**Rockville-Vernon**  
**Lavitt Seeks Candidates' Opinions on Consolidation**

Rockville, Oct. 24 (Special)—Seymour E. Lavitt, a member of the 6-man town-appointed study committee, sent an open letter today to the four candidates for the general Assembly, asking public statements of their views on consolidation of city and town governments.

The letter, sent to Republican Franklin G. Waller and Arthur M. Bateman and Democrats Ralph Lipman and Mrs. Edna M. Johnston, reads as follows:

"I, therefore, ask for your opinion on this issue."

"Since, in my opinion, the most important single local issue facing voters in this coming election is the resolution of differences between the five District of Hartford and the six-man town of Vernon that has been preventing progress and growth of the whole community, I think the voters should be informed of the position of each candidate on whether or not he favors consolidation of the community offers a sensible resolution to these differences."

"I, therefore, ask for your opinion on this issue."

The Rockville Police Department has set up "Yield the Right of Way" signs at several street junctions, Captain Peter J. Dowegevicz said.

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**Powell Denies Ike Favored Jail for School Bias Violator**

Washington, Oct. 24 (AP)—The White House yesterday made public a statement by Rep. Powell (D-N.Y.) retracting Powell's report that President Eisenhower had told the congressman he favored jailing anyone who disobeyed court orders to desegregate schools.

Eisenhower, Powell said, decided to know what the formula for government intervention would be if that was not a case involving federal responsibility.

"Now that court must decide whether it believes it—someone in the court—should be the one to issue the order," Powell said.

"I want to set the record straight by stating that I did not make the remarks on enforcement of the school integration which I attributed to him."

He added that he was sorry he had made the remarks and that he would like to see the President's statement on the subject.

The Vice President gave a clue yesterday at Kalamazoo, Mich., as to how he will handle this issue. A heckler there displayed a sign reading "Hodge and Straton what about it?"

Nixon is anxious not only to win Illinois' 27 electoral votes, fourth highest total in the nation, but also to help Sen. Everett Dirksen (R-Ill.) and Gov. William G. Stratton retain their posts.

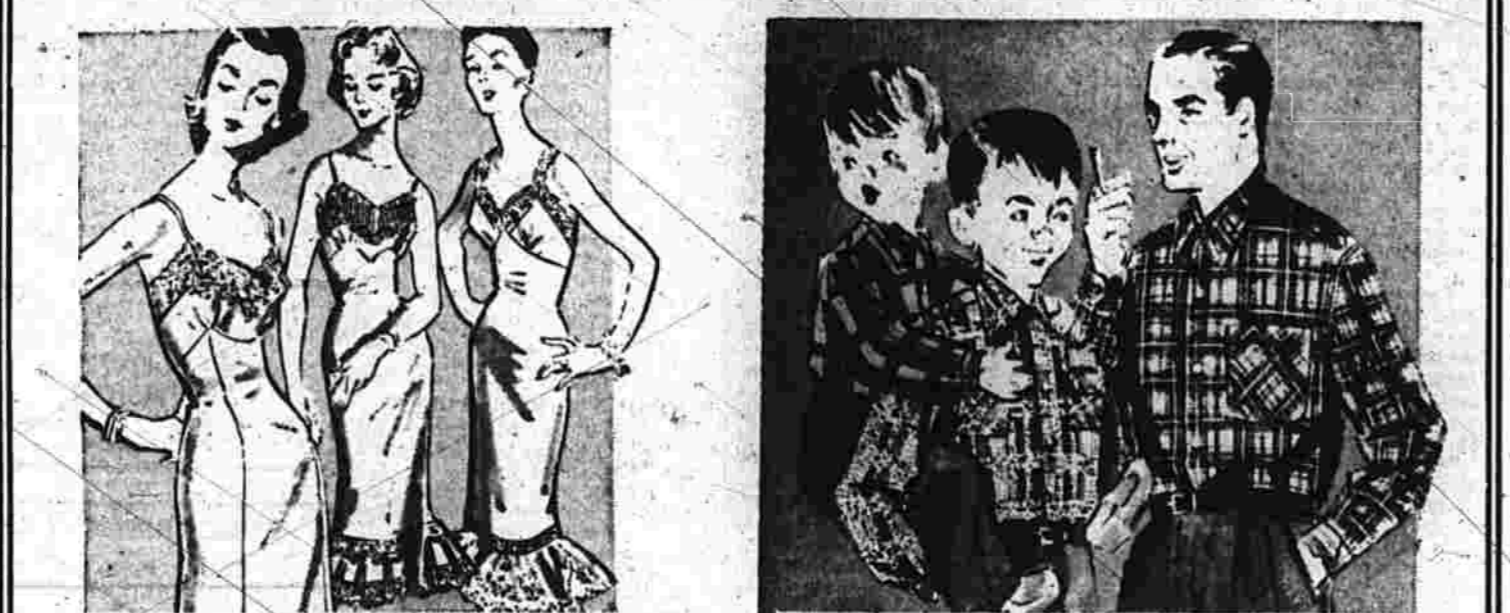

# Vernon High School Nears Reality

## Machine Vote Due Tuesday

Rockville, Oct. 24 (Special).—In what was described as one of the shortest Town Meetings held here in years, Vernon voters last night unanimously approved the "mechanics" for building a 1,000-room high school.

Opposition never materialized to the four items of a public notice dealing with construction, financing and request for State aid, and the meeting adjourned about 45 minutes after it began.

However, approval of the items was not to be taken as a final decision on the part of the town. The referendum on Item 1 of the public notice, passed on the machine by a petition from one of the factions opposing the new school.

The item, an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the Rockville-Vernon taxpayers, is whether or not to appropriate \$1,000,000 for the school.

The referendum passed, but the construction will be held until next Tuesday's meeting.

The first indication that adoption of the four items would be unopposed came when a written resolution was passed without opposition.

The resolution, handed to Atty. Harry H. Luger, moderator, from Mrs. E. Fenton Burke, secretary of the Citizens Committee for Education, a prime backer of the school.

The resolution read: "Be it resolved that when the sum of \$1,000,000 for a new high school shall have been approved, the School Building Committee be empowered to expend such sum to construct and equip said high school."

The other three items were moved in the form of resolutions also, and passed without opposition.

Architect Arthur H. Cook, of Jeter and Cook, Hartford designers of the school, gave an illustrated talk completely outlining the school situation and plans to date.

Urging townpeople to go ahead with the school without further delay, Cook told them: "We are on a roller coaster going up. The 2-year delay has cost about \$200,000 and it hasn't stopped yet."

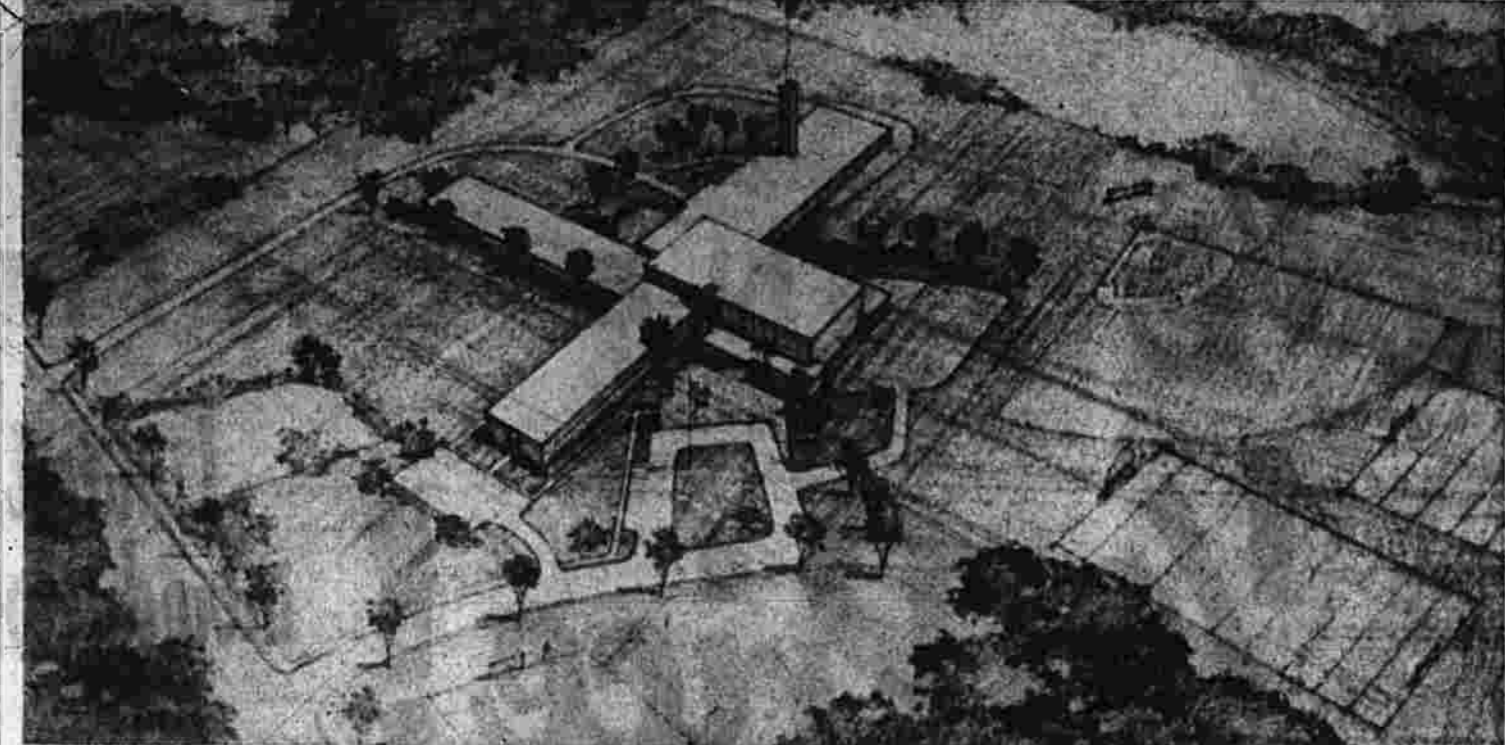
Cook outlined in detail the steps he and members of the School Building Committee have taken since plans for the new school were first discussed two years ago.

No Goals by Delay

Cook said he informed the SRC that it would be possible to build the school at \$1,000,000 if we are lucky. But nothing is gained by delays. Rerouting his request for immediate adoption, Cook said he had not run up another \$100,000. Delays will only find us losing any further cost cuts through price increases.

Commenting on the outcome of last night's vote, SRC Chairman John J. Talcott Jr. said he was "very pleased" with the result, and added: "We hope it will be just as good at the referendum vote." He issued a note of congratulatory when he said "opponents to the school will be better advised now and next Tuesday, I urge voters to turn out here and there, depending on the coming referendum."

## U.S. Socialist Claims Poverty Still Growing

Reading, Pa., Oct. 24 (AP).—Peace, prosperity and progress—these are the words of the Socialist party presidential candidate Darlington Hoopes today as he said the United States has attained that happy status.

Hoopes, a 60-year-old Reading attorney said today "It is false to claim that America has prospering when poverty continues to grow amidst the plenty."

Hoopes is his party's candidate for the second time for the highest office in the U.S. In 1928 he polled 21,000 votes, and "I'll be happy" to get the same this year.

Hoopes was the Socialist vice-presidential candidate when Norman Thomas headed the party's national ticket in 1934 and 1938. When Thomas refused to try for the presidency for the seventh time in 1932 Hoopes got the nod.

The issue that was at stake in the most is the continuance of poverty amidst plenty in the United States," Hoopes said in an interview.

"The U.S. census figures show that in 1934 the poorest 20 per cent of the people received less than 5 per cent of the total income. If you study that a little it means that 94 million persons, including 30 million children, have average family incomes of \$1,313 or \$22.25 per week, before taxes."

Hoopes noted that America has progressed in the past 40 years since he joined the Socialist movement, asserting that Social Security, women's suffrage, the 8-day week, minimum wage laws, abolition of child labor, workmen's compensation and unemployment insurance all were original Socialist demands which both parties now support.

"But he insisted the U.S. has far to go to help working men."

"The only way you are going to stop this unfair distribution of income and end poverty amidst plenty is for the people collectively to take over the business and industries and run them democratically for the purpose of providing goods and services for the people rather than making profits for the rich owners," Hoopes declared.

"In all cases it will be public ownership and Democratic management to produce for the public welfare instead of for rich profit of the rich owners."

"This is socialism," Hoopes contended, "and differs from communism as day does from night."

On the issue of "peace" Hoopes criticized the Republican argument that lack of actual military combat signifies the world is at peace.

"This is absurd," the Socialist leader declared. "The way to peace is worldwide elimination of economic suffering. The way to living standards of the poor and against every kind of social reform that we support."

Besides his lawyer son, Hoopes has two other children—son, Neal, who recently finished four years in the Air Force, now is studying engineering at Pennsylvania State University; daughter, Della, taking post graduate work in home economics at Mills College in California.

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## Town Divided into Six Areas To Serve 1,450 Girl Scouts

With membership of over 1,450 girls, Brownies, Intermediates and Senior Scouts in approximately 70 troops, and 265 volunteer adult workers, the Manchester Girl Scouts has become a very large organization. The need for better ways to help such a large group of girls and adults maintain a high level Girl Scout program here has become apparent.

With the need for more adult help with the ever increasing girl population of the town, and the need for help for these adults, it was decided over a year ago that it would be necessary to make different arrangements for providing that help. The town was tentatively divided into six sections, or neighborhoods, and one, the Central Neighborhood, was set up as an experiment last year. This neighborhood functioned so well last year that it was decided to activate the other five neighborhoods this year.

Manchester has been divided into six neighborhoods, the smallest group subdivision in an area, and each of these is served by a neighborhood service team, which is made up of a group of people whose immediate concern is for the Girl Scout welfare of the people living in their neighborhood. In charge is a neighborhood chairman, each of the six neighborhoods in Manchester is now set up with a chairman and a service team.

District Chairmen

Each neighborhood association is composed of between 10 and 15 troops, and the membership includes all registered adults in that neighborhood. They contact the neighborhood chairman when any questions arise.

Locally, the next division is the district, with two of these here, each being made up of three neighborhoods. Chairman of District 1 is Miss Gertrude Liddon, and District 2, Mrs. J. S. Brown.

The Central Neighborhood is made up of the troops which meet at the Center Congregation-

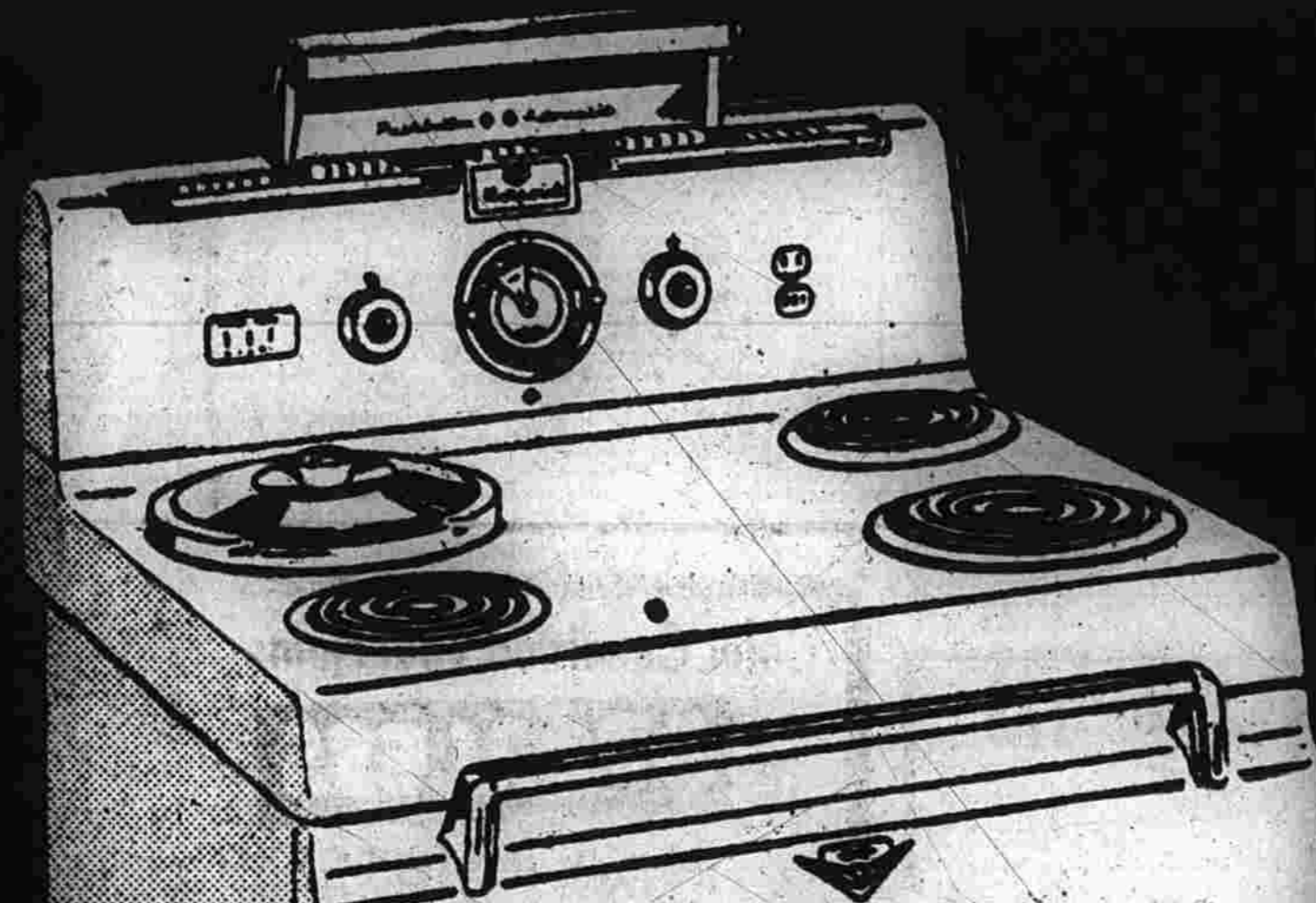

## Ike Sees Military Disadvantage If U.S. Ends H-Tests, Reds Do Not

(Continued from Page One)

States could continue its research and development of weapons while suspending tests of its own.

Eisenhower replied that "if that were feasible, we would still suffer a serious military disadvantage" because, he said, "it requires a year or more to organize and effect such tests as those conducted at our proving ground in the Pacific Ocean."

Stevenson renewed his suggestion in a speech last night and added: "I don't think this nation waits the great decisions about the H-bomb entrusted to (Vice President) Richard M. Nixon."

Eisenhower may touch on the issue again when he follows Stevenson by two days into New York City's Madison Square Garden for a speech on foreign policy tomorrow night. It will be carried nationally by NBC television (8 p. m. EST).

In a less formal broadcast today Eisenhower arranged to reply to questions put by a panel of seven members on a program originating in a Washington studio to be carried nationally by CBS radio and TV.

The Republican National Committee said the women, coming from various sections of the country, would "ask the President leading questions of special interest to women."

Describe U.S. Test Plan

While Eisenhower in his bomb statement made no mention of his Democratic opponent by name, an accompanying chronology of disarmament negotiations made two references to proposals by "Mr. Stevenson" on moves to end H-bomb tests.

Another accompanying document — they aggregated some 6,000 words in all — was a description of the U.S. testing program. Eisenhower had directed the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC), the Department of Defense and other agencies to cooperate in preparation of the documents.

One disclosure was that about 80 per cent of the test blasts set off by this country since 1945 have been conventional atomic weapons — commonly called H-bombs.

The memo said also that the tests have resulted in development of smaller and lighter bombs using less material, and of weapons having a relatively long throw-off of radioactivity.

It was on the latter point that Eisenhower, in his statement, directly challenged Stevenson.

The President said there is radioactivity from all nuclear weapons of whatever size. Fallout of Strontium 90 — which Stevenson has referred to as a "deadly poison" — results from fission, or atom splitting, Eisenhower said, and he continued:

"Fission is the basic phenomenon of the small weapons. Thus the idea that we can stop sending this dangerous material into the air — by concentrating upon small fission weapons — is based upon apparent unawareness of the facts."

No Pact to Humanity

He cited a report made last June by the National Academy of Science in support of his statement that H-bomb testing at its present rate "does not imperil the health of humanity."

On the other hand, Eisenhower said, the tests have two beneficial effects: (1) "To reduce fallout drastically, and (2) "To develop MDM weapons for defense of our people against any possible enemy attack, as well as knowledge vital to our whole program of civil defense."

The President said it is indisputable that Russia is in sympathy with the idea of stopping H-bomb tests. But he said Moscow has always insisted on voluntary agreements having "no safeguards, no control, no inspection."

"We must — and do — seek accord, usually to evolve agreements with other nations that will promote trust and understanding among all peoples," Eisenhower declared.

At the same time, and until that international trust is firmly secured, we must — and do — make sure that the quality and quantity of our military weapons command such respect as to dissuade any other nation from the temptation of aggression.

Thus do we develop weapons, not to wage war, but to prevent war.

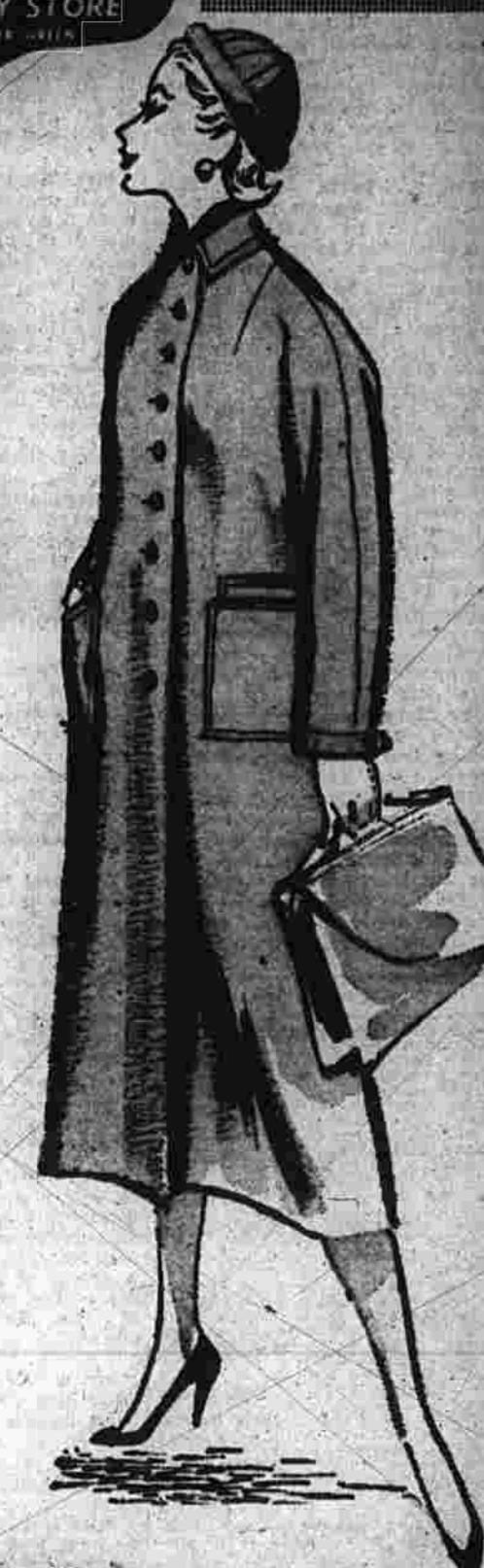

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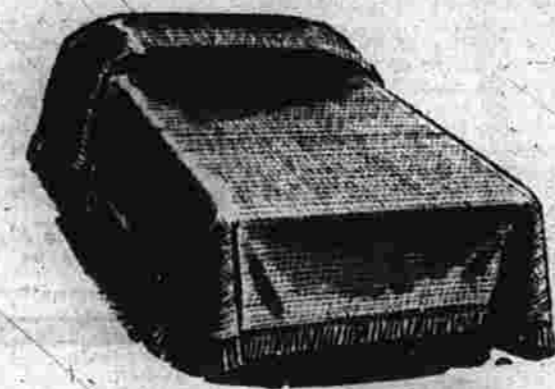

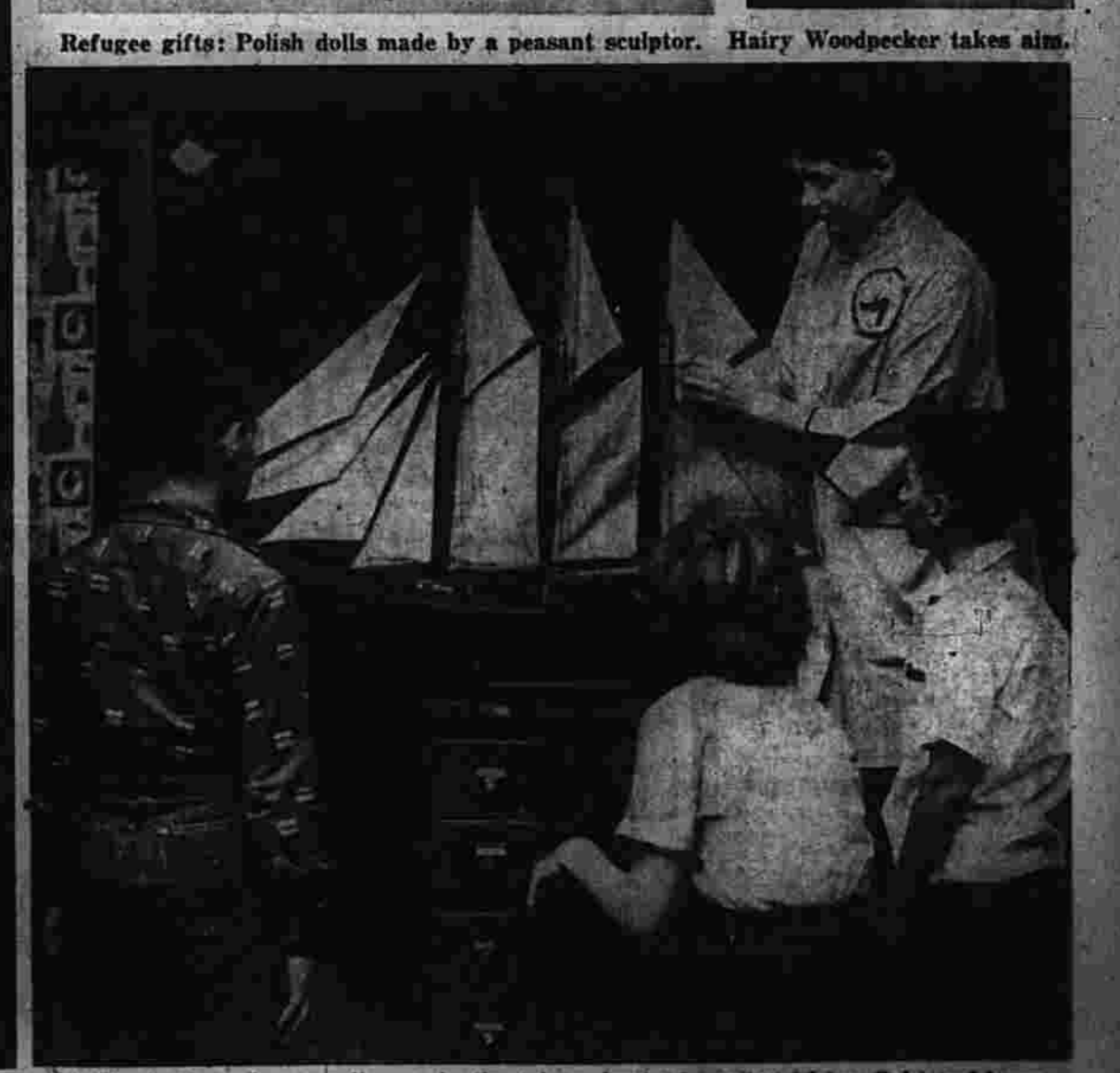
