### 'No Sign of Life' on Rafts Of Plane Down in Atlantic

There was silence from the time of the plane's position report Wednesday night until 2:15 a.m. (GMT) yesterday, when a British passenger plane picked up a distress signal believed to have come from a survivor raft in the North Atlantic.

British ships picked up more SOS signals over the north-west Atlantic. The main effort of the giant search was directed to that area.

Six-engine Stratocruiser bombers from the U.S. and British planes from Europe, North Africa and America, plus aircraft carriers of the U.S. task force, participated in the search for the missing men.

After their arrest, Walter and Kelley admitted carrying a 200-pound safe containing \$800 from a Longmeadow, Mass., jewelry store two weeks ago, and admitted the Connecticut break-in.

They reportedly admitted the following breaks in this State: North Coventry, Dec. 19, 1955; Tolchester's and Tuttle's jewelry stores, where they stole jewelry, small tools and small change amounting to \$300.

While the council was deadlocked over a British-French resolution declaring that Egypt's July 26 nationalization of the 100-mile canal endangered freedom of passage.

The agreement was concluded in the Secretary-General's office only a few hours before the council met yesterday. Hammarskjold told councilmen its terms were:

"The truce shall be a general truce through the canal without discrimination overt and covert. This principle covers the same ground as the corresponding principle in the Constantinople Convention. That is, it covers the technical as well as the political aspects of the canal."

The operation of the canal shall be insulated from the politics of any country.

The manner of fixing tolls and charges shall be decided by agreement between Egypt and the users.

A fair proportion of the canal's operating expenses shall be met by the users.

In case of dispute unresolved by the canal users, the Egyptian government shall be settled by arbitration with suitable terms of reference and jurisdiction.

A spokesman for Pinesau, president of the canal, said he would be present at the operation of the canal.
