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'With the Help of God' Plane Passengers Felt Confident of Survival

fighting strip on which to land and reduced fire hazard. As an additional precaution, flight engineer Frank Garcia flooded the two forward wing compartments housing the engine still operating, with extinguisher foam just at the moment of landing.

The plane's two outboard engines had failed just after the strait-cruiser passed over the Ponchartraine, on duty at station November as a weather observation ship and just past the point of no return on the 2,400 mile flight from Honolulu to San Francisco.

"We had mechanical difficulties," Ozz explained, "and lost altitude down to where we had low air speed and high fuel consumption. There were no alternatives. We had to ditch."

Both Ozz and Earle praised the conduct of the passengers. Ozz reported there was "no panic" during the entire operation of abandoning the plane, which took only five minutes.

"We have the situation well in hand, the Coast Guard is ready and the ocean is smooth," Ozz reassured his passengers before ditching.

The smoothness of the operation and the lack of panic was credited by the passengers to Ozz's assurance and the smooth functioning of his crew.

"Never Any Alarm"
"At no time was there any alarm," said Mrs. Louisa Walker of Oakland, Calif. "We were all told what to do and all of us were ready to perform."

Richard Gordon, public affairs officer with the United States Information Service in the Philippines, said "I was trembling a little, as I put on my life jacket, but that feeling left. I had a feeling we were going to come out safely. Just knowing the Coast Guardmen were down there made it more comforting."

Stewardess Patricia Daniels of San Francisco said "we had an excellent list of passengers. They spent most of the five hours questioning her and other crew members."

chairman of the Freedom of Information Committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

His action, he said, met some protest from ASNE members, but he was limited to giving most information from our own American government.

Brucker said he thinks "basically there is no difference in suppressing news, no matter who is doing the suppressing or where he does it."

"Whether we are trying to get the first assassination of the public's business in public or whether we are trying to get more accurate information about our enemies across the sea, it is all one matter of getting the facts and printing them."

"To me that is what freedom of information is, and I don't see how you can limit it to our home government."

"We need not only the right to print, we need also the access to the facts so that we may print them. And this right of access to the facts is what we mean today when we speak of freedom of information."





Women Play Important Role In Picking, Paying for Home

One out of three of today's modern matrons not only plays a key part in populating and selecting her home, but in paying for it as well. And in all three capacities she is one of the potent forces in improving the standard of the American home.

This point was advanced today by Warren E. Howland, president of the Manchester Board of Realtors, on the basis of current national figures highlighting the importance of the working wife in the nation's expanding economy and real estate industry.

"The working wife has had a part in boosting the average income 20 per cent—from \$4,000 in 1946 to \$5,200 in 1955," Howland said. "This is one of the most striking developments in the American economy since World War II, and promises to be even more important in the future."

U.S. Census figures show that almost one of every three married women had a job outside her home last year. He said that the percentage of wives gaining employment was 29.5 per cent—the result of a steady increase since 1947 when it was 21.5 per cent. At the peak of wartime employment in 1944, it was 35.6 per cent, which was considered phenomenal.

Paralleling this increase in the number of working wives has been a striking growth in the rate of home ownership which may not be unrelated. In 1955, 60 per cent of the American families owned their own homes, a substantial increase over the 55 per cent of 1950.

Another clue to the relationship between increases in home ownership and the contribution of the working wife toward that end is found in the assertion of the Federal Housing Administration that "large percentages" of its home mortgage loan insurance has been extended in view of the adequacy of family income—to which the wives contribute—to sustain mortgage payments. And the Federal housing agency is currently studying the matter with the possibility that it may attach even greater significance to wives' incomes.

Business analysts have observed that there are two main effects of the income of working wives that for home. The first of these is a stabilizing force—the family as a whole is less likely to be deprived of all its income should the family head become unemployed. This means that the family is in a better position to maintain essential credit payments, such as those on mortgages, thus protecting their equity.

The second is a key contribution to what has been called "the static upward revision in living standards of the past few years" based on a 50 per cent increase since 1947 in the number of families with \$4,000 to \$7,500 cash income. Average Family Income Increase Dean Arthur H. Uppgren of Dartmouth College has estimated.

American Families—Already Noted in Surveys Made by our National Association of Real Estate Boards—for Better Housing.

Economists generally look on the \$4,000-\$5,000 income band as the dividing line between essential and optional family spending. Below this level, a family spends most of its money for the bare necessities of life. Once subsistence needs are met with income to spare, spending stress falls on satisfying tastes and gratifying preferences.

In crediting working wives with this greater ability of the average family to better its residence, Howland pointed out also that as homemakers and mothers they are also interested in obtaining adequate family housing accommodations.

"For years Realtors have noted that the wife plays a major part in selecting the house," he added, "although we used to say that the husband passes on her choice from the standpoint of family finances. Now it appears that working wives, because of their key contribution to family finances, may have a larger voice in the spending of joint funds."

'Diary of Anne Frank' Draws Praise in East, West Reich

 The U.S. State Department may have been bit wrong in thinking the Germans don't want to be reminded of their Nazi past. Last summer Washington kept the Pulitzer Prize-winning drama "The Diary of Anne Frank" from being shown at a Paris theatrical festival. The reason: The Anti-Nazi drama might offend the Germans.

Today it tops the playbill in eight German theaters, including one in Communist East Germany. It is drawing big crowds and getting some of the best reviews seen for a long time in the German press.

The play is the dramatized version of the real-life diary of a German-born Jewish girl who hid out with her family for two years in the attic of an Amsterdam house until she was sent by the Nazis to the gas chamber in March 1945 at the age of 15.

The diary has become a best-seller in West German book stores. The play, a Broadway hit by Frances Goodrich and Albert Hackett, seems certain to become the choice offering of the winter season on German stages. Theaters in Aachen, West Berlin, Dusseldorf, Hamburg, Karlsruhe, Konstanz, Mainz, and Dresden, East Germany, are running it. Other theaters plan to follow soon.

It was the highlight of West Berlin's international cultural festival. The critic of the newspaper Der Kurier praised the play as something that would awaken the dull heart and shake the most deadened nerves. There was not an empty seat in the small Schillerpark theater a month after the Berlin premiere.





Bolton Town 'No Place to Speed,' Justice Says, Fines Youth

Bolton, Oct. 17 (Special)—Claiming "Bolton is no place to speed," Trial Justice John Swanson found 19-year-old John Scott, Manchester, guilty of that offense and fined him \$50 in Justice Court last night.

Two other traffic cases were heard at the session. In Scott's case, State Policeman Arthur Mansfield, arresting officer, testified that the youth had crashed into a tree on French Rd. Brake marks on the road measured 210 feet.

The policeman said another set of brake marks running parallel to those of the accused led him to believe that Scott had been racing another car. This fact was not established in court.

Judge Swanson commented in regard to it and told those in the courtroom, "Bolton is no place for speeding."

After his speech here, the vice president will head to Kansas where a nationwide gathering of college newspaper editors is in progress.

His press conference with some of the college editors will be broadcast nationally on radio and television, 8 p. m. EST.

Nixon has used the civil rights issue especially as an argument against a Republican Congress.

Burmeister tried to kill himself with a pistol in a friend's apartment Jan. 8, 1950.

The police report discloses that when Mrs. Burmeister was questioned about the shooting she said:

"James never said the baby and we have no money problems."

Police said Burmeister has been under treatment of a psychiatrist for several months.

In the other slaying, Alty Moore said Mrs. Gamache had not been a good wife or mother. She had a nervous breakdown recently.

The slain boys were Jack, 8, and Kenneth, 3.

Retired Couple's Security Endangered by Relatives
The husband is 70 years old, his wife 48. When he retired several years ago because of poor health and the two moved to Florida they thought they had arranged matters to take care of themselves for life.

But here the wife doing all the housework, with the husband acting as handyman and with careful budgeting of money, they told themselves they would never have to depend on anyone for financial assistance.

But here the wife in the district, relatives on both sides of the family either write that they are coming for a two weeks' visit or come unannounced.

While they are "vacationing," their retired host and hostess are cooking meals, washing dishes, making beds, laying in groceries. Also, they are spending more of their own money.

It is the husband who wrote about their problem and asked at the end of this letter, "How can we meet our problem without straining the otherwise pleasant relationship we have maintained through the years with relatives on both sides?"

Why not try frankness? Begin by writing a letter to each relative who owes you money. Explain that since you have no income but are living on your savings, you need to have the loan repaid.

That may result in your collecting at least part of the money owed you. It should certainly keep those who have borrowed before from asking to borrow again.

Then next time you get a letter from a relative announcing the arrival of his family for a visit write back how pleased you are they are coming. But mention that you and your wife no longer have the physical strength to look after guests, much as you wish otherwise, and that you will be glad to reserve rooms for them at a court or hotel.

Remember that duty is to each other. If you allow relatives to impose upon your strength and your financial security you can hardly hope that they will come to your aid when your money and strength are gone.

U.S. Children's Trick or Treat Means Milk for Bangkok Youth

Bangkok — (NEA) — Spirits and spoils fill the air for American children only one night of the year — on Halloween. In Thailand, year — on Halloween. In Thailand, children and grown-ups, too, receive their milk with magical powers every day and night, the year round.

Here every home, large or small, sets up a miniature "spirit house" in the garden where flowers and incense are placed to keep the invisible "spirits" happy and on the job of protecting the household.

But the spirit that is paying off in human lives and friendship out here is the spirit of the American Halloween and the United Nations Children's Fund program of "Trick or Treat for UNICEF."

In 1955, the fourth year of the program, youngsters in 6,000 American communities dressed up in traditional Halloween garb and collected gifts in pennies totaling more than half a million dollars.

One night's fun in Pittsburgh raised \$5,000. Houston, Tex., children gathered in \$1,400 without any trickery to treat the underprivileged children of foreign lands.

Pittsburgh thus paid for the entire operation of a pilot project to cure and prevent leprosy in a large area of Thailand. Houston's contributions enabled 140,000 Cambodian children to be vaccinated.

Life is cheap out here in Asia, and so is health. The vaccine to protect one child from tuberculosis costs a penny. Penicillin is a nickel for a needleful. Six glasses of healthful reconstituted milk are available to UNICEF for one cent. All of the services are distributed free here.

Malaria, which 30 years ago caused 200,000 deaths a year in Thailand has been virtually eliminated as a fatal disease here. The United States started the program on direct aid, and now UNICEF runs it. Cost of eliminating malaria is 13 cents per person.

The people's appreciation for this type of aid is overwhelming. In scores of settlements all over Thailand, the whole village turns out to greet Americans and say, "Thank you, thank you. Now we can sleep at night."

For malaria control brought with it the elimination of the germ carrying mosquitoes which caused both death and discomfort. Now every state plus Alaska, the District of Columbia, Canal Zone, Hawaii and Cuba are represented.
