Washington, Oct. 18 (AP)—The former project manager for a \$43 million expansion of a government nickel plant testified today that "political pressure" came into the 1954 award of the contract, Rauland Cremer, who worked on the Nicaraguan project as a vice president of Frederick Starr Corp., a construction firm, told a House Government Operations subcommittee.

120 mph Race Over Parkway Ends in Crash

New Canaan, Oct. 18 (AP)—A 20-year-old University of Bridgeport junior who allegedly led state police on a 4-mile Merritt Parkway chase at speeds up to 120 miles an hour, was arrested this morning on charges of driving under the influence of liquor and ending responsibility after his American-made sports car crashed into a light pole at the New Canaan gas station on the parkway.

Frank A. Christensen, of Garden City, L. I., New York, whose father is the president of the board of a National Insurance Company, was taken into custody by State Police Sgt. Carlberg. Christensen was quoted as saying, "I thought I could outrun you. I didn't know you had a light pole at the gas station where the policeman car knocked down four of my tires."

Three Share Nobel Prize in Medicine

Stockholm, Sweden, Oct. 18 (AP)—Two Americans and a German were awarded the 1956 Nobel prize in medicine today for evolving a simple method of charting the interior of the human heart.

The winners are Dr. Andre F. Courau, 61, of Dickinson, W. Va.; Richard J. Jr., 61, both of Columbia University, New York; and Wendell Forreman, 62, of Rad Kneuzhang, West Germany. The Carolus Institute of Medicine and Physiology, which makes the awards under the will of the inventor of dynamite, Alfred Nobel, said in its citation the prize was given in recognition of "the introduction of heart catheterization and discovery made thereby."

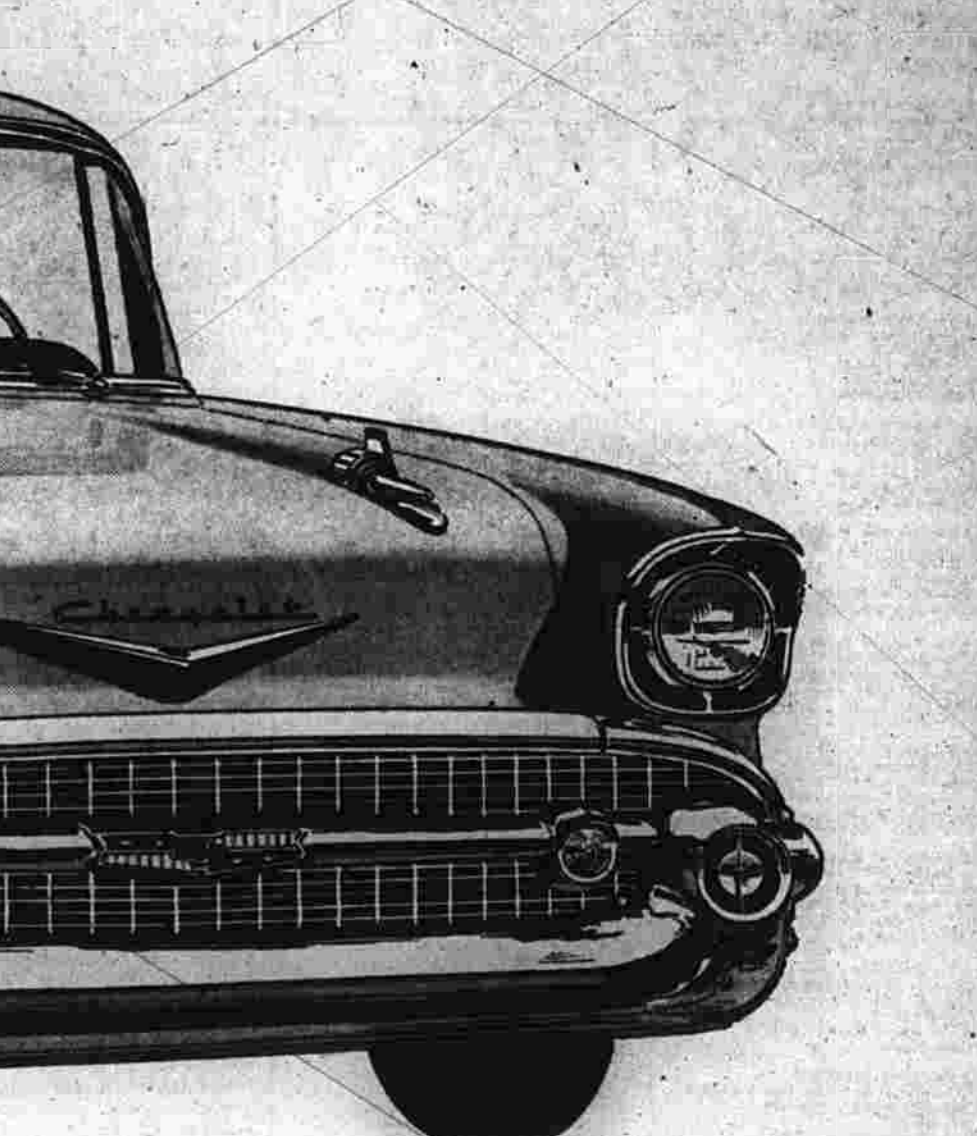

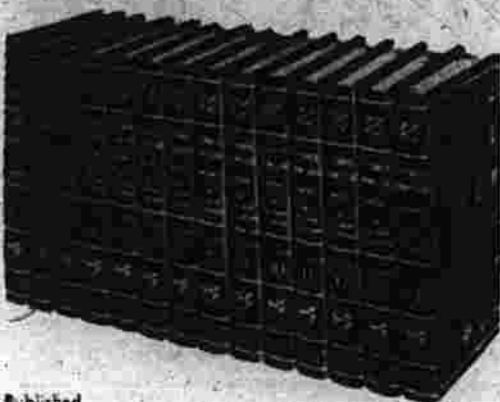

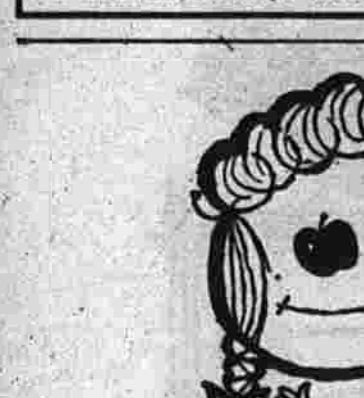

He said the cost of rebuilding the bridge would be about \$100,000, stating that he was basing this estimate on information provided by engineers. The railroad has claimed the cost of repairing the flooded and rebuilt bridge would be more than \$500,000.
