Dulles in Good Shape After Cancer Surgery

Washington, Nov. 5 (AP)—Dulles had had a second operation for the removal of a cancerous growth from the thyroid gland, it was disclosed yesterday.

A State Department announcement said an examination at the time of the emergency operation Saturday and a-rays later, indicated the malignancy had not spread beyond the diseased portion.

Dulles' condition was described as "good" in the wake of the 2 1/2 hour operation at the Army's Walter Reed Hospital.

Six-week recuperation set. Doctors said they expect the Secretary to spend about six weeks in recuperation, some three weeks of that time in the hospital.

This means Dulles will be immobilized at a time when the United States is grappling with crises in Eastern Europe and the Middle East. He is expected to be in the State Department in December. State Department spokesman said Dulles was struck early Saturday.

He was taken to Walter Reed Hospital where a preliminary diagnosis pointed to acute appendicitis. Later that day, after a team of four doctors had performed the lengthy operation, it was announced a "benign" portion of Dulles' large intestine had been cut out. The appendix was not affected, and not removed.

News, studied in Lab. Microscope and other laboratory studies of the tissue was if and announced that cancer had been detected.

State Department press officer Lincoln White said that preliminary examinations of the removed tissue showed it to be "adenocarcinoma"—medical term for a malignant tumor. While declined to say whether Dulles had been told of this.

White said a "thorough exploration of the abdomen at the time of surgery revealed no evidence whatsoever of extension of the lesion to any other organ." The State Department official added that "a complete recovery of the disease tissue was accomplished with a restoration of intestinal continuity." That is, the healthy parts of Dulles' intestine were joined after removal of the diseased section.

Blockade Charge Denied by British

London, Nov. 5 (AP)—The Foreign Office today rejected Soviet charges that British-French forces have blockaded the coast of Egypt and other Mediterranean nations.

A spokesman told a news conference "it is not true that we are blockading the area of the eastern Mediterranean." We issued last week advice to the shipping of all nations to keep away from the eastern Mediterranean coast.

Moscow radio last night announced the Soviet Union had sent notes of protest to Britain and France against what it called a "blockade of the Egyptian coast and a number of other Mediterranean states." The broadcast said that was a violation of the Constantinople Convention of 1868 on freedom of navigation in the (Suez) Canal.



52 Additional Miners Safe; Toll Seen 38

Springhill, N.S., Nov. 5 (AP)—Fifty-two haggard miners, long feared dead, were brought out of the Cumberland No. 4 mine today 3 1/2 days after an explosion trapped them more than a mile underground.

But the joy their rescue brought to this Nova Scotia coal town was tempered by word from police that there were no more survivors.

Thirty-six others were rescued Saturday after almost all hope had been given up.

That left an estimated 38 dead in the explosion Thursday—38 miners and rescue workers killed on or near the surface and 25 believed still entombed far below ground.

Most of those rescued were in good condition, though weak.

After the explosion destroyed the upper workings, blocking their escape route, they punched holes in compressed air pipes and sucked air through their mouths. They plugged their noses to avoid poisonous coal gas.

Dragmen—volunteer rescue workers of the Nova Scotia mine fields— dug through the blocked tunnels to reach the entombed survivors.

Rockville, Nov. 5 (Special)—Congressman-at-Large Anton N. Sadlaks and Mrs. Sadlaks will leave for Bangkok, Thailand, tomorrow where they will attend a 10-day session of the Inter-Parliamentary Union. Congressman Sadlaks will attend as a member of the U.S. Congressional delegation.

The Sadlaks will leave Rockville between 9 and 10 p.m., possibly before the Republican Congressmen know whether or not he has been re-elected. This question may be answered before he leaves if the vote is heavily in his favor. But a close vote may leave him guessing.

The couple will drive to Washington, D.C. where they will board a plane at 10 a.m. Wednesday. After a stop in the Midwest for other members of the delegation, the plane will fly to San Francisco for an overnight stop, and then proceed to Honolulu.

While in Honolulu, the Sadlaks hope to see Capt. Edwin W. Kulo, Rockville, who is stationed there with the Military Police.

The next stop will be Wake Island and then on to Guam, where they hope to visit with R. T. Byrne, formerly of Rockville, who has lived at Guam for several years, and also the Rev. Antonelli, a relative of the William Westfield family.

The return trip from Bangkok will include stops at Manila, Hong Kong and Taipei, Formosa. At Taipei, the couple will visit Generalissimo and Mme. Chiang Kai-shek.

At Tokyo, Sadlaks will attend sessions of a sub-committee on tariffs and customs of which he is a member. The couple expects to arrive back home about the middle of December.

Adlai Charges Ike Negligent in Crises

Minneapolis, Nov. 5 (AP)—Adlai Stevenson said here today that President Eisenhower's "negligence on questions of peace and war" may plunge the whole world into the horror of hydrogen war.

Adlai's charges were made in a speech prepared for delivery at a Democratic breakfast rally.

"Now no one begrudges the President his recreation, but peace is a full-time job."

The rally, in a hotel here, provided the Democratic nominee his last early party audience before he winds up his campaign on a 45-minute television hook-up from Boston where he will fly to visit his daughter-in-law, Nancy, and his new grandsons, soon to be born.

Rep. Nixon, McCarthy, Stevenson, and other Democrats endorsed Adlai's charges.

Stevenson's suggestion was that the President should resign and be replaced by a Senate committee.

"I must say that I can't think of a better argument for voting against Alexander Wiley and for Feltow Democrats gave Stevenson a rousing reception Saturday night when a police-estimated crowd of 250,000 spectators turned out for a parade down Michigan Street to the Chicago Stadium in which more than 10,000 participants cheered his last major rally.

Laughing out at Eisenhower's foreign policy, Stevenson declared: "The chief executive has never had the inclination and now lacks the energy for full-time work at the state's lengthiest job."

Sunday was a busy day, starting with the telegram to Eisenhower, a visit to a newly-organized Unitarian Church in Lake Forest, and a telephone call from Adlai Jr., from the bedside in the Boston hospital.

"What are you going to do now?" he asked the proud father.

"The first thing... I'm going to get him registered," Adlai Jr. replied.

Immediately, Stevenson proclaimed the event with a statement.

"I am slated to join all the grand old boys (there could be only that could please me half as much). I hope this child will make its parents as happy as my boys have made me. And I pray that this baby may live to see a greater America and a more peaceful world."

Later, in the afternoon, Stevenson got word he could fly into Minneapolis last night because of weather conditions at the airport.

Aramco Pipeline Still in Operation

New York, Nov. 5 (AP)—A spokesman for the Arabian-American Oil Co. (ARAMCO) said yesterday its big pipeline from Saudi Arabia to Lebanon was still operating normally.

He said information received yesterday contradicted an earlier report that the line had been blown up in Syria.

The line carries 315,000 barrels of petroleum daily from the oil fields in Saudi Arabia to the Mediterranean port of Sidon in Lebanon. The line crosses Syria.

The ARAMCO line is separate from the lines of the Iraq Petroleum Co., which were reported blown up by Arab saboteurs in Syria Saturday.





In last week's Tuesday's Herald I noticed a large political advertisement in which State Senator Pat Ward, Dem. candidate for Congress from our district, was viewing with a lot of alarm the increase in the cost of living ever since General Eisenhower became president.

This issue of high prices has been a favorite with the Dem. Chester Bowles squeaked in as Governor in 1964—3 years ago—with the help of some vague promises about how he might be able to do something about reduc-

ing the terribly high prices of that day.

The Dems are still at it, only this time Candidate Ward is eager enough just to call attention to the cost-of-living increases without making any definite promises on what he is going to do about the situation—which is nothing even if he is elected.

Candidate Ward, loyal labor leader, shows only one side of the high price dollar. He doesn't advertise the fact that the wages and income of his fellow workers have also hit an all-time high under four years of Republican administration; that every time the contract of one of his beloved unions expires, a new one is written with wage and other increases which invariably boost the cost of production and general prices.

It is time these days to get the generous and ever-increasing pay checks of the "poor" working man, but Candidate Ward knows right well that you can't get your money and have it too. As long as his unions keep insisting on "more" every time a contract is renewed, they will probably get "more" for a time anyway—more wages and "more" increases in the cost of living to make up for "more" wages. It has become a big race.

While the radio was going the other morning, I also happened to catch a little gem of a paid political recording by another Dem. candidate, Congressman Dodd, who aspires to the U.S. Senate seat of the eminent and deserving Senator Dan Claitor. He said, "I am not a candidate for the U.S. Senate."

Candidate Dodd was telling about how much he had done in Congress to help the small business man. He even had introduced in the House, he said, a bill to prevent the gigantic, colossal and soulless automakers from pushing more cars on the poor harassed dealers than the latter could dispose of handily.

Now, that's what I call good, sensible legislation, the kind of stuff there ought to be more of. I think the idea could have been improved locally by an ardent auto-dealer-admirer of Candidate Dodd, but his good common sense none the less.

But wait a minute! The Democratic party is traditionally known as the "workingman's party." Just what are all the loyal Democrat workmen out in Michigan going to think when they see that a Democrat in Connecticut advocates a measure that may possibly mean fewer cars for them to make, with consequent short time and lay-off? Oh, sure, I know the Candidate Dodd isn't running in Michigan, but there are a lot of workmen employed in many Connecticut plants that make parts for the cars that the dealers don't want. They will be affected, too.

These politicians ought to get their arguments synchronized so their right hands know what their left feet are kicking.

There ought not to be too much doubt in the minds of a majority of people in the country about whom to vote for next Tuesday. Previous to 1952 we had a political party—the Dems—which had been in power for twenty years. It had done some good work.

But toward the last of its tenure it became careless and arrogant, even with a slight aroma of corruption about it.

We had a welcome change in 1952, since which time the country seems to have done fairly well in spite of the Democrat's statements to the contrary.

It would be perhaps unkind to recall the work-wear Democrats to office again before they have fully rested and recovered from their 30 years of steady, unrelenting toil with a break.

Four years are hardly enough to allow a good administration for developing its plans and programs. I think it is an excellent idea if the ballot-and-island machines all through the country are marked and manipulated next Tuesday by the Democrats.

It must be supported and fought for after the ballots and banners have been put away for another two years. For that reason I recommend the election of a new Governor. A Democratic candidate, Francis Shea, a Democratic candidate, Fran is a serious-minded young man who has given considerable thought to the problems and who will do some constructive about them. A native of Manchester with a law practice here, he is doubly concerned with Manchester's welfare. Since it is the smaller towns which are traditionally Republican that fight legislation which will benefit Manchester, our town stands a better chance in the legislature if he elects Fran Shea as he will add to the Democratic roll which is more representative of the larger population areas of the state. With each Democratic legislator sent to Capitol Hill, Manchester betters her chances for fair and equal representation in our state government.

Fran Shea also stands for a dynamic reappraisal of Manchester's situation regarding the five new bridges which are to be built across the Connecticut River. These bridges place Manchester in a position of prime importance in the state. Fran Shea has the vision and vigor of youth to help meet this new challenge. Home rule, enabling the local government to make necessary charter revisions without time-and-money-consuming state legislature is one of Fran's ideas for meeting this challenge. He will also work for court reform which will take the Connecticut court system out of the area of the political "plum."

All things considered I feel that Francis Shea is the man to send to the State Legislature and the man who will prove a fine and dynamic leader.

The Doctor Says

Parental Patience Will Aid Child's Toilet Training

All parents of young children are involved in some degree with the kind of problem brought up in a letter from Mrs. D. E.

She says in part: A close friend has a baby boy almost two years old, and her methods of breaking him of his bowel habits seem to me to be harsh. He does an excellent job of telling his mother when he wants to empty the bladder, she says, "but often forgets about his second chore. When the mother has found what he has done, she gives him a spanking and scolding. I think the child is confused, since the mother uses the bathroom for the bladder function and a potty chair for the bowels."

Before discussing certain aspects of the bladder-bowel training of small children, I should like to say that I agree with the writer of this letter. The child could very well be confused. Speaking in both a harsh and undesirable method of handling the situation.

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
"Keep Steady"

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
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


