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Adlai Seen Confused On Issues to Stress

By JAMES MARLOW (A.P. News Analyst)

Washington, Oct. 19 (AP)—President Eisenhower and Adlai Stevenson have had time enough with the election only 18 days away to show what they think the campaign issues are.

Eisenhower has concentrated on domestic affairs, not the foreign field, although he devoted all of his Sept. 19 opening speech to foreign problems.

Eisenhower has divided himself more evenly between affairs at home and abroad. Yet, judging from the way he picks up an issue, drops it, and comes back to it, Stevenson looks like a man having trouble deciding what to play up most.

The Emphasizes Peace

With one exception Eisenhower has brought the word "peace" into every speech he has made as a reminder that the Korean War which he inherited has ended and that country has peace.

He also sometimes mentions Korea directly and most of the time in one way or another, combines "peace" with "prosperity" and "progress."

In short, he is saying: "Everything is going well. Everything is under control. Things will get better, too. Since you never had it so good, why rock the boat?"

Stevenson's central theme is not as good as the Republicans make them appear. All kinds of things need doing, but the Republicans won't do them. They're not interested in everybody, only rich people.

Stevenson has painted the Republicans as do-nothing party for anyone but the wealthy. And he has tried to link Eisenhower tightly in the public mind with the Republican party.

The strategy in this is clear enough: A lot of people who didn't like the Republican party might still vote for Eisenhower personally. But they might not if they began to think of Eisenhower and the GOP as the same.

The proof of what Eisenhower and Stevenson think the campaign issues are is shown by what they talk of in their speeches.

But if you just listened to them say what they thought the issues were you might think they were a couple of confused candidates ruminating in a bagful of ideas.

Looking for something to say. Although peace is his central theme, Eisenhower has said: "There is one thing that is not an issue in this campaign: The long-

TV Version of W.W.I. Found Too Romantic

New York, Oct. 19 (AP)—In 1933 Laurence Stallars published a photographic history which he entitled, with grim prophecy, "The First World War." He title, as well as its grisly pictures of war as it really is, shocked many readers of the 1930's. In those days nearly all Americans believed there would be no more war.

On Tuesday evening NBC-TV presented the first of this season's filmed documentaries of various aspects of modern life. "The Great War" was the title of this "Project 20" program.

Called absorbing television entertainment. Old film clips re-created vividly such historic figures as the Kaiser, Woodrow Wilson, Theodore Roosevelt, Woodrow D. Baker. There were the Liberty Bells, the sinking of the Lusitania, the landing army which dashed off of Paris to save the city. There were many marching men of many armies.

"The Great War" was, essentially, a romantic view of the war. So it was, inevitably, popular with those who are nostalgic about the ground and narrating by Alexander S. Souby, who had a nostalgic mood of nostalgia and the popular American theory that this country saved civilization for another 20 years.

I do not know this for a fact, but I strongly suspect that besides using many excellent and authentic old film clips "The Great War" incorporated clips from such movies as "The Big Parade," "All Quiet on the Western Front" and "Wings." At least one sequence purporting to show men attacking from front line trenches, was shot at a high, advanced angle which only could have been from a movie lot tower.

Probably this, if it is true, is legitimate. But the result was curious: romantic. There was much running and shooting. But there were only a few dead bodies. There was no view of the starving millions in Belgium, no hint of such military debacles as that perpetrated by stupid tactical leadership on the Somme.

The Picture Book Two Strong.

An accurate picture of the slaughter, starvation and pestilence of war, such as Laurence Stallars presented back in 1933, is perhaps too strong for the television audience. In our time we've been surfeited with the agonies of war. Yet any portrait of any war that totally ignores its agony is unbalanced history.

No one knows this better than Henry Solomon, an excellent historian who has personally experienced war, who is the executive producer of the excellent "Project 20" series, and who, with Richard Hansen, wrote the script for "The Great War."

My minority opinion is that in his program he tried too hard to entertain in the detriment of his equally important function of instructing.

Polish Road 200 Miles of Flat Country

Warsaw, Oct. 19 (AP)—The road from Poman to Warsaw stretches long and straight over the Polish plateau, nearly 200 miles without a single hill.

Driving is fast. Outside the towns the only vehicles in any quantity are four-wheeled carts, each with its peasant driver leaning at the reins as the horse plods on.

Pass Police Checkpoint

Outside Poman, the car pulls up at a police checkpoint. Militiamen peer in through the windows, see foreigners inside, and wave the auto on.

In some places the road is cobble, in others covered with an asphalt so smooth that its surface reflects the trees that march along its edge.

Children play along the roadside. Women are at work in the fields, bringing in the last of the potato crop, and gathering sugar beets. Despite the talk of collectivization, most fields are cultivated in strips of less than an acre.

Busy though the farms are, not a single tractor can be seen for the whole ride. Horses are at work everywhere. At one crossing 20 or 30 carts stand by with beets ready for loading onto a railroad train.

Houses, usually small, are rising around the villages. Old houses in the village centers look sadly dilapidated with paint peeling.

Each village has its square. One is packed with people awaiting the opening of a fair. In another, two Russians chat with a girl.

In every village the best kept building is the church, sometimes domed and sometimes with a cupola on its tower.

Almost every mile along the road there is a wayside shrine, many of them with a girl.

The countryside, in contrast to the towns, shows little sign of war damage. But all the bridges are new. No doubt for military reasons—many new bridges are built over railroads, previously crossed by level crossings.

Bomber to Wear Skis in the Sky

Washington (AP)—A major aircraft company is equipping its giant patrol bombers for duty in the Antarctic with the largest ski ever ordered for a jet-powered aircraft. Measuring 5 feet wide and 18 feet long and made of composite aluminum alloy and steel, the ski will be attached to the two-wheel main landing gear. Plans, official publication of the Aircraft Industries Assn., say a smaller ski will be mounted on the plane's nose landing gear.

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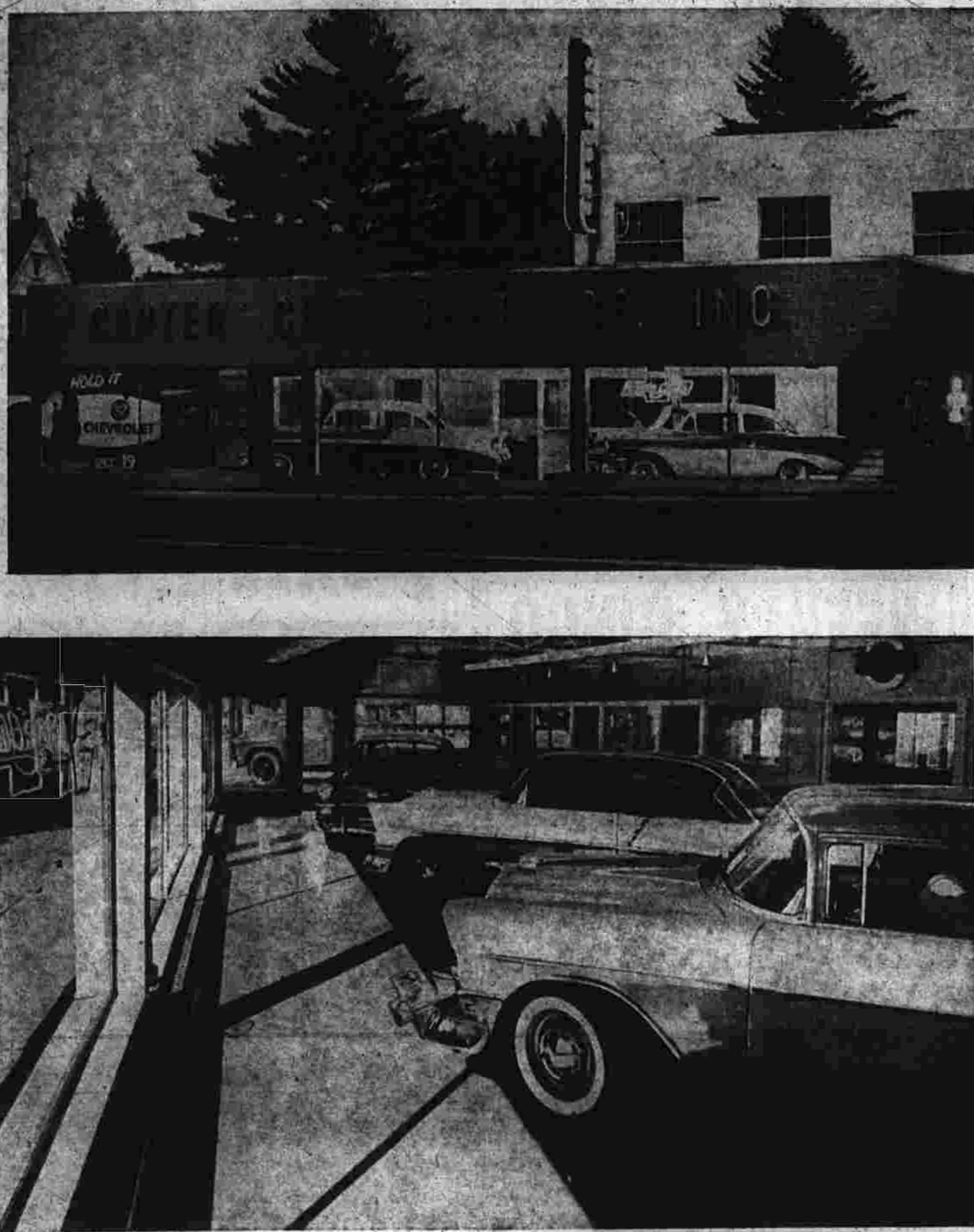

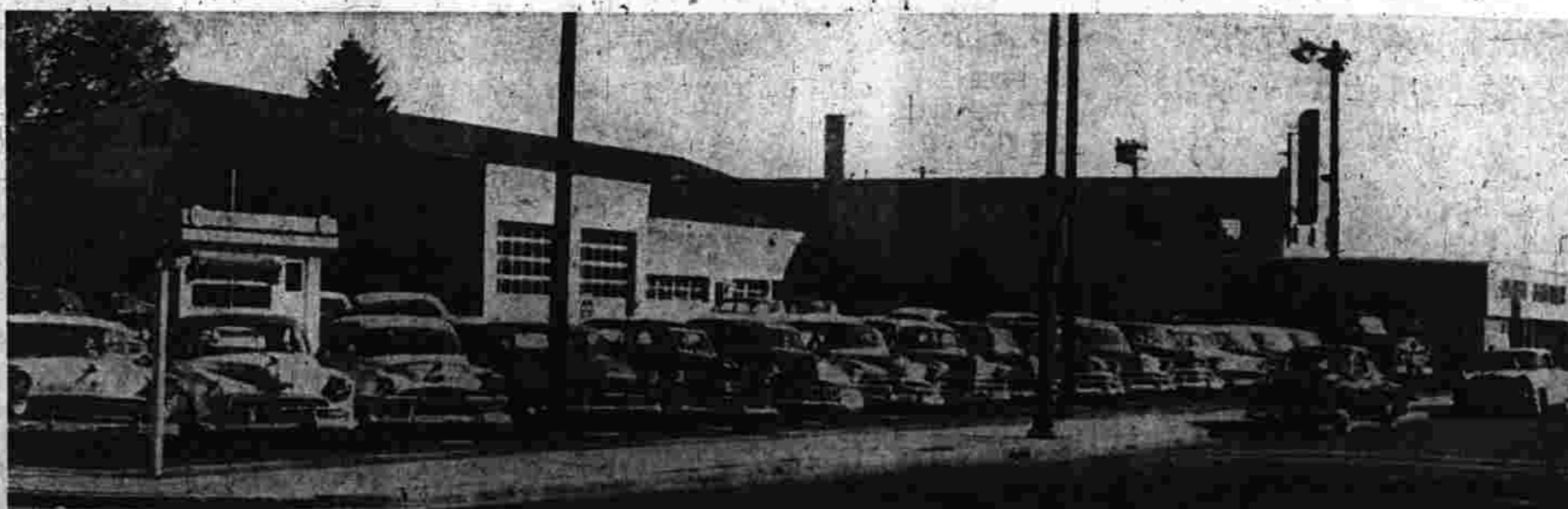

The Republicans took over the government there never would be another bill.

In that first address, plugging for a Republican victory in November, Eisenhower said that in the field of foreign affairs the United States has a choice between "hard sense and experience versus pie-in-the-sky promises and wishy-washy thinking."

Speaking indirectly in that case against the Stevenson draft and "Three in our lifetime—at least in my lifetime, we have seen our country at war. Why? Because we were too weak for the circumstances of the time."

Eisenhower added that in the foreign affairs field the problem of "decision" boils down to this: "Do we pursue our objective from a position of strength, dealing with others on a perfectly fair, equitable basis, always holding out the hand of friendship but saying 'if you don't want to be friends, we will be the strongest nation in the world'?"

Portland gave the President and Mrs. Eisenhower a warm reception. Police Chief James Purcell Jr. estimated a crowd of about 100,000 turned out on the streets to shout a welcome.

In his evening address in this heart of an area where power and conservation policies are an important campaign issue, Eisenhower called it a "trivial charge" for Stevenson and other Democrats to contend that the administration is wedded to a "giveaway" doctrine—that it has handed over natural resources to private business interests.

Pakistan Children Like Milk Wafer
Sialkot, Oct. 19 (AP)—Research in Pakistan by a retired University of Connecticut professor of dairy manufacturing, Dr. E. O. Anderson, has enabled many Pakistani children to get more milk in their diets.
Working with a Pakistani scientist at Punjab University, Dr. Anderson has developed a "milk wafer," which has a high nutritive value. Children like it according to reports, and it is easy to make and sanitary.
Dr. Anderson is now working for Washington State College on an International Cooperation Administration program to help the University of Punjab establish a dairy technology program.
Development of the "milk wafer" came about this way: The organization CARE, which furnished the Labor Supply of Skim Milk with a year's supply of skim milk powder and butter oil. This was to be fed to school children as reconstituted milk.
But there was no homogenizer in Lahore. When the health department tried reconstituting it for them, many of the children who drank it developed diarrhea. The bottles used for the milk could not be properly washed or sterilized.
Since the skim milk powder and the butter oil were not being used, CARE had decided to reclaim the supplies. Drs. Anderson and Karim, however, after some experiments, developed the milk wafer using the skim milk powder, the butter oil, water and some sugar. After the sugar was graduated, the candy-like wafer was thus made.
The candy-like wafer is thin and flat. Available to children in areas where there is no homogenizer. They can be manufactured with the simplest of equipment—a pan or bottle—found in the most remote village of Pakistan.
Dr. Anderson will continue his work in Pakistan for another year before returning to the United States.

Town May Levy Special Tax From '55 List, Says Crockett
It is constitutional to levy this special tax on the 1955 Grand List, in the opinion of Town Counsel Charles N. Crockett. Crockett submitted his formal opinion yesterday to General Manager Richard Martin. He used a Connecticut Supreme Court case as the basis for his view.
Crockett says the case, which involves changing the fiscal year of the town, is practically identical to the Manchester situation.
Martin asked for the opinion after the question was raised in a formal hearing.
In the Crockett case, the Oct. 1, 1950 Grand List was used to lay a tax to finance the period from Sept. 1, 1951 to June 30, 1952. At the result, the tax was two mills higher than it would have been if the 1951 list had been used.
A taxpayer brought suit, claiming the procedure discriminated in favor of persons who became property owners after Oct. 1, 1950, and that was not taxed.
The court held that the tax bore uniformly on all members of the class consisting of owners of property who acquired it on Oct. 1, 1950, and that it was not unreasonable.

Development of defensive weapons, including nuclear warheads for missiles which would be used against enemy attacks by land, sea and air.

He referred also, as he has before, to developments there reducing the amount of radioactive fallout from the newer weapons.

Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, has said continuing tests "may cause the human race unmeasured damage, largely because of what he calls 'the most dreadful poison' from radioactive fallout.

Without referring to Stevenson, Strauss said:

"Exposure to radioactivity, as a vague, unproven danger to generation yet unborn, must be weighed against the more immediate and infinitely greater dangers of defeat and perhaps of obliteration at the hands of an enemy who possesses nuclear weapons if mass destruction and who might have no compunction about using such weapons if he thought we were too weak to defend ourselves and retaliate in kind."

Later he said:

"Our testing program is not poisoning the atmosphere. Soviet propagandists have been spreading that 'war' for months, while concealing their own secret tests."

Stevenson quoted a report of the National Academy of Sciences this year as saying that biological damage from peacetime atomic activities, including weapons tests, has been essentially negligible so far, and that radiation exposure from all tests to date and from future tests at the same rate as in the past would be a small fraction of the exposure one receives in daily living.

It means, Strauss said, that testing of atomic weapons, including H-bombs, "at the present rate, far as one can see ahead," and he added:

"This is the conclusion reached by our foremost and most reliable scientists."

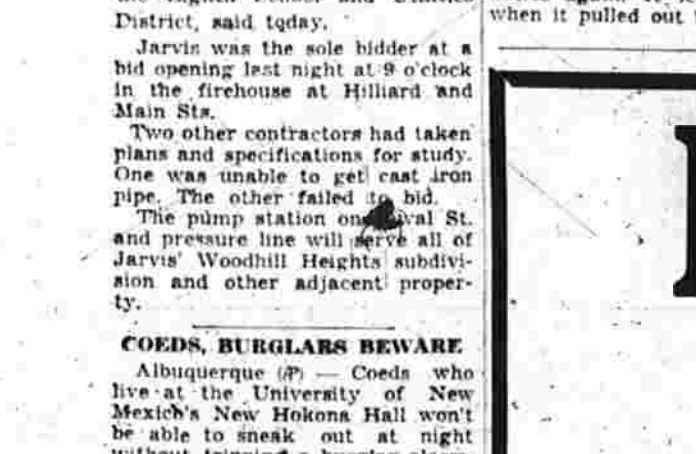
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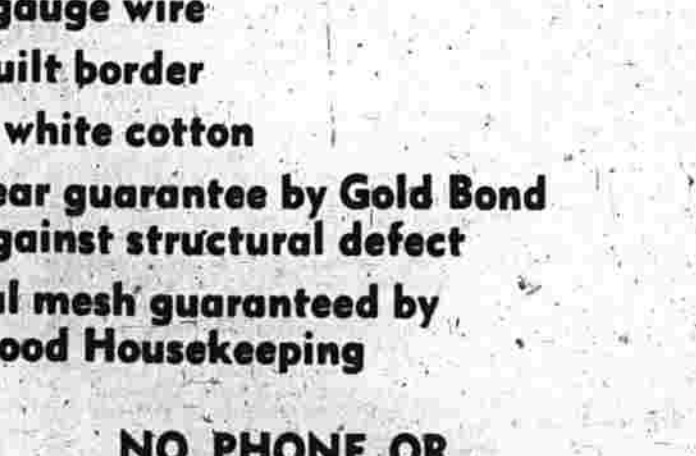
