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subman. But however it stood as a theory, it is now gone, along with other transitory dreams of atomic mastery. The Russians, it is said, have now unchained us in the development of the smaller, tactical bombs. We are even, and estimated again, to have a hydrogen bomb. This is, obviously, an accused foolishness, of which only nations would be capable, and we can realize just how foolish it is: if we simply stop and think that one moment we assume mastery goes with the 'biggest bomb' while the next moment, without even a change of expression, we are mastery of possession of the smallest bomb. That is actually the way we have been acting.

One moment we pride ourselves on explosion of the world's most destructive bomb, and the next we pride ourselves on the destruction of the latest, least destructive bomb. When will such atomic foolishness ever end? Not, obviously, until we abolish war itself. And, as both our candidates for President agree, that is no longer a nice, pleasant thought, but a realistic imperative.

But while we delay on that problem, and refuse to face up to it, we are frittering away a lot of time, not only in a futile quest for some kind of atomic mastery, but also in all kinds of evasive attempts to try to control the atom ahead of war. Thus, for instance, we insist that we cannot agree to any abandonment of atomic tests until we have a system of inspection inside Russia to see if it is enforced. But we announce such Russian inspection we care to announce within hours of its happening, as accurately as if some inspector were standing beside the explosion.

The problem of survival is complicated enough, but it is still a lot more simple than any nation makes it. It will become simpler still if we and nations ever want it badly enough to go straight to work, instead of plotting ways of circling around it.

Case No. 74; Javits in '56. In New York state politics, currently, there is being staged a re-run of the 1954 campaign in New Jersey.

Then Clifford Case, who had been a liberal Republican congressman, was the Republican candidate for the United States Senate. Because of his views, which included the statement that if elected to the Senate he would force the fiery opposition of national right-wing Republicans and right-wing commentators. Their attack on him was an attempt to smear him with Communist affiliations and associations, the smear attempt reaching its climax in allegations concerning the past conduct of Case's sister. An election day drew near, there was one thing the right-wing extremists thought certain, it was that Case was defeated in New Jersey. To the contrary, in an election which saw control of both houses of Congress go to the Democrats, Case, the New Jersey Republican, was a victor.

Now, in New York state, this same kind of situation is repeating itself. Jacob K. Javits, now State Attorney General, and previously a liberal Republican congressman, a leader, in fact, in the movement to get Dwight D. Eisenhower to run, is a candidate for the Republican nomination for the United States Senate. But as he seemed to have the Republican nomination, a campaign of smear was launched against him from national sources. Some observers give credit for it to Senator William Jenner of Indiana, McCarthy's die-hard pal. The smear is like that against Case two years ago, one which alleges Communist associations on the part of Javits in the political past. On what they know of him, and of his record in Congress, such hard-billed anti-Communists as Congressman Walter Jude of Minnesota have tried to come to his rescue. But Javits had to admit as he took the public stand in Washington to refute the charges against him, that he had maintained politics with Bella Dodd, the former Teachers Union power in New York City who was subsequently revealed to be a Communist, and who has become a regular government witness against other former Communists. He had had to admit that he once spoke to a famous fellow traveler on a ferry boat in San Francisco harbor, without, he says, knowing him for what he was.

But the discovery that it had been a ferry to say good-bye to the living person at smaller bombs, which could be used without blowing up a whole country, and our theory seemed to be that a nation which had these smaller, more humane bombs ahead of another would be back in the nuclear business again. Perhaps it was a cracked theory, anyway, since it seemed to say that one nation, with big bombs but no small ones, would let the other nation, with the most bombs of all, without even realizing with big

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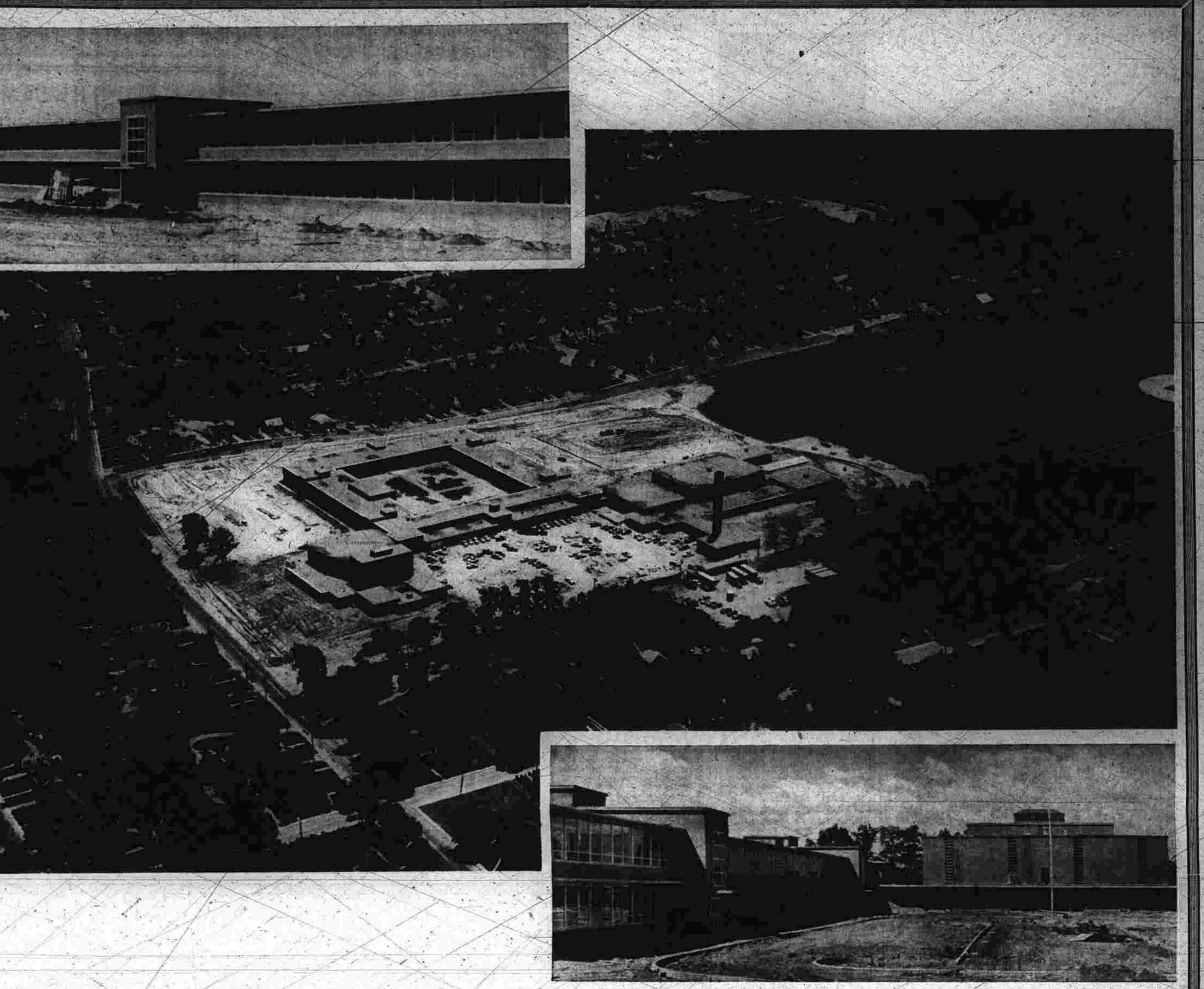

Use that Germany unity could be worked out only in direct negotiations between the East German and West German governments themselves.



West German Communists in public statements have indicated that they would insist on measures for communicating West Germany to industry in such negotiations. The Bonn government refused to go into direct negotiations with the East German regime, which Communists advised was imposed by Moscow and is not representative of the people.

So did opposition Socialists and Free Democrats in West Germany, the opposition parties, however, complained that the Communists' notes contained no really new overtures and were likely to be a bait for the Communists.
