

# **Top Soviet Diplomat**

Invaliably dressed in brown, over six feet tall, built like a halfback, Shepilov occupies a strategic corner at Kremlin and embassy

parties—putting the Soviet line over to diplomat and newsmen who crowd around him. He prefers scotch to vodks when he can get it at foreign embassies. At Soviet-hosted parties he generally takes Armenian cognac rather than the traditional Russian drink.

Unlike his colleagues, he does not guide all conversations onlo chosen paths but will answer questions on any subject a cor-respondent or ambassador may bring up.
