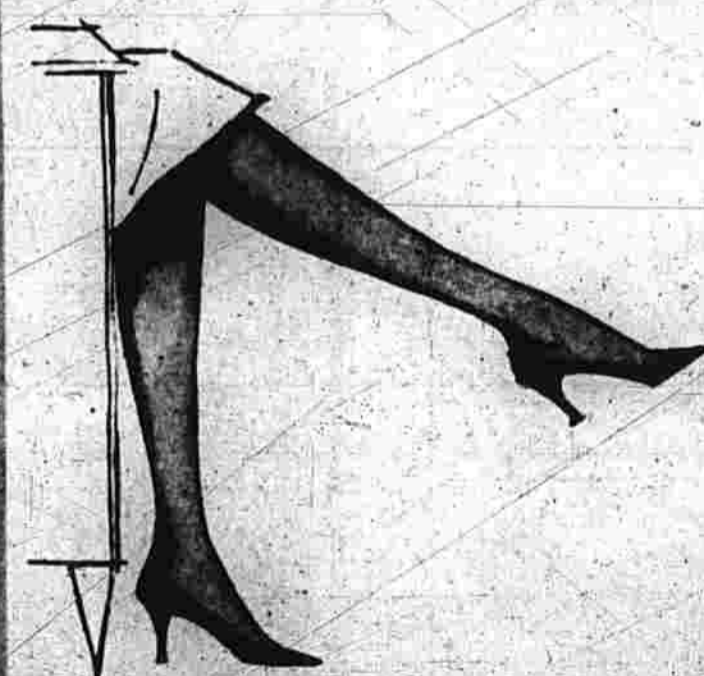

Melbourne, Nov. 6 (AP)—A news conference with Soviet Olympic officials began in deadly dull Russian earnestness today, but ended in laughter. Yet while the Russians and newsmen laughed, three nations—the Netherlands, Switzerland and Norway—were considering a withdrawal from the Games which open Nov. 22, because of Soviet suppression of the freedom movement in Hungary.

The Netherlands was the first to announce a possible withdrawal. The Olympic Committee has delegated two members to "assess the international situation" and reach a decision on whether the nation will enter the games as planned.

In Switzerland, the Olympic Committee has scheduled a emergency session tomorrow to decide whether Swiss athletes should compete against the Russians.

Konstantin Andrievsky, acting Russian chief of mission, was perfectly at ease in the press conference, which ranged from an official statement leading Olympic arrangements to a description of national uniforms.

Andrievsky, speaking through an interpreter, first told the newsman:

"A good job.

"Soviet athletes were sure the Games would help strengthen the ties of friendship among athletes of all countries, and a Soviet athlete will be allowed to compete about Melbourne, Australia.

"I tell the folks back home the laughter began when a newsman asked the average age of the Russian team and the youngest was 10 and generally the athletes were 22 or 23 years.

"How old is the oldest?" the reporter asked.

Andrievsky and his interpreter smiled. Then Andrievsky through his interpreter said: "The oldest was to conceal their age. Every body wants to be young."

In addition, three nations—the Netherlands, Switzerland and Norway—are contemplating withdrawal in protest of Russian action in Hungary.

Only yesterday, Otto Mayer, chairman of the International Olympic Committee, issued a press release in Lausanne that the Games "must take place whatever the world situation."

The Chinese Nationalist team, accepted as a separate entry for competition by the IOC, has been in Melbourne for several days.

Peiping Radio heard here said it would not attend the Games "because the International Olympic Committee permits in recognition of the Bobby Bunker James of two Chinas and allows Taiwan Province to send a team to the Games."
