British, French Push Air Raids on Egypt; Cairo Says Sunken Warship Blocks Canal

Hungary to Drop Warsaw Alliance

Vienna, Nov. 1 (AP)—Premier Imre Nagy of Hungary called in the Soviet Ambassador today and gave notice that Hungary was withdrawing from the Warsaw Pact, Radio Budapest announced. Nagy also told the Soviet Ambassador Hungary intends to pursue a neutral course in the future and protested the entrance of new Soviet troops into the country, the broadcast said. Nagy said the government had received reliable reports of the new Russian forces. The ambassador, the Free Budapest Radio said, promised to forward the protest and ask for an immediate answer from Moscow. Asks U.N. Protection Nagy informed all diplomatic missions in Budapest that Hungary was calling upon the United Nations for the protection of Hungarian neutrality. Nagy, it was reported, already has advised Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld of Hungary's wish for neutral status. He asked that the question be put on the agenda of the coming General Assembly.

Ike Looking to U.N. For Crisis Solution

Washington, Nov. 1 (AP)—President Eisenhower, having ruled out use of U.S. armed forces in the present Middle East fighting, looked to the United Nations today to find a way of solving "this tormenting problem." "In the past," the President declared, "radioactive hydrogen bombs have been used. The United Nations has proved able to find a way to end bloodshed. We believe it can and will do so again." He did not suggest specific steps the United States might take to carry out a policy which he defined as "to do all in its power to localize the fighting and to end the conflict." Eisenhower said the U.N. General Assembly subsequently called into special session this afternoon should be able to bring "the opinion of the world" to bear on the situation created by Israel's attack on Egypt and British-French intervention.

Ike on Air Tonight To Talk on Crisis

Washington, Nov. 1 (AP)—President Eisenhower reportedly planning new jobs at Adlai E. Stevenson, returns to the campaign platform tonight in Philadelphia for further discussion of the Middle East crisis. In a radio-TV address to be carried coast to coast (9:30 p.m. EST, NBC), the President may have something to say about a contention by Stevenson, Democratic opponent, that "the world is on the brink of war again" because, Stevenson said, Eisenhower's foreign policies in the Middle East have been disastrous. Asks Equal Air Time

Adlai Charges Ike Aims Brought World to Brink

Pittsburgh, Nov. 1 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson canceled three upstate New York political talks today. He prepared to fly to New York City and see radio and television time to further his contention that Eisenhower administration policies have "brought the whole world to the brink of war." The hostilities in Egypt virtually crowded out all other issues in the Democratic standard-bearer's strategy as he entered the final stage of a campaign in which he is seeking to take the initiative on the "peace issue." His campaign staff announced the cancellation of political talks scheduled for today in Syracuse, Rochester and Buffalo, N.Y. His staff said Stevenson will remain in Pittsburgh until 2 p.m. today and then go by plane to New York City. Stevenson has asked "equal time" to reply to President Eisenhower's 15-minute talk last night over major TV and radio networks concerning the Middle East crisis. Replies from the networks were expected during the day. Cancellation of the upstate New York talks apparently was dictated by the availability in New York City

Labor Raps Eden, Asks Resignation

London, Nov. 1 (AP)—Prime Minister Eden, under heavy attack from the Labor opposition, today called the British-French attack on Egypt "a police action." He said Britain would happily turn over to the U.N. the "physical task" of maintaining peace in the Middle East after the British-French forces separate the belligerent armies there and "stabilize the position."

London, Nov. 1 (AP)—The House of Commons was thrown into turmoil today by debate over Britain's onslaught against Egypt.

Members of the Labor party demanded an answer to this question: "Is the Eden government entitled to take military action against Egypt without a declaration of war?" High-Gaitskell, Labor leader, declared millions of Britons "are profoundly shocked and astounded" that British planes are bombing Egypt. U.N. Assembly To Map Action On Suez Strife

United Nations, N. Y., Nov. 1 (AP)—The U.N. General Assembly was called into emergency session today (5 p.m. EST) to decide what to do about military attacks by Britain, France and Israel on Egypt. The U.N. Security Council voted 7-2 last night to summon the Assembly after Britain and France launched air and naval operations against Egypt with the announced aim of occupying the Suez Canal zone and halting the Israel-Egyptian fighting.

Less than 24 hours earlier Britain and France had vetoed U.S. and Soviet resolutions in the council for a cease-fire in Egypt and withdrawal of Israeli troops. Under the resolution introduced by Yugoslavia, the special session of the 76-nation Assembly will consider recommendations to U.N. members for collective measures, including "the use of armed force when necessary." Less drastic steps could include a condemnation of Britain, France and Israel, a cease-fire call, or a request that U.N. members punish the three with diplomatic and economic measures.

Needs Two-Thirds Vote

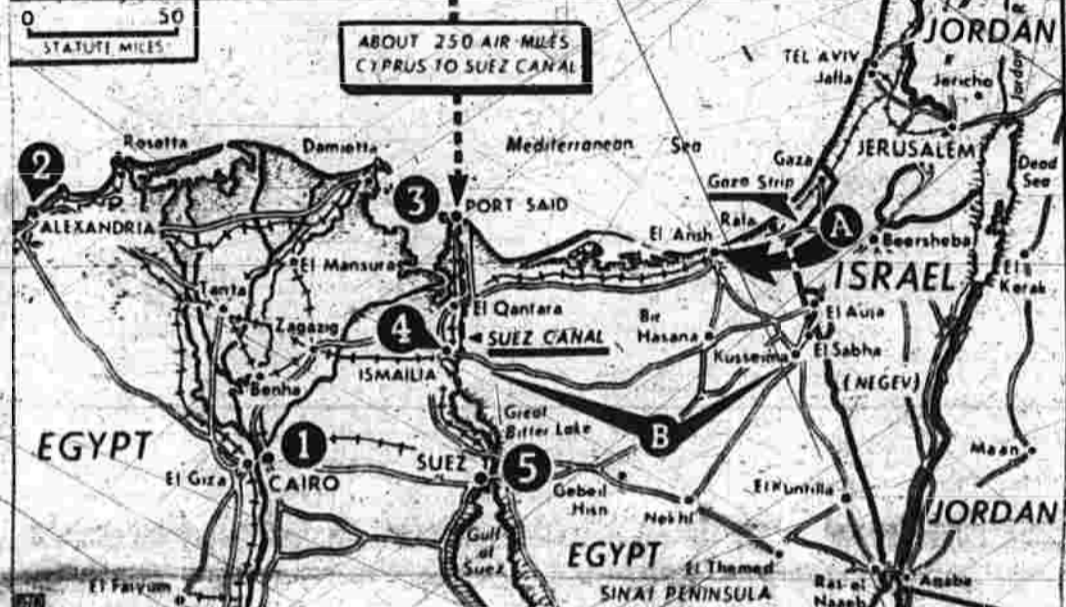
Any action the Assembly takes must be approved by two-thirds of all present and voting. Britain and France voted against the resolution to convene the Assembly, contending it was illegal. Australia and Belgium abstained. The United States and the Soviet Union were among those casting favorable votes, further emphasizing the grave split in the western alliance. Rudecindo Ortega, chief of Chile's delegation who was slated to preside over the special session, said in a statement to the press that the Assembly's first step will be to give "ample moral support" to the U.S. cease-fire resolution which Britain and France vetoed in the Security Council.

Tanks Ringing Budapest After Reds Quit City

Budapest, Nov. 1 (AP)—For the first time in nine days no gunfire was heard today in the center of Budapest. Foodshops were operating, but other commerce, industry and transport were dead. The revolution-scattered capital on the Danube was bathed in bright sunshine and many people were out in the streets. But they were out for food, trying to find relatives, and to pick up the threads of their lives torn by the anti-Soviet, anti-Communist civil war.

Russian tanks and infantry had apparently been withdrawn from the capital to their bases. But there were reports that the Russians had thrown a cordon about the capital, some 10 miles outside.

Senators Ask if Ike Once for H-Test Ban

Washington, Nov. 1 (AP)—The White House "said today" four Democratic Senators had "wrong information" when they asked President Eisenhower, whether he did not once agree to the idea of banning H-bomb tests. President's secretary James C. Hagerty said the White House received a telegram from Democratic Sens. Monroney of Oklahoma, Anderson of New Mexico, Mansfield of Montana and Fulbright of Arkansas. The telegram, made public yesterday by the Democrats, asked Eisenhower to say whether or not it was true that aides recommended ending "huge size H-bomb tests." Hagerty said the reply would go out in a few days, but not today.

He declined comment on statements made by Democratic Gov. Averell Harriman of New York about H-bomb tests. Democratic presidential candidate Adlai E. Stevenson has called for the United States to take the leadership in trying to end H-bomb tests. He contended continued tests endanger the future of mankind by polluting the atmosphere with radioactive particles.

Eisenhower has called Stevenson's talks on the subject "theatrical." In Albany, Harriman reported today that the New York State Health Department had detected "a remarkable high" level of radioactivity in the atmosphere over New York on Sept. 24.

The Governor said in a statement that the Atomic Energy Commission two days later ordered the department, "without explanation" he said, to stop its radioactivity monitoring program. He noted that the order came six days after Stevenson proposed the United States take the lead in seeking to end H-bomb tests. The Democratic Governor linked the high-level incident of Sept. 24 to a reported explosion of a Russian H-bomb on Aug. 30.

Israel Claims Gains In Sinai Peninsula

Paris, Nov. 1 (AP)—French and British aircraft carriers moved toward the Suez Canal today, bearing down on the waterway from both north and south, a French Defense Ministry communique said. There was no indication whether any troop transports accompanied the carriers and the Defense Ministry did not specify the number of naval units involved.

London, Nov. 1 (AP)—British and French planes carried on nonstop attacks on Egyptian airfields today and Cairo announced attacking aircraft sank an Egyptian warship in the Suez Canal—blocking traffic and cutting off oil shipping to Europe.

Cairo said British and French warplanes raided Egyptian troops at crossing points along the canal and in the operation sank the Egyptian warship Akiba in Timah Lake just south of Ismailia, midway point of the canal. Britain and France launched military operations against President Nasser's regime last night with the declared purpose of preventing the Aldean waterway from fighting swirling between Egyptian and Israeli forces in the Sinai desert.

The Egyptians gave out no official information today on the fighting with Israeli troops. But the Israelis claimed Egyptian troops were in retreat and would soon be cut off in the Sinai peninsula. Ships Avoiding Canal

Ever before, Egypt announced blocking of the canal shipping was reported turning back from its approaches because of danger from military operations. Egypt asked other Arab states to block another source for Middle East oil—the pipelines from the main production centers to Mediterranean ports. Egypt tried off diplomatic relations with Britain and France, Jordan broke relations with France.

Cairo dispatches said five air raids sounded in Cairo up to early afternoon, and Egyptian military headquarters claimed six British planes were shot down over the Nile delta. Troops of the western nations had not showed up in the area of operations, but their landing on Egyptian soil was expected.

British planes with cannon and rocket fire were reported in official announcements here and at Cyprus, their base, to be striking hard at five Egyptian airfields in the Suez zone and Nile delta in an effort to destroy Nasser's Soviet-built MIGs on the ground. British pilots said they had destroyed 14 Egyptian planes of the ground, including Soviet MIGs fighters. The pilots said they had encountered almost no resistance.

One amendment increases lot sizes in four of the five residential zones. The other would allow realtors and insurance agents to locate offices in their homes in Residence A zones.

The meeting will be held in the Municipal Building hearing room at 8 o'clock.

The amendment to increase lot sizes would require 30,000 square-foot lots in Residence zones, instead of 20,000, 18,000 square-foot lots in Residence A zones, instead of 15,000, 12,000 square-foot lots in Residence B zones, instead of 10,800, and 9,000 square-foot lots in Residence C zones, instead of 7,200.

Realtors and insurance agents have been advocating the amendment that would allow them to operate their business out of their homes in Residence zones. It is not now granted to doctors, dentists, architects, artists, musicians, engineers and lawyers.

The present regulation limits the number of persons in these offices to three, and the size of signs used to one square foot.

One amendment increases lot sizes in four of the five residential zones. The other would allow realtors and insurance agents to locate offices in their homes in Residence A zones.

The meeting will be held in the Municipal Building hearing room at 8 o'clock.

The amendment to increase lot sizes would require 30,000 square-foot lots in Residence zones, instead of 20,000, 18,000 square-foot lots in Residence A zones, instead of 15,000, 12,000 square-foot lots in Residence B zones, instead of 10,800, and 9,000 square-foot lots in Residence C zones, instead of 7,200.

Realtors and insurance agents have been advocating the amendment that would allow them to operate their business out of their homes in Residence zones. It is not now granted to doctors, dentists, architects, artists, musicians, engineers and lawyers.

The present regulation limits the number of persons in these offices to three, and the size of signs used to one square foot.

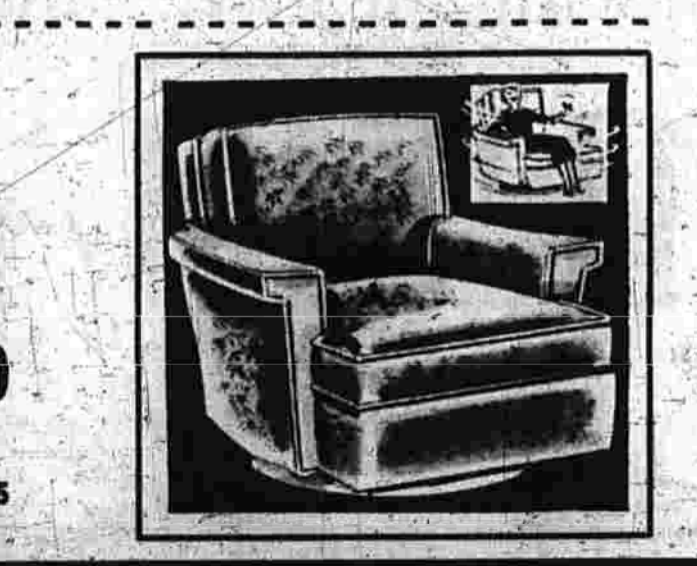

Our Position and Policy

This nation has now taken three positions... in relation to the Near East crisis. The positions taken are eminently fair, just, and right.

The first position we have taken is the moral position, and we have taken this in the moderate, but completely logical and courageous assessment of the factors in the situation made by the President last night.

The second principle enunciated last night coincides with the first, and immediate, United States policy in the present crisis. This was that our present recourse must be to the United Nations, and not to unilateral action.

In those words there was a pledge that, out of this present crisis, the United Nations would be people we will at last, and more solidly and seriously than ever before, strive for the fundamentals of peace through the United Nations which shall have clear responsibility and authority for the preservation of peace throughout the world.

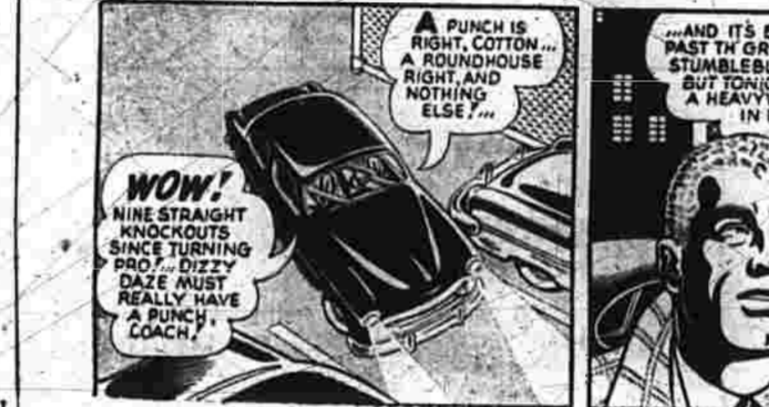
