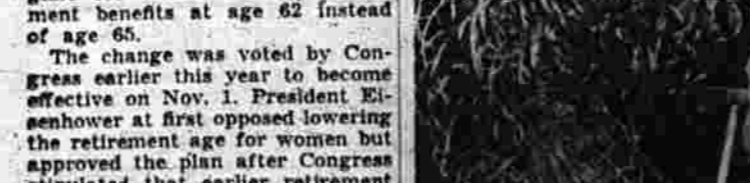

Social Security Benefits Start For Women, 62

Washington, Oct. 31 (AP)—Starting tomorrow, women become eligible for Social Security retirement benefits at age 62 instead of age 65.

The change was voted by Congress earlier this year to become effective on Nov. 1.

Under the new law, women aged 62 and over are eligible to claim benefits under the earlier retirement provisions.

Some women are eligible for Social Security benefits at age 62.

The Health, Education and Welfare Department, which administers the Social Security system, said that 211,000 women had filed claims by Oct. 18 for earlier retirement benefits.

Urged Patrols by U.N.

The Democratic standard bearer, pushing his bid for Pennsylvania's possibly crucial 32 electoral votes, told a throng of cheering supporters here last night that he made his Middle East proposal last Armistice Day at the University of Virginia.

"Needless to say, this proposal was dismissed by the administration as they are now dismissing my suggestion that we take prompt steps to stop the experimental explosion of hydrogen bombs," he declared.

In that speech at Charlottesville nearly a year ago, Stevenson said he proposed the United Nations "underlie" patrol duties in the area of tension to avoid bloodshed.

### Democrats Obligated to Talk H-Bomb Issue, Ribicoff Says

Rockville, Oct. 31 (Special)—The Democratic party owes to the people of the United States the obligation of talking about the hydrogen bomb, even if it means defeat at the polls, Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff told Tolland County Democrats last night.

Speaking at a rally at North-east School, the governor said Adlai Stevenson, Democratic presidential candidate, recognized the issue and brought it before the people, even at the risk of losing the election.

He advocated an integrated court system and urged election of Democratic candidates Rep. Thomas Dodd, seeking a U.S. Senate seat, and Douglas Bennett, candidate for U.S. Representative.

Others speaking at the rally included Bennett and Robert F. Talbot, candidate for State Senator.

Regarding the H-bomb, Gov. Ribicoff said the presidential candidate recognizes that if the United States is to continue to be a world leader it must gain the confidence of other countries in regard to its moral, ideal and principles.

He is no longer a question of war or peace, but of survival itself, the governor said. The question of the bomb is surrounded by mystery. He called for more discussion of the problem.

The governors visited into Rockville from an appearance in Bridgeport earlier in the evening and departed almost immediately after delivering his half-hour talk here.

Regarding foreign policy, he said despite what local political leaders say, the people are vitally interested in the issue.

One of the greatest lacks of the current campaign has been the failure to discuss foreign policy, he said.

Approved Korea Stand. Regarding the Democratic stand on Korea, the governor said Secretary of State Dulles, Vice President Nixon and President Eisenhower all commended the decision to intervene at the time.

Viewing with alarm the country's present policy, the governor cited what he called a crumbling of NATO, the Suez situation.

Taxes 1 p. 4. To pay for the new disability benefits, Social Security taxes will go up next Jan. 1.

Under the new law, effective today, widows and dependent mothers (whose supporting relatives have died) have everything to gain and nothing to lose by earlier retirement. They are eligible for the same benefits as at 65.

Social Security officials say a working woman retiring at 62 instead of 65 will be ahead of the game for 15 years.

Non-working wives or retired women also now can "retire" at 62. But their monthly payments, supplementing their husbands', will be cut by 25 per cent at 62, and by lesser amounts at 63 or 64.

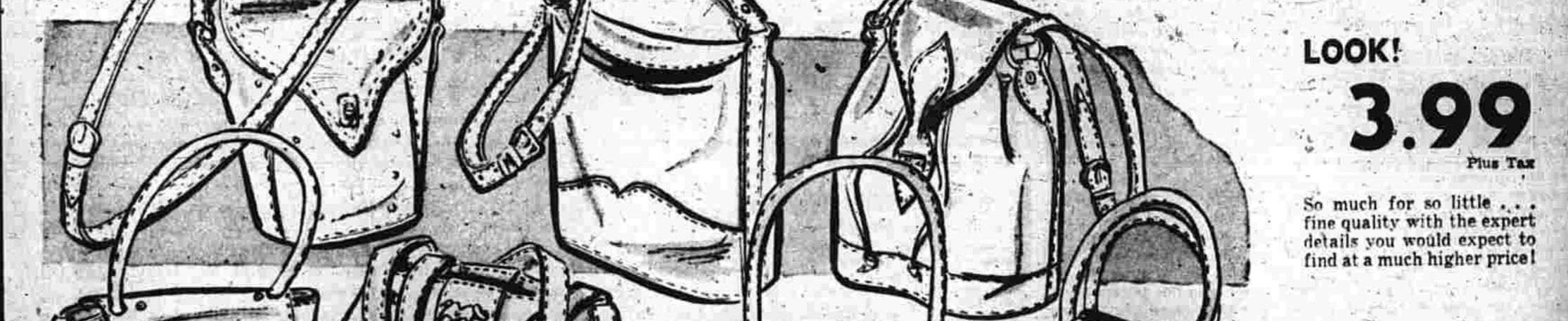

Madness

This world's slow, tortuous and necessary struggle to become a world of law received a stab in the back from unexpected quarters yesterday.

For the first time in the history of the United Nations, votes were cast in the Security Council on the side of aggression, against a halt of fighting.

They were cast by nations who seemed to welcome a war because they wished to join in the aggression involved.

The two nations who did this were not the accustomed villains of the world scene. They were the mature, presumably responsible, civilized nations of Britain and France.

That such mature nations should come from these two great friends of ours, that one of them, France, should actually praise the aggression, is a thing that has never happened in the history of the United Nations.

It is almost unbelievable. And it is, of course, a measure of the desperation to which the present leadership of the United Nations has descended to carry out their own mission of vengeance against the nation which happened to be the victim of aggression—all this is almost unbelievable.

It could be nothing other than madness and desperation which could lead these two great powers to encourage the aggression of Israel against Egypt so they could be provided with an opportunity to join in that aggression under a cloak of peace.

What hope is there? First, at this writing, there is still a hope that President Eisenhower's powerful plea for a policy of law instead of a policy of plunder will obtain a last minute hearing.

Second, after the Korean United Nations action, which seemed to escape a veto only because Russia was absent from the Security Council at that time, this country took the lead in setting up United Nations code and machinery for action by the General Assembly, where the veto does not apply to policy decisions.

In the event the Security Council ever became vetoed on a question of aggression, if there could be such a meeting of the General Assembly, we think there would be no doubt where the great majority of nations would stand. They would stand with us, for peace.

Mission in Progress

"We need," said this page in 1952, advocating the election of Dwight D. Eisenhower, "a foreign policy which is liberated from two abject and straggling fears: one the fear of Communism abroad and the other the fear of McCarthyism at home."

By the one, we mean that our foreign policy should be simply stop being afraid of Communism abroad. That doesn't mean rushing about with a big chip on our shoulder. That is in itself the tactic of fear, which we follow too much now.

In another discussion of the foreign policy issue, back in 1952, we said this:

"This country needs a leadership bold enough and strong enough and respected enough to take our foreign policy out of prison and let it operate as intelligence and reason dictate. It needs a leadership capable of making a hard-balled decision to live in the same world with Russia and do so without war. It needs a leadership which can be tough in the exploitation of the possibilities for peace, rather than tough only in its courting of the sword."

"One political situation, in short, after all, planning to go to war with Communist China on behalf of Chiang Kai-shek."

Meaning, in the fall of 1954, President Eisenhower began saying something which became a recurrent theme of his: "I am not a Communist. I am a Republican."

The next summer, with the important and vital encouragement of Senator George, he went to Geneva and met with the Russian leaders and all of them said those things together, admitting, before the world, that an atomic stalemate had been reached which no one dared break.

From all these things there have been various cumulative effects. Actually there are two Witches. The first Witch, which is the degree of peace made, in various areas and policies in which the free world and healthy sense of American moderation in the world.

It is that same year, President Eisenhower had the courage to take truce in Korea—on terms which had been negotiated under the Democrats but never accepted by them. He thus accepted peace without victory for anybody in a situation which, in our opinion, should never have attempted more than the reputation of aggression in the first place.

Later that same year, the President was impetuous by many of his advisers to do something to mobilize this nation for the horrors of atomic war. In a complete reversal of the emphasis and direction, they urged upon him, he went before the United Nations to deliver, in one of the world's great and moving orations, his proposal for the creation of an international agency to develop the peaceful uses of the atom.

He had, in a word, concentrated on peace in a policy where his advisers had urged him to concentrate on the honor of the atom. The other day, this agency formally came into being. The speech itself remains as the first great, comprehensive breaking of the cold war. The world, in that moment, became conscious of a leader who dared defy thought patterns of the past, and whose motive, and strike with new ideas for new hopes.

The following summer, President Eisenhower broke the iron curtain, and there were disastrous floods in the satellite countries of central Europe. He offered American food aid across the iron curtain. Some cynics thought this a gesture. But the offer was accepted and the help delivered, to the gratitude of people who had, until that moment, been led to think that the outside world would have nothing to do with them until they had spilled their own blood to reestablish their own freedom.

Meanwhile, President Eisenhower, in the cold war period, to turn out of the plane incident typical of that cold war into a truthful rather than an inflammatory, vein of thought. He was the first to admit the truth, which was that one of our planes shot at might indeed have been over Communist territory. It was perhaps a minor thing, even though, in the first instance, he did have to contradict the routine inflammatory pronouncements of our State and Defense departments. But it told ears all around the world, that a new and more honest and more peaceful kind of leadership had arrived at the top in America.

What the Indo-Chinese civil war flared to the danger point there was, again, much routine advice at Washington to the effect that we should intervene there, even though we had no legal ground for doing so, even though the intervention would have had to be a "hot war" affair, because there was no possible pretext for United Nations action there. If we had gone into Indo-China, we might have done so, if we were lucky, and we would be there in defense of French colonialism. The rules of power politics, in fact, were the only justification for our going in there. President Eisenhower didn't find them good enough. The problem of Formosa, requested to the Eisenhower administration by Truman policy, was to have a new and more honest and more peaceful kind of leadership had arrived at the top in America.

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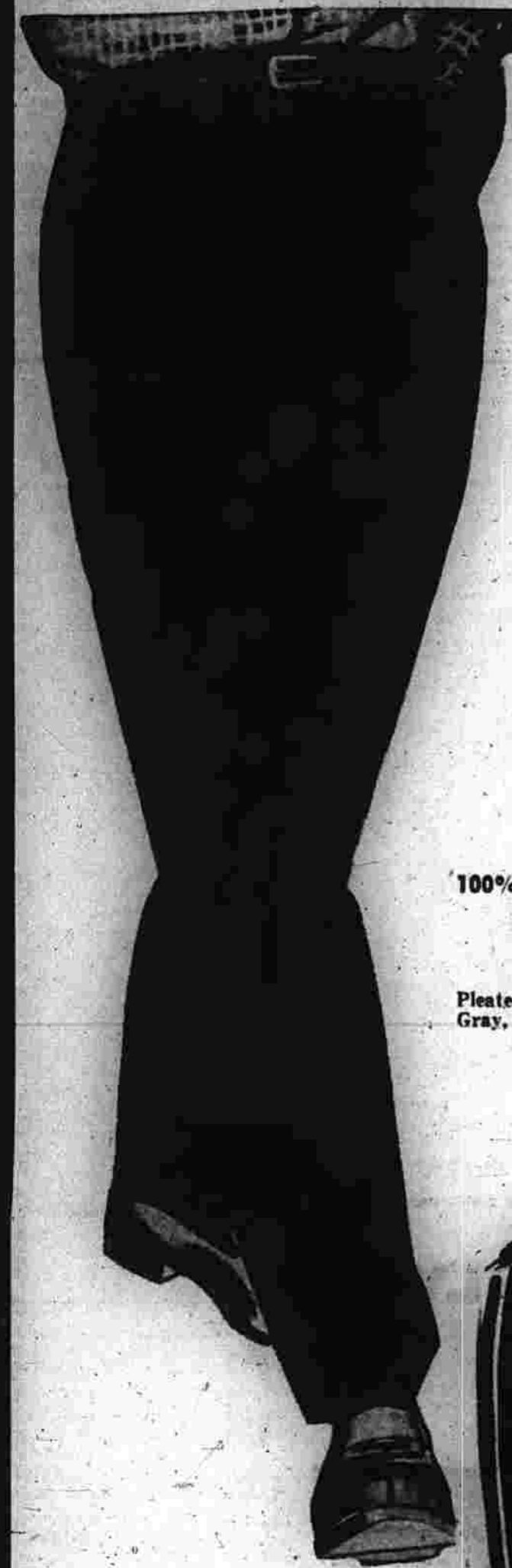

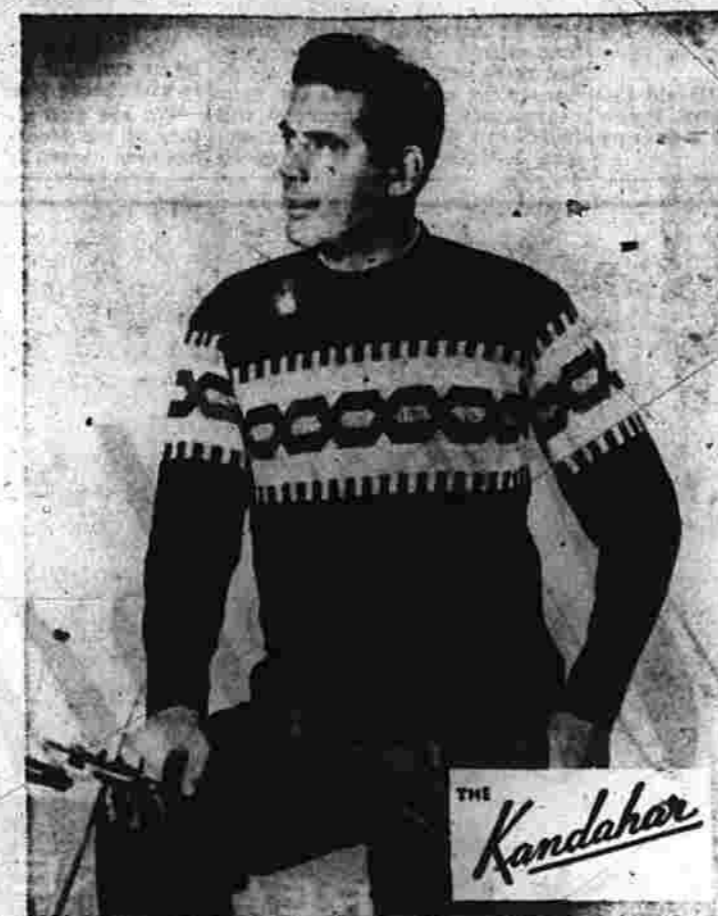

### Rockville-Vernon New School Passed By 393-Vote Margin

Rockville, Oct. 31 (Special)—The Olson-Rady Committee or the Vernon voters, by a margin of 393 to 1,269, approved a \$1,850,000 appropriation for construction of a 1,000-pupil high school yesterday, bringing to a close a 2-year struggle between town and city.

As in the April referendum to reject the vote on the Simkins site, rural Vernon held the balance. Although Rockville cast 1,164 votes against the school yesterday, Vernon cast only 105 in the negative votes while casting 847 "Yes" ballots. Seven hundred fifteen residents backed the "Yes" side.

One hundred seventy more people voted in yesterday's election than on the site vote. The favorable vote increased by 120 ballots in yesterday's election over the previous one, and the opposing side picked up 50 votes over the same election.

By the same token, Rockville, although of the opposition to the school, picked up 66 votes yesterday over the total number cast at the Simkins vote. On April 4 a total of 1,108 Rockville votes were cast to reject the Simkins motion, while yesterday 1,164 "No" votes were cast on the appropriation.

Vernon again saved the day for those favoring the school by casting 16 more votes in favor than it did last April, and showed a difference yesterday of only an additional six votes against.

Unless the Board of Directors votes within 45 days to create a parking authority, the voters will have an opportunity to decide the issue at a special election.

The 45 day period started yesterday when Town Clerk Samuel J. Turkington Jr. certified a petition for enactment to the Board of Directors.

Under the terms of the Town Charter, the Directors must have passed the resolution, or one substantially like it, within 45 days after certification, or the town clerk must call an election.

The petition was backed by a group of Main St. merchants as the means of forcing a decision on a parking authority. Those merchants, and the Chamber of Commerce, have argued that a parking authority is the only means through which the town can solve the town's parking problem.

Advocates of an authority have passed the resolution, or one substantially like it, within 45 days after certification, or the town clerk must call an election.

President Eisenhower scored a resounding victory over Democratic presidential candidate Adlai E. Stevenson in a mock election yesterday at Manchester High School.

Eisenhower, who led his ticket to a Republican sweep of the election, received 1,425 votes while Stevenson was getting 587.

Over 2,000 Cast Ballots

Slightly more than 2,000 students participated in the voting, casting ballots for candidates for President, U.S. Senator, Representative at-large and Representative in the First District.

The students voted throughout the school day on standard voting machines set up in the school.

With Republicans lining up majorities of between 2 and 3 to 1 over their opponent, the strongest Democrat in the field yesterday was Congressman Thomas Dodd.

The Senatorial nominee received 676 votes. But his opponent, Sen. Prescott Bush, received 1,221.

The Republican majorities in the Representative-at-large and First District Representative contests were higher. Antoni Sadlak, incumbent Representative at-large, received 1,425 votes. His opponent, Matthew Kuta of Meriden, polled 587.

And Edwin H. May Jr. of Wetherfield, who is making his first bid for political office, was favored over State Sen. Patrick Ward of Hartford for the First District seat by a 700-vote margin, 1,352 to 652.

Besides these major party candidates, a number of other aspirants are running in the mock election.

In the Senatorial race, Mayor Jasper McLevy of Bridgeport, who is running on the Socialist ticket, received 12 votes; Suzanne S. Stevenson, an Independent Republican, got seven; and Vivian Kellomaki, who is conducting a write-in campaign, was given six written votes.

Sponsored by School Club

The mock election was sponsored by the school's Current Affairs Club and directed by J. J. Piper, the club's faculty adviser. The voting clinaxed a month-long citizen program.

### Cowenry Town Politics Remain Brisk

Cowenry, Oct. 31 (Special)—Town politics here remained more brisk than in neighboring towns and cities as both parties came out with statements from their General Assembly candidates.

In answering Democratic charges that they had not publicly stated their opinions, the Republicans said:

In regard to highways, they said:

"We insist that funds appropriated to build roads and bridges be solely used for that purpose. Our citizens are paying increased gasoline taxes for this purpose and are entitled to have them without delay. We will work for and support continuing aid of this kind."

On veterans affairs, they said Republican legislators lived up to platform pledges and were thorough in granting of the bonus for veterans who served during the Korean conflict.

Meanwhile, Democratic incumbent Stephen Loysain has made public another letter directed to his GOP opponents, Royden Smith and Otto C. Miller.

The letter was written, he said, in regard to their choosing to ignore my letter of Oct. 16 as to their stand on zoning and Board of Finance in the town."

He further stated, "Many complex problems face the people of our town. Their solution requires initiative, vision and resourcefulness. The voters expect their representatives in the Legislature will be more than perfunctory rubber stamps or 'yes' men for their state political organizations."

Loysain also expressed regret in both candidates' unwillingness to meet with him in a public forum to discuss the specified issues.

When contacted, both GOP candidates stated they had "no comment" in regard to the letter.

### Farm Prices Dip For Fourth Time

Washington, Oct. 31 (AP)—Thanks to a drop in the price of wheat, farm prices for most farm products declined for the fourth time in a row.

The mid-October prices were still 2.18 per cent above those of a year ago, but were still 27 per cent below the record high reached in February, 1951.

Prices Normally Decline - Farm prices as a whole normally decline during this period, reflecting increased supplies of farm products provided by the harvest season and the heavy marketing of livestock.

Since 1910, prices declined an average of about 1 per cent between mid-September and mid-October in years when markets were not influenced by war demands.

The October decline was expected to be about 1 per cent, but was held back by a complete halt to the revolt that has swept Hungary more than a week, Premier Nagy promised the Communist one-party system would be abolished. 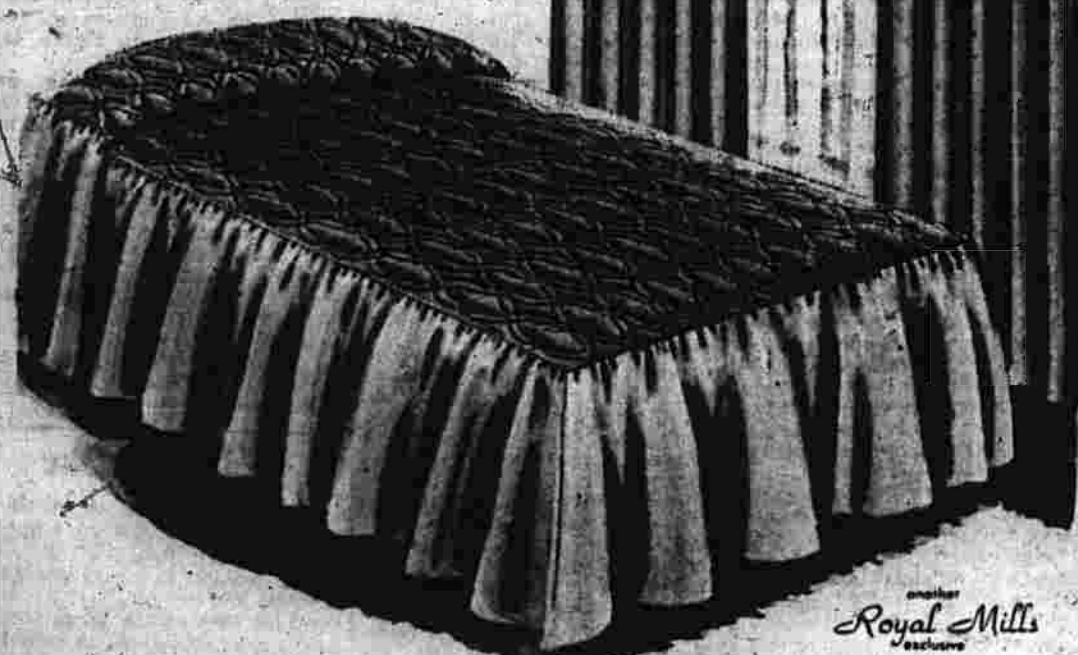
