Washington, Sept. 29 (AP)—Average farm prices have dropped for the third straight month. But an Agriculture Department official says he expects them to strengthen shortly.

A monthly report yesterday, the department said farm prices slid downward about one-half of 1 per cent between August and mid-September. The report also said that during the same period average farm family and producer prices decreased—overall about one-third of 1 per cent. FBI Urges Press Help in Kidnaps

Washington, Sept. 29 (AP)—FBI Director Edgar Hoover said today that in kidnapping cases, newsmen and law enforcement officers should work together as partners.

His common objective, and his first one, he said, should be to do everything possible to effect the safe return of the victim.

The FBI chief gave his views on the topic of the press in kidnapping cases in the October issue of the bulletin of the American Society of Newspaper Editors (ASNE).

He cautioned against premature publicity during the early stages of a kidnapping and said that newsmen should be as objective as possible and the apprehension of the criminal should be the public welfare.

We are not interested in seeing the public welfare, he said, but in seeing the safe return of the victim.

He recalled that Newsway had discovered an arrest was imminent, but that the publication of its news at the request of the FBI led to the kidnapping of a young girl.

Special Challenges Hoover said newspaper editors should not only withdraw their representatives from the Newsway home but also their own representatives from the Newsway home.

Hoover wrote: "Responsible newspaper editors and reporters are confronted by special challenges in kidnapping cases."

Voters Going to Polls 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. Monday

Manchester voters go to the polls Monday in the sixth town election since the inception of council-manager form of government here. At stake are 28 town offices, and both Democrats and Republicans have offered full slates for selection by the town electors.

In all, some 1,200,000 Connecticut voters are expected to have the opportunity to vote Monday at 28 municipalities in the state select local officers.

At the Manchester election approaches, party leaders are switching from pre-election campaign tactics to last minute hustling to get their party supporters to the polls.

Republicans, always the majority party in Manchester, based their campaign heavily on the record, pointing to the accomplishments of the Board of Directors during the past two years, and before the Democrats under new management in this election year, presented a 14-point platform and have used it as their election campaign in their political battle.

The infusion of a write-in candidate into the election has complicated the balloting process.

Walter T. Mahoney, incumbent Democrat, was passed up by the Democratic Party voters in the primary election. He immediately announced he would run as a write-in candidate. With support from some Republicans and Democrats, Mahoney has conducted a campaign asking supporters to cast write-in votes for him—a process which most political observers feel is complex and confusing to the voters.

Polls will be open Monday from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. The town's four polling places are the East Side Recreation Center for District 1, the West Side Recreation Center for District 2, Waddell School for District 3, and the Community Center for District 4.

There will be six voting machines at each polls except District 4 where eight machines have been installed.

Board Candidates

The major contest is for the Board of Directors, the town's legislative body.

Voters vote for six candidates, but nine are elected, no more than six of them from the majority party, traditionally the Republicans.

Incumbent Republicans seeking reelection are Mayor Harold A. Turkington, Harry Firoto, Gilbert Barnes and Jacob Miller. GOP candidates seeking their first term are John H. Bowen and Roy C. Johnson.

Democratic contenders are Phillip Harrison and Pascal P. O'Connell, incumbents, and Atty. Eugene T. Kelly, Theodore R. Cummings, Mrs. Alice A. Lomenzo and Francis J. Mahoney.

In another race, Samuel J. Turkington Jr., Republican incumbent, James Edward J. Tumblis, Democrat for the town clerk's post. Both have waged vigorous campaigns.

Norman C. Comollo, Democrat, opposes incumbent Republican C. Leroy Norris for the treasurer's post.

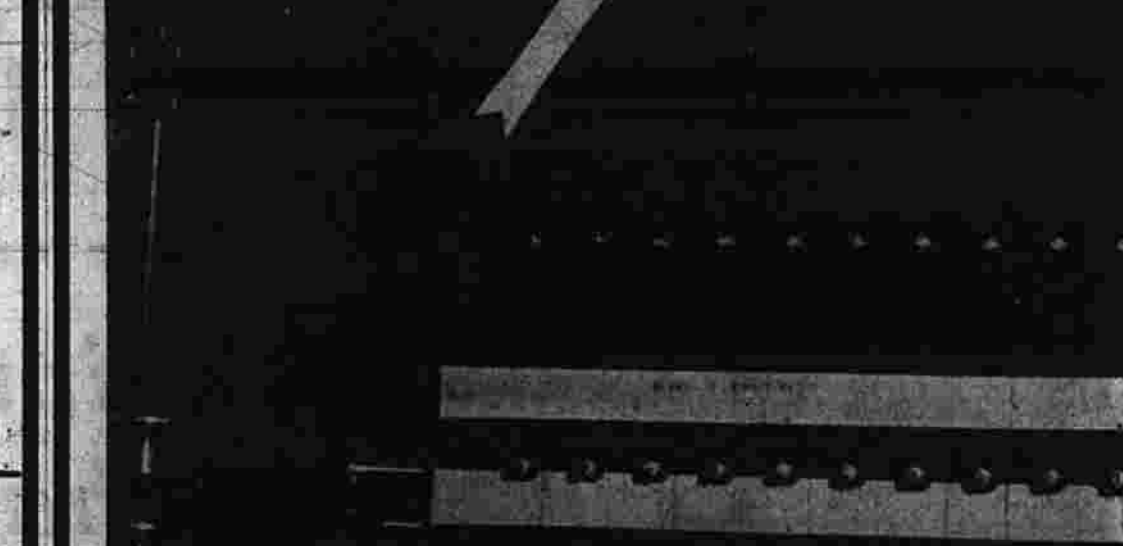
