





(B)' A CENTRAL PURCHASING AGENCY SHOULD BE ESTABLISHED. Buying is now done on a departmentalized hit or miss basis with high prices being paid for many items that could be purchased much more cheaply through centralized purchasing.

(C) THE TOWN CLERK SHOULD BE PUT ON A SAL-ARY BASIS and the large revenue from this office should be turned into the Town Treasury.

(D) A DEPARTMENT OF SANITATION SHOULD BE ESTABLISHED to handle efficiently the collection of both garbage and rubbish. At present there is no regular rubbish ellection, while the garbage collection is highly unsatisfactory. The Town can do both jobs cheaper than by the present method of letting a private contract for only the garbage collection.

(E) THE DEPARTMENTS OF PARKS AND RECREA-TION SHOULD BE CONSOLIDATED to make maximum use of Town-owned property for public recreation.

## **II. TO IMPROVE THE TOWN'S SERVICES** TO THE TAXPAYERS:

(A) A PARKING AUTHORITY SHOULD BE CREATED to provide off-street parking facilities financed from parking meter revenue. Parking is a matter that involves the public safety and convenience and is a proper concern of the municipal authorities. The high property assessments of the Central Busi-ness District must be maintained. A coordinated traffic plan must be adopted at the same time.

(B) AN ASSISTANT TOWN MANAGER SHOULD BE APPOINTED with qualifications and salary at the professional level. This is necessary to bring about an improvement of the efficiency of the town's operations, so that the maximum yield can be realized from each tax dollar.

(C) A PERSONAL DEPARTMENT SHOULD BE ES-TABLISHED to handle recruitment, job classifications, job performance standards and employe grievance procedures. An advisory Personnel Appeals Board of three (3) members, one of whom should be a town employe, should be established to hear employe grievances and any other personnel matters, referred to it by the manager.

(D) A MUNICIPAL SWIMMING POOL SHOULD BE BUILT so as to be accessible to the north end of town. We approve the budget allowance for the improvement of Globe Hol-low Swimming Pool.

(E) THE MARY CHENEY LIBRARY ADDITION SHOULD BE CONSTRUCTED.

# **III. TO IMPROVE THE ADMINISTRATION OF TOWN AFFAIRS:**

(A) THE TOWN CLERK SHOULD BE APPOINTED ON A NON-POLITICAL BASIS and should retain office during the proper conduct of the office. This is an administrative office, and should be removed from politics.

(B) APPOINTMENTS TO TOWN BOARDS SHOULD BE FILLED ON THE BASIS OF MERIT AND QUALIFICATION and not on the basis of political affiliation. This will insure. conscientious and high-level administration of these Boards. Each board membership should be bi-partisan.

(C) PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE GROWTH OF MANCHESTER IS VITAL. The Planning Office should be operated so that the problems of growth can be anticiapted and solved before the need becomes an emergency. Not to plan for Manchester's future is to invite deterioration of our Town.

(D) VOTING PLACES MUST BE INCREASED AND RELOCATED. We already have started a study to solve this need. We favor action before the 1958 elections.

We believe that a political party has a duty to let the people know its position on the important issues. This is where we stand. We present this positive, forward-looking program, and we have nominated candidates of the highest calibre who are fully capable of carrying it out.
