

The President's . popularity, proved yesterday by a state plurality of more than 1¹2 million votes over Adlai Stevenson stunned the Democrats and brought major gains to the Repub-It sent Republican Atty, Gen. Jacob K. Javits to the United States Senate and blasted the hopes of Robert F. Wagner, New York's popular young mayor, who tried to follow his late father to Vashington: Javits seemed to be the principal beneficiary of Eisenhower's magic at the polls. When about one-third

ppeared that Javits would be ard pressed to beat Wagner. But a swell of Eisenhower Republican votes from upstate rural areas where the liberal-minded favits is not especially popula Stevenson and pushed the GOP Senatorial candidate into a lead that mounted to a respectable 450,000 plurality.
