

Britain, France Threaten to Occupy Suez Unless Egypt, Israel Agree to Cease-Fire

Nagy Reports Soviet Troops Beginning to Leave Budapest

Vienna, Oct. 30 (AP)—The Budapest Radio late today broadcast an announcement by Premier Nagy that Soviet troops have started pulling out of Budapest.

Nagy began his speech to the nation with these words: "The powerful uprising of the democratic forces has brought us to a parting of the ways. The national government, in complete agreement with the chairmanship of the Hungarian Communist party, has taken an important decision for the life of the nation in the interests of furthering democracy in the country, the one-party system will be abolished."

Nagy said the government not only recognizes the provincial autonomous governments created by the rebels, but "begs for their support."

Former Hungarian President Zoltan Tildy told the largely Roman Catholic nation he hopes to see Josef Cardinal Mindszenty restored promptly to his position as primate of Poland. Cardinal Mindszenty was convicted on treason charges by a Communist court in 1949 and sentenced to life imprisonment. In recent months he has been reported detained under house arrest in various parts of Hungary.

Nagy proposed in a broadcast over Radio Budapest the formation of a coalition government—meaning one of several parties—similar to that established here after the end of World War II in 1945.

The peasant party and a moderate party of farmers and businessmen called the Smallholders were among the most popular at that time.

Fighting broke out at the Maria Tereza Barracks, a rebel stronghold in a week of civil war. Insurgents who held out against Soviet tank fire marched off defiantly this morning and announced they would not put down their arms until the Russians have left Budapest.

Five Soviet tanks were still parked about 300 yards from the barracks. The government-controlled radio had promised the Russians would start pulling back their Hungarian bases at 9 a.m. (3 a.m. EST) "after insurgent forces start surrendering their arms." That hour passed without confirmation of any general withdrawal.

Nagy, a veteran Red once imprisoned as a traitor, reiterated a pledge that his government would start at the earliest possible moment to negotiate with the Soviet government for complete withdrawal of Russian soldiers from Hungary.

Adlai Claims Ike Holding Truth On Mideast Danger from Nation

Boston, Oct. 30 (AP)—Adlai Stevenson contended today that President Eisenhower has endangered the peace by withholding the "whole truth" about tragic developments abroad.

Stevenson cited the new crisis in the Middle East as an example.

He pursued this theme as he carried forward his final week's drive for votes with scheduled speeches in Maryland, New Jersey and Pennsylvania after a roaring reception last night in Boston's Mechanics Hall.

There, taking note of news that Israel's military forces had struck toward the Suez Canal, the Democratic standard bearer said it was hard to speak "about today's ominous and confusing developments in the Middle East."

"But I must say this—and it is only to repeat what I have been saying throughout this campaign," he said, "the government in Washington has been telling us that all is well in the world, that there is peace, that there is—as the President announced only a few days ago—good news from the Middle East."

Ike Cancels Trip Due to War Scare

Washington, Oct. 30 (AP)—President Eisenhower today canceled his scheduled campaign trip to Dallas, Oklahoma City and Memphis tomorrow because of the Middle East crisis.

Eisenhower sent identical messages to supporters who had arranged for his speeches in these states which supported him in 1952. The message said:

"The turn of events yesterday leaves me no option—in the interests of working for peace—but to remain in the White House Wednesday to deal with the situation developing in the Middle East."

The President said it was "with exceeding regret" that he canceled the talks.

Press secretary James Hagerty, who announced the decision, said he did not know whether Eisenhower would be able to reschedule the visits before election day.

Also uncertain at the moment, Hagerty said, is whether Eisenhower will be able to keep his date in Philadelphia Thursday evening for a major address to be broadcast by radio and television (9:30 p.m. EST).

It appeared this would be easier to fit into the suddenly disrupted campaign schedule, but Hagerty said "everything will be decided on a day-to-day basis."

The White House has announced the itinerary only through the scheduled Philadelphia appearance.

Top Congress Leaders Await Call on Crisis

Washington, Oct. 30 (AP)—The Eisenhower administration was reported today to have alerted congressional leaders for possible emergency conferences at the White House on the Middle East fighting.

A high official said today was sent this morning to the following leaders:

House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.), Senate Democratic leader Johnson of Texas, Senate Republican leader, Minority Leader, California, and House Republican leader, Martin of Massachusetts. Also to Sen. George (D-Ga.) and Rep. Richards (D-SC), chairman of the Senate and House Foreign Policy Committees.

The word passed to the six men was that they should be prepared to fly to the capital on quick notice for possible talks with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles.

All leaders notified were reported to have expressed complete readiness to do so. George is already in Washington.

The move by the administration seemed mainly precautionary because top officials shortly before noon were reported largely in the dark about the actual developments in the Middle East area.

The report of the standby alert to the Congression leaders came shortly after a 75-minute conference President Eisenhower had at the White House with Dulles, Undersecretary of State Herbert Hoover Jr. and Herman Phleger, legal adviser to the State Department.

Dulles, questioned by reporters as he was leaving the White House, said he, Hoover and Phleger had reviewed the whole situation with the President but that he could say nothing at the moment about possible American moves.

Cuban Police Kill 10 as Rico Plotters

Havana, Cuba, Oct. 30 (AP)—Cuban police shot dead 10 civilians they described as "insurrectionists" in a gunfight yesterday at the Haitian embassy, where the civilians had taken refuge.

A government announcement implicated the civilians in the assassination Sunday of Col. Antonio Blanco Rico, chief of Cuba's military intelligence. It said the civilians fled to the embassy after Blanco Rico was shot down outside a cafe.

The police, receiving a tip telephoned from the embassy, surrounded the building in the fashionable Miramar section of Havana. The Haitian ambassador

U.N. Urged to Order Israelis Out of Egypt

United Nations, N. Y., Oct. 30 (AP)—Russia and the United States joined today in demanding that the U.N. Security Council order the immediate withdrawal of Israeli forces from Egyptian territory.

At the same time, Russia called on the council to warn Britain and France against any military intervention in the Israeli-Egyptian conflict.

Jr. made his demand at an emergency meeting of the 11-nation council summoned hastily during the night after Israeli troops moved deep into Egypt.

Lodge told the council the United States would present a formal proposal at another meeting of the council this afternoon calling for an immediate end of the hostilities and for Israel to withdraw immediately from Egyptian territory.

U.S. delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. appealed to all members of the council to refrain from giving Israel any assistance or from taking "advantage of the situation for any selfish interest."

"Failure of the council to react at this time," Lodge said, "would be a clear avoidance of its responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security."

Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold told the council that Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, U.N. truce chief in Palestine, had called on both Egypt and Israel for an immediate cease-fire. So far, he said, he had no information as to whether either side had replied.

In another development, Jordan formally urged the council to end the fighting. At the same time, Jordan warned that it would go to the aid of Egypt in fulfillment of its treaty obligations.

Yugoslav delegate Joza Brijel declared that the council must act quickly to prevent an Israeli-Arab conflagration. He agreed that Israeli forces must be ordered to withdraw.

"Any disregard of this," he said, "would call for the application of stern measures under Chapter Seven of the charter."

This is the section which provides for the voting of penalties, such as economic and diplomatic quarantines and in extreme cases even military action.

Brijel joined Lodge in appeal to all countries to refrain from any action which might aggravate the situation.

"The council must live up to its responsibility."

Soviet delegate Arkady A. Sobolev declared that the Security Council was confronted with an extremely dangerous situation. He said it was clear that Israel could not have acted as it did without

Rival Forces Clash On Sinai Peninsula

Egypt and Israel received a stern warning from Britain and France today to cease fighting in the Sinai peninsula. The western powers threatened to occupy key positions in the Suez Canal Zone unless there is a cease-fire within 12 hours.

The announcement came as Egyptian and Israeli forces were clashing deep within the Sinai peninsula, which Israel invaded yesterday.

Prime Minister Eden said Britain and France have asked both sides to keep their forces 10 miles away from the canal.

Eden said British and French troops will intervene unless Egypt and Israel comply.

Further, he said the two western powers have asked Egypt for the right temporarily to occupy key areas in the Suez canal zone to separate Egyptian and Israeli units and "to guarantee freedom of transit through the canal by ships of all nations."

A foreign Office spokesman said the ultimatum will expire at 4:30 a.m. tomorrow (11:30 p.m. EST Tuesday).

Explaining that Britain and France addressed urgent communications to both Israel and Egypt, Eden said:

"In these we have called upon both sides to stop all hostile action by land, sea and air forthwith and to withdraw their military forces to a distance of 10 miles from the canal."

Temporary Move

"Further, in order to separate the belligerents and to guarantee freedom of transit through the canal by the ships of all nations we have asked the Egyptian government to agree that Anglo-French forces should move temporarily to a distance of 10 miles from the Suez Canal."

Eden said it was made clear both Egypt and Israel that if they did not comply with the demand to stop fighting within 12 hours "British and French forces will move to the Suez Canal and to Port Said, Ismailia and Suez."

Eden said after several hours of intensive consultation here with French Foreign Minister Guy Mollet.

He also announced that Britain and France are joining with the United States in U.N. Security Council action.

Israel last night assured Britain it has no intention of attacking the neighboring state of Jordan.

Eden reported:

"Before Eden spoke, Britain began speeding a massive fleet through the eastern Mediterranean."

Paratroopers Dropped

Eden told the British Parliament paratroopers had been dropped in the area of the Suez Canal, but he did not say whether they were Egyptians or Israelis.

He said the air forces of both Egypt and Israel had been active in the neighborhood of the canal and that the British and French governments were determined to do everything possible to safeguard traffic through the waterway.

Cairo, Oct. 30 (AP)—An Egyptian Army communiqué today claimed it had "annihilated Israeli troops east of El Themed, Sinai desert post 30 miles inside the Egyptian frontier. The communiqué added: "Mapping up operation against enemy troops in the rest of the battle area is continuing."

Cairo, Oct. 30 (AP)—The sound of anti-aircraft fire was heard over Cairo today.

Residents gathered in the streets but could see no planes.

Smoke puffs spread across a bright blue sky.

No alarm was given. Traffic continued normally while ack ack fire continued over this city of three million.

The Hague, Oct. 30 (AP)—An American naval force today was ordered to break off a visit to the Netherlands and leave at noon for a secret destination, a U.S. embassy spokesman announced.

"The ships are those of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet's Hunter Killer Group No. 2. They include the aircraft carrier USS Intrepid, six destroyers, two submarines and a tanker. The force arrived in Rotterdam yesterday for a 4-day visit.

Because of the current Middle East crisis, there is considerable speculation that the ships had been ordered to join the U.S. Sixth Fleet in the eastern Mediterranean.

HUNGARY WARNS REDS
Budapest, Hungary, Oct. 30 (AP)—The Hungarian government tonight threatened to attack the Russian forces unless they leave Budapest within 12 hours. The threat was contained in a proclamation issued at 8 p.m. by the Hungarian Air Command.

Western sources said the Russians apparently hurried their warning maneuvers in coordination with a massive security alert order by the nervous East German Communist regime.

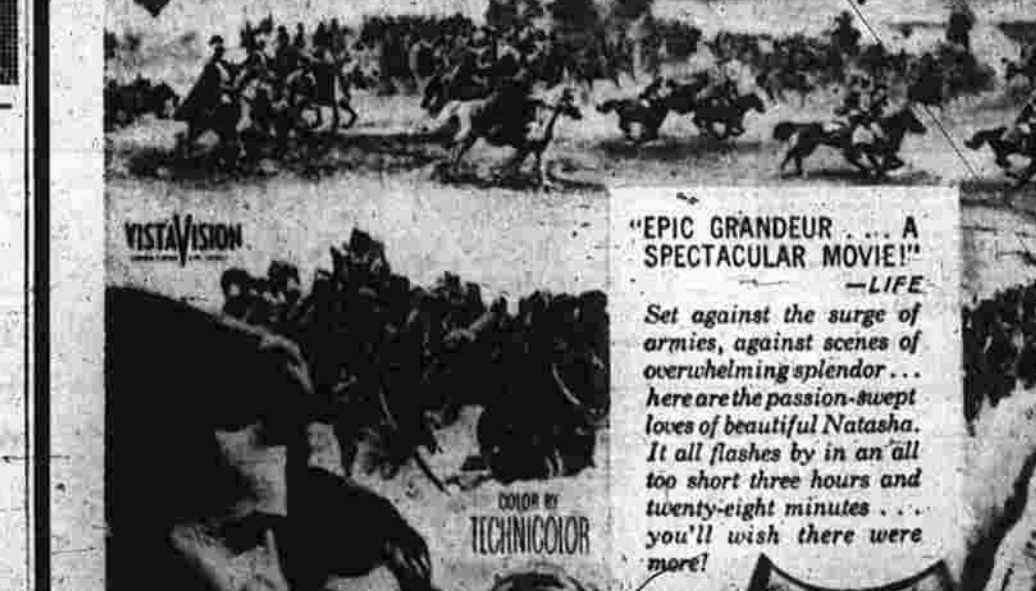
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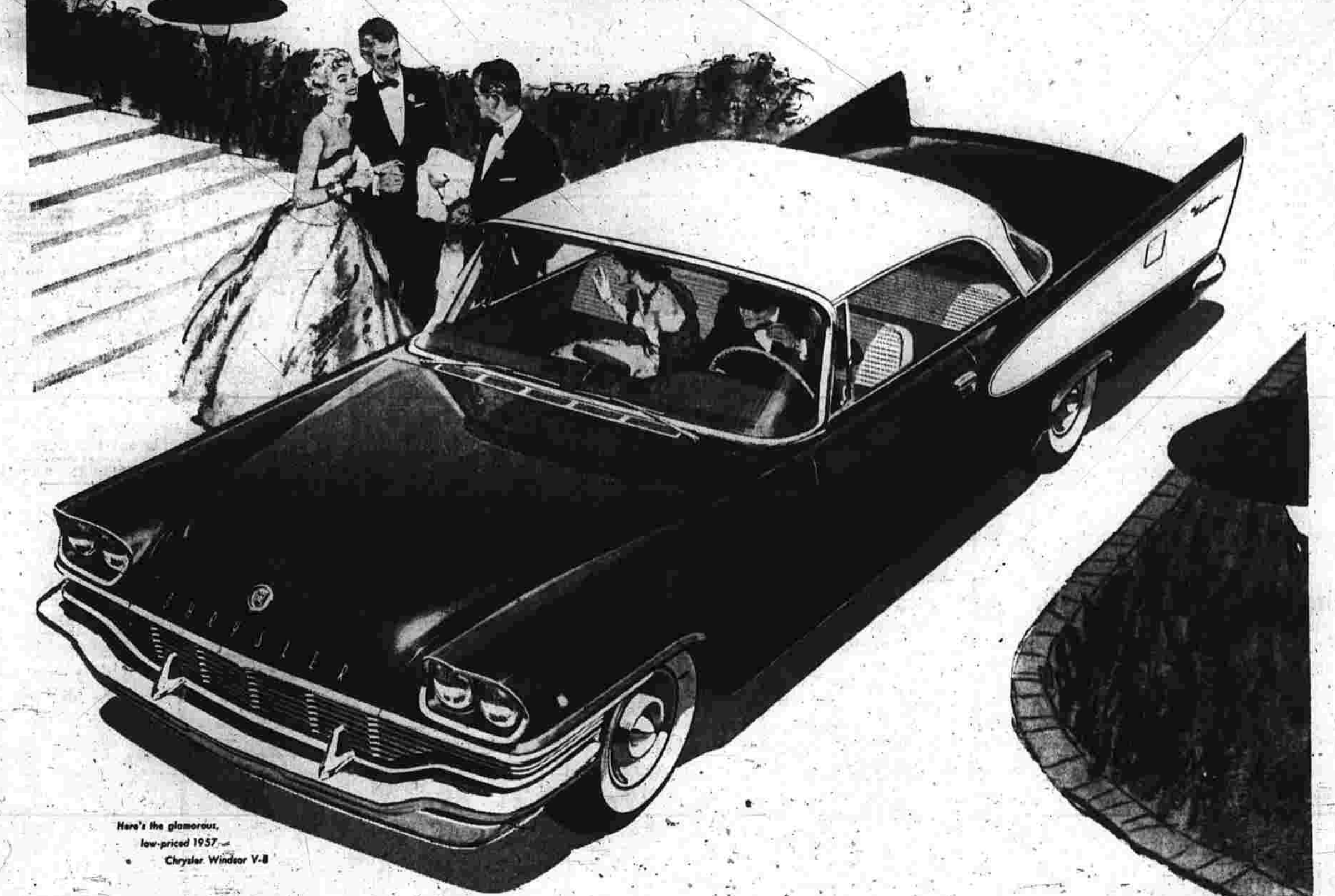

 Israel has deliberately, knowingly, and with premeditation, acted in aggression. One thing can be said in explanation of Israel's action, but it is not enough.
 Israel has been living for six years under a truce which has failed to produce its ultimate objective, which would be the recognition of the Arab states of the fact that Israel exists. This Arab refusal to accept anything about Israel as real and permanent has given Israel the feeling that it would be only a question of time before the Arab states moved their forces to liquidate Israel. In the policy of Israel, then, this present aggression is a fight for survival, being waged by striking the enemy before the enemy is strong enough and united enough to be the one to strike first.
 This is the way Israel feels, but it is not enough to justify this present act of aggression, which boldly chooses full war. It does not seem to be enough.
 If any Arab nation or group of nations had opened full scale war against Israel, the Arab nations would have been committed to the protection of Israel. Rather than only of that nation, Israel has chosen to attack. That leaves the outside world with the obligation of defending the nation attacked, which happens to be Egypt.

Israel Attacks (continued)
 Israel has been shrewd and unscrupulous in choosing its moment of attack. It knows, or hopes, that each of the world's important nations has, at this particular moment, preoccupations of its own. It knows, for instance, that Britain and France have, for some months past, been living to attack Egypt. Meanwhile, in order to take back the Suez Canal, it knows, further, that France has even more bitter than Britain about this, and has wanted something to happen to Egypt not only because of the Suez Canal, but also because of suspected Egyptian encouragement to rebel in French North Africa. In fact, there are rumors today that France may secretly have encouraged Israel to launch this attack. Israel knows, also, that Russia has dramatic concerns of her own at the moment, in the revolt of the satellites.
 Finally, Israel knows, and is obviously betting heavily on, the fact that there is an American presidential election next week, with the incumbent President running on a platform of peace in the world.
 Israel hopes that this fact will swerve American policy, and keep us from making any involvement in the war that Israel has started.
 All these presumptions on the part of Israel, these wicked reasons for staging the attack on Egypt at this particular moment, must somehow be disappointed and defeated. The outside world must settle for peace. American policy must be bold and decisive, even to the use of American force under United Nations auspices if it moves necessary, no matter what the effect of such action on the hopes of the American electorate may be calculated to be. The law against aggression has been violated. The aggression policy has been halted and thrown back to its own authors. If the world settles quickly enough, and shows its determination quickly enough, this may be accomplished without full-scale fighting. Perhaps Israel has brought to its senses. But of the principles which must be enforced here is no doubt. Israel has deliberately chosen to challenge the whole world's capacity to prevent war, and it cannot be allowed to win on such a challenge even though the prevention may require a limited, nation police

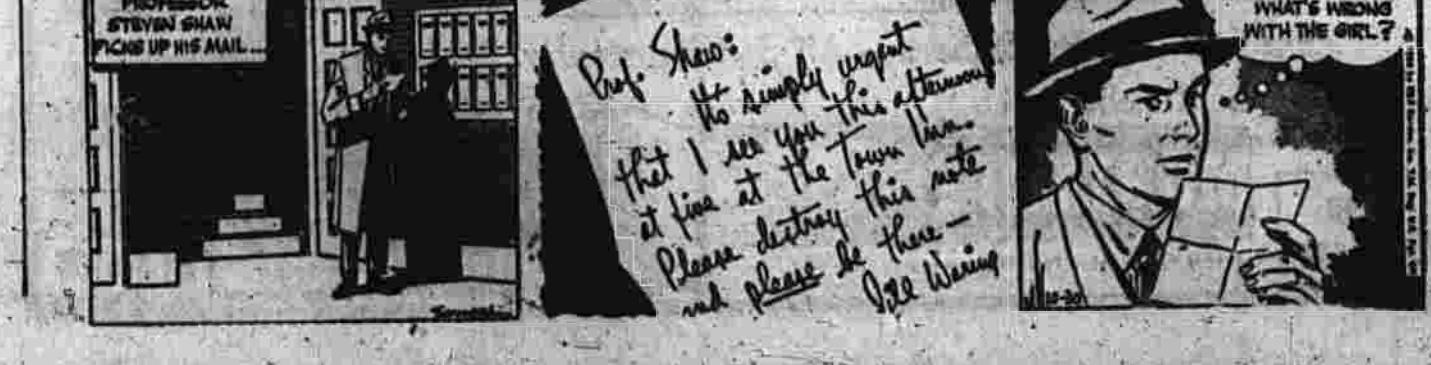
