cial nuclear materials to the agency, he added.

"I wish my country to be the first to recognize by official action what you at this conference have accomplished."

"Assuming that all nations are equal in their capabilities... within their capabilities... together we can overcome the obstacles that lie ahead and prove to each other that international controls are not only feasible but generally acceptable as a way to achieve peace."

More than 50 of 82 participating nations, including the major atomic powers, are expected to sign the agency's charter when it is opened for signature. No planning was known to be planning an immediate action.

The allocation will come out of 20,000 kilograms (44,000 pounds) of fissionable material the President allocated for research and power reactors abroad.

The charter of the new agency was adopted unanimously. It is expected that the agency will begin work after President Eisenhower proposed the formation of a world atomic force project in December 1953.

The agency will come into force when 18 nations, including three of the major atomic powers, submit ratification. Work will actually start at proposed headquarters in Vienna after a general conference next summer.

Among these, he listed reduction of federal spending, taxes and unemployment.

Stevenson's speech dealt mainly with the farm problem, as he sought to woo voters from what the Democrats claim are disoriented groups among the nation's farmers.

After a conference with his running mate, Sen. Estes Kefauver, Stevenson announced at a rally that, if elected, he plans to explore at once the appointment of a task force to pull up the Department of Agriculture farm program in shape for swift action at the opening of Congress.

He said Kefauver would head the task force.

Stevenson said "we must protect the family farm and help the low income farmer—these people the President says he loves and his opponents say should be ignored."

The Democratic candidate said his party does not regard fixed high level farm prices support as the last and only word "but the beginning of the path to a good farm policy."

He said "we must try to keep the prices of perishable products—such as clothing, livestock, poultry, and eggs, low. Stevenson also called for strengthening the soil conservation service and the extension service, which he called a "fair break on taxes for the farmer."

Stevenson said he would give "adequate and sympathetic help in drought times."

Born in Hungary, the Rev. Mr. de Kalos graduated from teachers college in that country and lived there until World War II. After the war, he lived in Austria for six years as a displaced person. He also served in the United States Army in Austria and Hungary. He taught in a CARE orphanage and was engaged in scout work and Protestant youth work. He has served in an Ecumenical Work Camp at Hiroshima, Japan. Sgt. Edward Wenzler of the Manchester Police Department and Earl Vost, sports editor of The Herald, will serve as judges. The winner will be given by the Parkade's merchants association.

Sgt. Wenzler said that, with the increasing number of motor vehicles on the highways, bicycle safety riding contests will "result in lower death rates on our highways" by making youngsters aware of safe riding practices. "It becomes extremely necessary that youngsters riding bicycles are made aware of traffic safety," he said.

Leonard Seader, executive vice president of the Parkade's merchants association, said the merchants agreed to co-sponsor the contest because they are "extremely conscious of the need for highway safety precautions."

### River Spans Seen Changing Town to Metropolitan Center

The present bridge-building program that will put five spans across the Connecticut River in the next few years can make Manchester the metropolitan center of Eastern Connecticut—if Manchester is ready.

Smith said the bridges will be an integral part of the State highway system, which is aimed at promoting urban development rather than at bypassing communities, and cited figures to demonstrate the growth of Manchester.

Population of 56,000. Seen in the preparation of bridge-construction plans, he said, Manchester will have a population of 50,000 by 1965, an increase of 18,000. The figures compiled by the engineering firm of Cloverdale and Colpitts, also showed that whereas there are 100,000 river crossings today, there will be from 100,000 to 180,000 in 1965.

And these estimates, Smith stressed, "are very, very conservative." He said the Charter Oak Bridge is now supporting four times as much traffic per year as had been predicted by Cloverdale and Colpitts when the bridge was in the planning stages.

He said 20 million vehicles crossed the toll bridge last year against a predicted maximum annual use of five million.

### Can H-Bombs, Fall-Out Affect Your Children and Heredity?

perks assume, from animal evidence, that it might take up to 10 generations to the sex cells from birth to age upon an appreciable effect upon descendants if a person became a parent at that age.

Q. Are all gene changes caused by radiation bad ones?

A. Yes, so far as it is known in an academy report. "Observable human mutations are believed to be universally harmful." One expert says the changes in health or longevity may be usually minor and might not be easily apparent.

Q. Do the genetic changes from any radiation cause fears?

A. The genetic changes are rare. Low levels of radiation, such as we are exposed to from all three sources, are more likely to produce descendants subject to certain illnesses, or shorter life-spans than normal, or death before birth, rather than freaks. Very rarely the gene changes might produce genius.

Q. Would such changes be likely to appear in my own children?

A. Only a small fraction of mutations actually cause defects in children of irradiated people, says Dr. Curt Stern of the University of California. The majority of mutations don't appear until later generations, but the total could be distributed over thousands of years.

Q. Does the human race already have "bad" genes?

A. Undoubtedly, says the geneticist, and some persist.

Q. Are other things preserving inferior heredity?

A. Modern medicine, one geneticist observes is probably preserving many persons who would otherwise die from inherited weaknesses or susceptibilities, but now live to have children and transmit those genes.

Can Survive Small Doses

Q. Aside from genetic damage, what does the extra radiation from fall-out do to the body?

A. Most body cells, except germ cells, can recover from small doses of radiation absorbed over a long period of time.

Q. What can be done to avoid any kind of harm, genetically or to my own body, from natural radioactivity?

A. Nothing. This biggest source comes from natural radioactive elements, mostly created when the world began. They include some of the most common elements, such as potassium, uranium and radium in the ground and rocks. From radioactive carbon being created in the atmosphere by cosmic rays, from cosmic rays themselves bombarding you from space. Scientists estimate that every second 3,000 potassium atoms and 2,100 carbon atoms emit rays in your body. But

Q. What do some leading geneticists say about the risk?

A. Dr. A. H. Stewart, California Institute of Technology, says natural radiation probably produces 30 to 40 gene changes per 100,000 germ cells per generation; fall-out to date might be creating one per 100,000 & r m cells per generation.

Dr. Stern says perhaps 40,000 of the children born each year in this country are defective or different from normal in their genes, due to natural causes. So it would be most difficult to detect or prove an increase due to fall-out.

Dr. H. J. Muller, Nobel prize winner in genetics from Indiana University, says it is false to think there is a danger at all to heredity from fall-out, and equally false to say all heredity is being undermined by H-bomb fallout. He says that should "heredity" be stopped for that reason alone.
