### Rebel Arrests Spur North Africa Unrest

French pilot of an airplane who duped them into thinking they were leading on friendly soil, it is stated. The pilot, known as "Rabat," was captured by French troops in Tunisia.

Big prize for the French was Ahmed Ben Bella, veteran nationalist who has been masterminding the insurgent movement from sanctuary provided by Egypt.

The seizure touched off a flurry in Paris where Premier Guy Mollet summoned his cabinet for a brief emergency night session and scheduled another hurdle to Mollet in due to ask parliament for a vote of confidence on his government's policies in Algeria.

In Rabat, the Moroccan government charged the capture of the Algerians was "pure piracy." Moroccan acting Premier Edouard M'hammedi said he had called on the United States, Britain and Spain to intervene on behalf of the rebels.

In Tunis, Premier Habib Bourguiba told newsmen "this is an extremely grave event—not only for the effect in North Africa, but for the fact it may have a far-reaching effect on Morocco and Tunisia with France."

Bourguiba was to confer at Tunis with Mohammed V today as some formula to give Algeria independence while maintaining their own friendly relations with France.

But the French action in snatching the rebels appeared to be transforming the Tunisian conference into a council of war rather than any meeting aimed at bringing peace in Algeria.

Tunisia recalled its ambassador to France and the atmosphere throughout the country was tense. Members of the French colony kept their children away from school and many husbands remained at home with their families.

The swiftly executed coup—a high spot of the almost 20-year Algerian revolt—was carried out last night as the rebels were flying over the Mediterranean Sea.

The plane, a DC3 owned by the French-operated Atlas Airline, was piloted by a French crew.

The airplane took off from Rabat and was heading for Tunis when French authorities made contact with the pilot and invited him to land in Algiers.

While five French fighter planes shadowed the DC3 over the rim of the horizon, the plane circled over the sea and touched down in Algiers.

The rebel leaders, obviously convinced they were in Tunisia, climbed unopposedly out of the plane and into the arms of a waiting police squad at the airport.

Bourguiba registered a protest with the French ambassador in Algiers.

After a tour of New York's border, Stevenson said the Russians would like to see the Republican and the Democratic parties re-united.

He said, however, that "the real issue is not Mr. Bourguiba's message or Russian views about American politics."

### U.S. Fears Red Action On Poland

(Continued from Page One)

Poland has sought painstakingly to spread before the world since Stalin's death.

In view of the uncertainty over future developments, top State Department officials are moving cautiously in deciding what concrete steps the United States should take to encourage a Polish government free of domination by Moscow.

American economic aid likely will be made available to the new Polish regime, if it survives, U.S. officials indicated that to avoid seeming interference in Poland's internal affairs, such aid would be extended only after a formal request. None has yet been received, although broad hints that such help would be welcome have been noted.

Reliable intelligence reports reaching Washington show that from two to four Soviet divisions in East Germany were moved to the Polish frontier last Thursday.

The Soviet troops apparently did not cross into Poland, however, and may have returned to their East German bases by now, officials said.

"Officials here said Soviet leaders undoubtedly realize that resort to force might wreck the image of a new 'reasonable' Russia which

The Governor got on the state campaign trail last night with a speech at a dinner in Shelton honoring Robert N. Gialino, Democratic candidate for U.S. Representative against Republicans incumbent Albert W. Cretella. Dodd also was at the dinner.

Meanwhile, Bush called on Dodd to say whether he supports what Bush called Adlai Stevenson's "incredible willingness to gamble without national security on the issue of the H-bomb."

Bush made the demand in a statement at Hartford after campaigning all day in New Britain.

Throughout this campaign Mr. Dodd has been, strangely silent about his party's presidential candidate.

Mr. Ribicoff announced the state campaign after a speaking tour of Michigan, Illinois and California in behalf of Stevenson and his running-mate Estes Kefauver.

Tonight, he is scheduled to re-confront Dodd to a Democratic dinner in Trumbull, Democrat Jack Stock, candidate for U.S. Representative.

"They were still young people," said one witness, "but they were some rough-looking characters as well."

This crowd advanced on the Polish-Russian Friendship headquarters, demolished glass exhibition cases in front of the headquarters building, climbed the elaborately decorated porch and threw flags to the ground.

The demonstrators also tore down a sign reading "Long Live Polish-Russian Friendship" and burned it. Then someone inside the building through broken windows.

Crowd heads in the crowd shouted "Don't destroy, don't destroy," however, and the witness said no damage was done inside.

Authorities made no effort to stop the demonstration. One truck load of soldiers stood nearby quietly.

A policeman who arrived on his motorcycle was seized by the crowd and jostled into the air. The militia with bayonets fixed to their rifles, and the crowd cried, and the policeman was taken to the station.

"It would have been suicide for him to do anything about it," said the witness.

The Warsaw Radio took notice of the demonstrations in a broadcast today. It gave the demonstrators a "demagogic and nationalistic" outbreak, and no service to the workers and peasants. It actually served the interests of "Mensheviks."
