to this extent: that we have to come to terms with the existence of Communist China before there can be any certain prospect for peace in the Far East.

There, in the Far East, Formosa and Chiang Kai-shek comprise our ox. Formosa is considered by some of our military experts, a strategic position for us. And our pride and prestige have been engaged, rightly or wrongly, in the case of Chiang Kai-shek's survival.

In the Near East on the other hand, the ox belongs to Britain and France. Their pride and prestige have been riding assiduously upon dominance in the Eastern Mediterranean even more than our world position depends upon Formosa. France sees a psychological key to all her own relations with North Africa in the fate of Nasser.

We, on the other hand, are able to be fairly dispassionate about the Suez Canal. And we consider it ridiculous and impossible that Britain and France should threaten the peace of the world by taking a military stance on the issue. We consider it necessary and inevitable that they come to peaceful terms with the existence of Nasser's Egypt. And we are right on that, just as Britain and France are more nearly right on Formosa than we are.

Nevertheless, what Britain and France think and feel has merely succeeded, along with our own better instincts, perhaps, in tempering the situation over Formosa. And what we think is having a tough time of it making any dent in the hard-bitten intentions of Britain and France with regard to Egypt. We soft-soaped them at London, and thought we had them gentled down. But today, with Britain's base troops on Cyprus, itself a shocking piece of discord in the world situation, our preaching of moderation has been given a sharp and ugly challenge. Our two best friends in the world seem unable to get us to take advice, when it is our ox, or to take advice from us, when it is their ox.

NATO Group to Study Dispute on Suez Canal

(Continued from Page One)

Parliament recessed for the summer a month ago.

The announcement that Britain had consented to French use of the British island base only 250 miles from the Suez Canal, was made in the Egyptian press, apparently with official sanction, whirled up charges that the British, who had plotted, in Cairo, against President Nasser.

Two More Bombers Bred

Cairo authorities said two more bombers were bred in all-Indo-China. James Swinburn, alleged ringleader of the plot, Egyptian newspapers reported Swinburn had confessed that the group planned to strip a result that which would be a severe blow to Nasser's prestige.

The group counts nine up even as Nasser set a date and place for the meeting in Cairo. The meeting with the Suez Canal committee, headed by Australian Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies, the committee is to present the US-sponsored plan for international control of the canal which is the 23 nations at the London conference endorse.

Nasser seized the canal for his government July 26 and the British and French have been preparing ever since to take the canal in case a peaceful compromise cannot be worked out or their citizens in Egypt are endangered by any incident.

Although the landing of French troops promised to complicate the already troubled political situation in Cyprus, it appeared Britain welcomed the French request because it emphasized the British argument that the island is essential to the North Atlantic Alliance's defense position in the East Mediterranean.

The French Foreign Office said the French government had agreed that a "contingent" of French troops should be temporarily stationed in Cyprus.

The French said that in view of developments in the island, they wished to be in a position to insure, in case of need, the protection of French nationals and their interests.

The French announced that the French fleet would be sent to the island for secret destinations with military equipment and the aircraft carrier Arromanches and the same day in what was described as maneuvers.

Cyprus is a much closer staging area for France, whose troops and warships until now have been maintained at an alert base at Toulon, in France, and in Algeria. Britain already has dispatched paratroop reinforcements and aircraft units to the island base, headquarters for Britain's Middle East Forces.

Rocks Still Pouch Nasser

At the Menzies Committee prepared to leave London Sunday for Cairo, the Soviet Union appeared to be the only non-Arab power still urging Nasser not to compromise.

The Egyptian's other major supporter at the London Conference, V. K. Krishna Menon of India, talked with Nasser for two hours after telling reporters India is seeking "some peaceful solution satisfactory to the parties concerned."

Menon, Prime Minister Nehru's foreign affairs adviser, presented a plan at the London meeting for Egyptian operations through the Suez Canal with an international board exercising only advisory functions.

But he said India would be urging Nasser to limit his concessions to the Indian plan. Menon, Indian Foreign Minister, Russian Indian Plan, who had supported the Suez Canal, had supported the plan for a peaceful settlement also was reported from Sunday.

Soviet Ambassador E. D. Kisselov said in Cairo, however, that Russia still believes the solution should be based on "the sovereign rights of Egypt as an owner and operator of the canal."

When he was deported last March, British charged he had failed to denounce the two rival factions in the Greek Cypriot campaign to end British rule.

In another action linked to the information in the documents, British officials confirmed the Axel Lader's understudy, the Greek Cypriot leader, the late Archbishop Makarios, was shot and wounded while standing on his balcony at a motion picture theater. At Yerokostas, a British military base was wounded slightly by a shrapnel hit.

British Gen. Sir John Harding warned the Cypriots to be prepared for an "uneasy period with the island suspended between fear and hope."

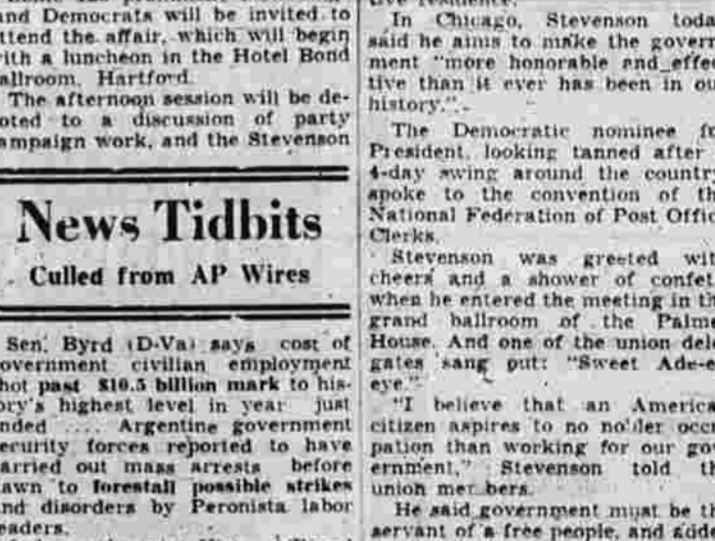
